City of North Plains 5-Year Public Safety Local Option Levy

Proposed Public Safety Local Option Levy

The May 16, 2023 ballot will contain proposed Measure 34-322 for a proposed \$1.65 per \$1,000 of assessed property value to fund overnight police patrol and related services. Residents who are registered voters will have the opportunity to vote on the proposed measure.



What is being proposed if the measure passes?

The proposed measure, if passed, would fund two additional North Plains Police officers. This would approximately double the hours officers are on patrol, enabling a local North Plains officer to be on duty every night. Currently, either a City officer or the police chief is on duty from 7 am to 10 pm most days. Portions of some overnight shifts are covered by Washington County Sheriff's deputies responding to only high-priority calls such as assaults, domestic disputes, or other crimes in progress from outside the City, which lengthens response time. Lower-priority calls are generally not responded to until a North Plains officer is on duty the next day. If passed, the levy would also provide more stable funding for North Plains Police services to support all patrol shifts.

If the measure passes, who would pay and what would it cost?

If passed, the proposed local option levy, would be in place for five years beginning in Fiscal Year 2023-24 and the levy rate would be \$1.65 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. For a home with an assessed (not market) value of \$260,892, average for residential property in North Plains, the cost would be \$429 per year or about \$36 a month.

What happens if the proposed measure does not pass?

If the levy does not pass, the proposed additional two officer positions would not be funded and property taxes would not be increased.

When is the election?

Oregon conducts all voting by mail. Ballots should arrive in mailboxes around April 27 and must be postmarked on or before May 16 or received by the Election Office or an official drop site by 8 pm on May 16, 2023. Ballots postmarked on or before May 16 must be received no later than seven days after the May 16 election.

From the City Manager: Community Survey Says ...!

The City conducted a community survey in late 2022/ early 2023 to help our City Council and our staff gauge where to make improvements in our services. We greatly appreciate all of those who took the time to provide important feedback on City services and priorities. Some of the takeaways from the recent survey include:

- 86% of the nearly 170 respondents live within North Plains city limits, and 56% have lived in the community for more than 6 years
- 85% rate the quality of life in North Plains as excellent/good
- 81% say the services provided by the City of North Plains are excellent/good

The Top 4 services city residents are most satisfied with:

- City-sponsored community events
- Library

The Top four services that respondents indicated need improvement:

- Parks & Trails
- Street Repair and Maintenance (including Street Lighting)
- Police Services
- Planning or Land Use Services

The top four priorities for the City to address in the next five years

- 1 Dedicated 24-hour police coverage 64%
- 2 More shopping and services 47%
- 3 Improvements to City sidewalks 42%
- 4 Parks maintenance and recreational activities 33%

What is the City doing to address these community priorities? There is a local option levy on the May ballot for voter consideration regarding overnight and expanded police coverage. The City is working with a developer for a grocery-anchored retail center on Glencoe Road, as well as future economic development projects in the boundary expansion. We are using fuel-tax receipts to fund new sidewalks and paths and pavement overlays, especially on our older streets and downtown core. And we are working with partners like the YMCA to offer some activity programs in the near-term, while expanding parks & recreation offerings in the future.

The community priorities survey is an exercise we plan to do on a regular basis, and the feedback we receive will continue to help with planning and budgeting and in setting priorities for improved City services in the future.

Planned Capital Improvement Projects

A few years ago the City Council adopted a Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for the years 2022-2027. The CIP includes budgeted road, water system, park/ trails, sidewalk, and facility construction projects and system improvements. The CIP program dedicates revenues and expenses and are long-term investments in City facilities and infrastructure. The funding sources are diverse and are a combination of fuel tax revenues, State and Federal grants, user fees (water rates), system development charges (fees on new construction), and more. The Jessie Mays Park playground improvement is one such CIP project coming to completion.

Several sidewalk projects are scheduled to get under way this year, in addition to a new building. The schedule of activity is below.

Summer 2023*:

Glencoe Road sidewalk (Commercial St to North Ave)

- Commercial Street sidewalks
- 313th Avenue overlay, waterline replacement, sidewalk
- Public Works Facility on West Union Road

Fall 2023*:

- 309th/311th/Jesse Mays Park sidewalks
- Pacific Street and Main Street sidewalks

Chief's Corner: Mail Theft



Mail delivery can, unfortunately, attract common crimes of opportunity. With the continuous reporting of mail theft from personal and community mailboxes, we wanted to remind the community of some safety

measures that you can take to help deter this crime.

- Purchase a secure mailbox with a lock.
- Have checks directly deposited into your bank account.
- Use a P.O. Box or a similar service.
- Do not have banking, financial, or personal identification mailed to you. Sign-up for paperless mailings instead, if applicable.
- Check your mailbox daily.
- Install a home security system with cameras that have your mailbox within view.



- If you are out of town, have a friend or family member check your mailbox, or place a hold on your mail through the US Postal Service.
- Sign up for the US Postal Service's Informed Delivery, a free program, that lets you digitally preview your mail scheduled to arrive that day so you know if something goes missing. Visit https://www.usps. com/manage/informed-delivery.htm for more information.
