## Mayor's Corner: If I Were Mayor Contest






## City 101: Budget Perspective - Part 1

Welcome to part 1 of a 3-part series on the City's budget and planning for the future. In this edition, we'll provide an overview of the current challenges, and in part 2 and 3 we will share more details about medium and longer-term solutions for fiscal sustainability.

As a small City, North Plains has operated on a conservative budget for many years. Due to our current and projected population growth, the increasing cost of doing business, and investments needed in maintenance and upkeep, we are facing service level challenges. North Plains' rapid growth as a bedroom community to serve employers outside of North Plains has also resulted in an imbalance in the tax base, with our city having a heavy reliance on residential taxes and very little on business taxes like other Washington County cities.

The fact is that without additional funding our city will not be able to meet the expanding needs and expectations for services. A recently-adopted goal of the North Plains City Council is to shore up fiscal sustainability, safety, and service levels that provide a comparable quality of life to other Western Washington County residents. We are working to plan the right balance of resources to help us achieve that.

You can see from this chart that City revenues currently come from a variety of sources including property taxes, service fees, business licenses, construction and development permits and charges, fines



for violations, allocations from federal and county government partners, and grants.

We sometimes hear people ask, "As more people move to North Plains and pay property taxes, why does this not cover the cost of city services?"

This is not as simple as it sounds. First, it is important to understand that property taxes currently account for just under 40% of the City's yearly general fund revenues. Also, as mentioned above, North Plains has a heavy reliance on residential property tax revenue compared to other Washington County cities, which have more businesses and industry contributing to the tax base.

Second, the City has state and voter-imposed restrictions on the ability to increase property taxes to keep up with rising costs. Taxable assessed values within the City have continued to grow since 2008; however, yearly increases in property taxes paid by property owners are limited to 3% annually under Oregon's Measure 50. Inflation in a normal year outpaces that 3% revenue growth, which contributes to an imbalance for service delivery.

## What are the options to fund the increasing demand for City services?

We are looking at both medium and long-term options. Longer-term, we are working on ways to increase available land and step up our economic development efforts in order to attract more businesses for more employment right here in North Plains. This will take time, but would also create a better balance between residential and non-residential tax revenues to pay for services.

## **Rebates Now Available For High Efficiency Toilets**

Did you know that toilets account for nearly 30 percent of an average home's indoor water use and are by far the main source of water use in the home?

## **Honoring Retiring Public Works Director Blake Boyles**

Blake Boyles has been instrumental in helping to improve and expand the City's services for the community during his 21 years of service here. He is now taking his wellearned retirement effective May 20, 2022.

Blake grew up just a few miles from town, and after a career including a local water service district, the City of Tualatin, construction work and the water works industry, he began working for the City of North Plains in June 2001. At that time the population was just 1605 people and 594 homes. It has grown to over 3,600 people and 1,375 homes now.

"It's been a fun ride watching this town grow and I have definitely enjoyed the people and the friendships I've

made," said Blake, "And of everything I have worked on, the Veterans Memorial Park and the turtle pond are the nearest and dearest to my heart."

Mayor Teri Lenahan says she appreciates Blake's leadership. "He has seen the City through some difficult moments as we have navigated the growth of our small town. Much happiness to you Blake and cheers to you on your well deserved retirement," the Mayor said.

His accomplishments are wide-ranging with positive and long-lasting effects on our growing community. Here are just a few:

**Water:** In 2001, Blake discovered the city's well had potential for contamination and worked to secure a safer and more sustainable water source. By 2004, purchasing water from the Joint Water Commission was arranged

and a new water line from Hillsboro was built turned on in 2005. He also managed the construction of the new water reservoir on West Union Road.

Parks/Trails: Blake (aka "the turtle whisper") is largely

responsible for identifying endangered Western Pond Turtles 15 years ago in the pond off of NW 307th. He then worked to improve the habitat and increase the turtle population there and spearheaded the completion of the Ghost Creek Trail and Turtle Pond observation structure in 2020. He was also responsible for other park and trail construction including Louie Wentz, Frank Wing, and Veterans Memorial Parks, and the West Union Trail.

Road/sidewalk/overpass improvements: Of significant note are Main Street, Glencoe Road, and Glencoe interchange/overpass improvements.

Other accomplishments include obtaining \$2 million in grants from Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) and Small Cities Allotment Grants that helped with various community projects, leading the Downtown mural project in 2015 which resulted in the beautiful, artistic paintings depicting North Plains on various downtown buildings, and serving as serving as City Manager from 2015-2017.

This summer, Blake will be moving south to the sunny Tucson, AZ area with his wife and four dogs. We wish you all the best in retirement, Blake, and thank you for all you have done for North Plains!

#### Chief's Corner: Houselessness

While houselessness does not always escalate to law enforcement action, the North Plains Police Department appropriately dedicates time and resources to this population to ensure safety for all our community members. We work directly with community partners while on patrol to connect the unhoused with available resources, conduct risk assessments, and engage with all community members to improve community livability.

During the pandemic, we have followed guidance from the CDC, the Oregon Health Authority, and Washington County Public Health officials to allow people camping outdoors to remain where they are when safe to do so. The Supreme Court case Martin v. Boise also impacts local governments by prohibiting enforcement action against people sleeping outside due to a lack of available shelter space in the community.

Our goal is always to promote public safety and

## Fire Camp For Young Women: Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue

#### Young Women Can Explore a Career as a Firefighter

Applications are being accepted for Portland Metro Fire Camp for young women ages 16 to 22. This camp

is an all-encompassing introduction to a rewarding profession and is designed to instill confidence while building leadership and team skills.

Participants will learn what it takes to be a firefighter while completing hands-on training in hose and ladder skills, vehicle extrication, search and rescue, ropes and knots, live-fire operations, aerial ladder climbs, emergency medical skills, and other firefighting tasks.

They will receive instruction from professional female firefighters from

multiple agencies on how to prepare for interviews and

what it's like to have a career in the fire service as well as the importance of good nutrition and physical fitness.

This free fire camp will be offered twice this summer on two weekends:

- July 8, 9, and 10 at the Portland Fire & Rescue Training Center, 4800 NE 122nd Ave., in Portland.
- July 15, 16, and 17 at Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue's Training Center, 12400 SW Tonguin Road, in Sherwood.

The deadline to apply is May 30. Space is limited. Those selected to participate will be notified the week of June 1.
