Mayor's Corner: Homeless Resources



Over the course of the COVID-19 pandemic, homelessness took on a greater priority in communities across our nation. Local, state and federal governments stepped forward to provide resources for those in need and many local organizations continue to provide various levels of support for those experiencing homelessness.

The laws and landscape related to camping on public property have changed significantly, requiring cities to balance the constitutional rights of people experiencing homelessness with the health, safety, wellness and

economic stability of residents and businesses. While North Plains has not been impacted by homelessness in comparison to other cities across Oregon, we want to be compassionate and proactively ready for any issues that might come our way. Last month, the City Council amended the North Plains Municipal Code 131.14 to comply with *Martin v. Boise, Blake v. Grants Pass* and HB 3115. The City Council took this step to ensure the safety for all our community members.

I am one of 25 mayors who formed a task force to develop a response to homelessness that would help all communities statewide, regardless of size or location. In truly collaborative style, the mayors partnered with the Oregon Mayors Association and the League of Oregon Cities to establish an initiative to present to the 2023 Oregon Legislature and Oregon's next governor. The task force's plan to humanely and timely address the homelessness crisis in Oregon involves a partnership between the state of Oregon and its 241 cities.

If you don't need these services but want to give back, most of these organizations have Wish Lists and/or accept donations. To end homelessness, housing and food insecurity, we must work together to find solutions that fit the need.

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

Broadband Opportunities Survey Recap

The City of North Plains is studying the state of broadband in North Plains. Our goal is to identify and evaluate a range of options for the City to consider the availability, affordability, reliability, and capacity of broadband infrastructure for residents and businesses.

In the summer of 2022, we asked the community to take a survey to help us identify how broadband and data services are currently being used and if there are service gaps so we can evaluate options for City-enhanced local broadband. Thank you to all 419 households who took the time to take the survey and share feedback.



Here is a summary of what we heard:

• There are broadband services available throughout North Plains; however, they are greatly limited to one service provider.

• Survey respondents indicated that increased internet speed, price, and reliability are most important to them in broadband service (see chart).

• Respondents are generally not greatly satisfied with their current broadband service

• Respondents indicated they would utilize other broadband services, including City-supported broadband, at a more affordable price.

With this important feedback, we will continue to evaluate what is the most beneficial and cost-effective way for the City to actively enhance broadband for all in North Plains. This includes partnering with Washington County on extending new network fiber and new service choices to North Plains.

Chief's Corner: Washington County Houseless Resources



While houselessness does not always escalate to law enforcement action, the North Plains Police Department appropriately dedicates time and resources to this population to ensure safety for all our community members.

During the global pandemic,

Washington County has followed guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Oregon Health Authority, and County Public Health officials to allow people camping outdoors to remain where they are when safe to do so. The Supreme Court case Martin v. Boise impacts local governments by prohibiting enforcement action against people sleeping outside due to a lack of available shelter space in the community. Our goal is always to promote public safety and to support all our community members, so we ask anyone with information to report suspicious or criminal activity to non-emergency dispatch at 503-629-0111. closely with city and community partners to address the urgent needs of individuals experiencing houselessness. Deputies work directly with community partners while on patrol to connect the unhoused community with available resources, conduct risk assessments, and engage with all community members to improve the livability of Washington County.

Community Connect is a coordinated entry system that supports people experiencing houselessness or at imminent risk of houselessness to find housing resources in Washington County. For

Leaf Pick Up Scheduled for November 1 & 14

This year, Public Works will be picking up leaves city wide during two leaf pick up weeks. If you'd like your leaves picked up, please have them out in front of your curb by November 1 and November 14. The street tree leaf pick up program helps prevent flooding by collecting leaves that would fall and plug storm catch basins.



To help us better serve you, please place loose leaves curbside by the first day of the scheduled pick up.

Loose leaves must be raked into a windrow parallel and 18 inches away from the curb to allow storm water to drain along the gutter. Keep leaf windrows less than 3 feet high. Other things to consider:

- Please do not park vehicles or place refuse bins or any other obstacles near the leaf windrows. Leaves in driveways, grass, rocks or bark dust will not be picked up.
- Please remember that leaves and branches from trees other than street trees need to be placed in your yard debris bin or taken to Recology. This includes leaves from trees in your back yard.
- Keep in mind that emergencies, severe weather, and light/heavy leaf fall may cause delays in the schedule. We will keep you posted of any changes on the City's website at <u>www.northplains.org.</u>

As a reminder, Recology accepts yard debris year-round and is free for anyone with a North Plains address. Recology is located on NW 307th Avenue. Visit their website at <u>www.recology.com</u>.

Putting a Lid on Cooking Fires



Cooking is one of the leading causes of home fires and fire injuries. Last year, more than one-third of the residential fires that Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue responded to, began in a kitchen.

TVF&R encourages you to minimize your risk of fire by organizing a safe kitchen and practicing safe cooking tips:

- Keep a watchful eye on what you are cooking never leave cooking unattended.
- Keep your cooking area clean, including the stovetop, oven, and exhaust fan.
- Keep dish towels and pot holders away from the burners on your stove.
- Watch your sleeves to prevent them from catching fire or getting caught on pan handles.
- Cooking oil can ignite quickly. Heat oil slowly and watch it closely.
- Keep a fire extinguisher in your kitchen. Store it in an easy-to-reach location and know how to use it. The discharge of a portable fire extinguisher only lasts between eight and 10 seconds.

Put a lid on it.

The easiest way to extinguish a small pan fire is with a pan lid. Turn off the burner and carefully slide a pan lid over the pan from the side. The lid will "smother" the fire, while turning off the burner removes the



heat. Do not move the pan until the fire is completely extinguished and the pan is cool. If you do not have a pan lid, you may also use a baking sheet or pizza pan.

Never transfer a burning pan from the stovetop to the sink or out an exterior door. The fire may grow in size and burn you or spread to a countertop, cabinets, or curtains.

Grease and water do not mix.

Never pour water on a grease fire. Water causes these fires to explode as the burning material stays on top of the water, causing it to spread and putting you at severe risk of getting burned.

If the fire is large and/or continues to grow, do not attempt to extinguish it. Quickly get everyone outside and immediately call 911 from a cellphone or neighbor's house. For additional safety tips, visit <u>www.tvfr.com</u>.
