Between 1841 and 1910, pioneers such as Charles McKay, David Lenox and Joe Meek brought their time, money, and ideas to this area of Washington County. The land was fertile, and the possibilities were endless.

Back then, North Plains was seen as the logical place to grow in Washington County. We started out as a destination on a bustling train line and a transport center for agricultural vendors and fur traders. The Ruth Trust Company was

commissioned to design and plat the town. North Plains was coined a "Garden of Eden, a necessity and its future guaranteed."

Over the years, steps were taken to formalize the incorporation of the city and on June 25, 1963, residents voted to officially incorporate as the City of North Plains.

As the city prepares to celebrate its 60th anniversary, there is a sense of pride and excitement in the air. Over the years, the city has grown and evolved in many ways. New neighborhoods have been built, businesses opened, and community events have flourished. But while the city has changed, the spirit has remained the same. It is a place that values community, diversity and progress. It is a city that celebrates its past while looking towards the future.

As the city marks this milestone, we invite you to celebrate our anniversary in conjunction with the annual North Plains Ice Cream Social on June 1st (see more details on page 7 or northplains.org/calendar). ## 2023-25 Biennial Budget **Creation in Process**

The budget review and approval process is underway for the next biennial (2-year) budget which begins on July 1, 2023.



During this process, the North Plains City Council, the City's Budget Committee, and city staff work to create a budget that aligns with the city's goals, priorities, and strategic initiatives.

The 2023 schedule includes:

March 6: City Council held a work session with the Budget Committee to preview themes

and issues affecting the 2023-25 budgeting process

- April 13: City Manager released a proposed 2023-25 biennial budget
- April 19 & May 3 (if necessary): Budget Committee meetings to discuss proposed budget
- May 24: Budget Committee reconvenes and votes to recommend a biennial budget to City Council that reflects the results of the Police Services Local Option Levy from the May 16 general election

## **Chief's Corner: Bike Month**



May is National Bike Month, highlighting the health and environmental benefits of riding a bicycle and encouraging more people to get out and ride. As we head into spring and summer, many dust off their bikes for commuting,

exercise, or just for fun. Regardless of the intent, we want everyone to practice safe bicycling habits at all times.

Always wear a properly fitted bike helmet. Oregon law requires those under 16 to wear a helmet, though everyone is encouraged to do so to avoid head injuries in the event of an accident. Find out more on proper fitting from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) at https://bit.ly/3wffy6K



Be Safe – Be Seen by wearing bright clothing during the day and reflective gear (front white light and red rear light) at night or when visibility is poor.

Ride a bike that fits you; it is harder to maintain control when it is too big or too small.

Always maintain one rider per seat and use both hands on the handlebar except when signaling a turn.

Free yourself from distractions that take your eyes, ears, or mind off the road, such as texting or listening to music.

Tie your shoelaces, tuck your pant legs, and secure anything that might get caught in your bike chain. Carry all your items in a backpack or securely strapped to the back of your bike.

Plan your route; choose directions with less traffic, slower speeds, and available bike lanes when possible.

Ride in the same direction as traffic and in a single file to share the road with others and be sure to follow street signs, signals, and road markings.

Motorists can also promote bicycle safety by leaving space for bicyclists and only passing when safe to do so, allowing at least three feet of clearance, and never on sharp corners or blind spots. Roads are a shared responsibility; we can all work together to enjoy the outdoors safely.

#### Backflow Device Testing Deadline July 1

Did you know that the State of Oregon requires backflow prevention assembly testing upon installation, annually, and any time they are repaired to protect the public water system? Backflow device tests are due to the City on July 1 annually. Testing must be performed by an Oregon Health Authority-certified Backflow Assembly Tester. What is a backflow prevention device? Backflow prevention on private plumbing systems prevents the undesirable reversal of flow back into the drinking water supply. They can be installed on systems such as, but not limited to, irrigation systems, fire suppression systems, boilers, and wells.
