CITY COUNCIL

December 19, 2022

A regular meeting of the City of Petoskey City Council was held in the City Hall Council Chambers, Petoskey, Michigan, on Monday, December 19, 2022. This meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M.; then, after a recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, a roll call then determined that the following were

Present: John Murphy, Mayor Tina DeMoore, City Councilmember Derek Shiels, City Councilmember Brian Wagner, City Councilmember Lindsey Walker, City Councilmember

Absent: None

Also in attendance were City Manager Shane Horn, City Clerk Sarah Bek and Public Safety Director Matt Breed.

Public Safety Director Chief Breed Recognition

Northern Michigan Association Chiefs of Police representatives including Kyle Knight, City of Harbor Springs Chief, Joel Jett, City of Alpena Chief, and Todd Woods, Mackinaw City Chief, recognized Public Safety Director Matt Breed with a plaque for his dedicated service to the Association and law enforcement achievements in Northern Michigan. Representatives spoke highly of Chief Breed's leadership, admiration and friendship and wished him a well-earned retirement.

Public Hearing CDBG Rental Rehabilitation Grant Application for City Park Grill

A public hearing was held to receive comments concerning the City's proposed Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Rental Rehabilitation Grant Application for City Park Grill, 432 East Lake Street.

Mayor Murphy opened the public hearing at 7:11 P.M. and there were no public comments and the hearing closed at 7:12 P.M.

Consent Agenda - Resolution No. 19737

Following introduction of the consent agenda for this meeting of December 19, 2022, Councilmember Walker moved that, seconded by Councilmember DeMoore adoption of the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council does and hereby confirms that the draft minutes of the August 15, 2022, closed session, December 5, 2022 regular session and closed session City Council meetings be and are hereby approved as amended to include Carla Sherman's comment expressing thanks to the Public Safety Department on the December 5, 2022 regular session minutes; and

BE IT RESOLVED that receipt by the City Council of a report concerning all checks that had been issued since December 5, 2022 for contract and vendor claims at \$1,000,384.97, intergovernmental claims at \$219,958.13 and the December 8 payroll at \$346,666.78, for a total of \$1,567,009.88 be and is hereby acknowledged.

Said resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Hear Public Comment

Mayor Murphy asked for public comments and Val Meyerson, District Library Director, commented that it has been a pleasure working with Chief Breed and he has always been helpful to the Library and announced that the Americans and The Holocaust traveling exhibit is coming to the library January 5 – February 14, 2023 and is 1 of 50 libraries in the country to host exhibit.

Hear City Manager Updates

The City Manager reviewed the special joint Planning Commission and DMB meeting from December 13; reviewed the December 15 Planning Commission meeting; asked Council for January 9 work session topics; inquired if January 30 or January 31 dates work for a special joint City Council and Planning Commission meeting to meet annual RRC requirement; provided project status updates for Lofts at Lumber Square, Michigan Maple Block, 424 Emmet Street OPRA, Little Traverse Wheelway slope restoration and CEDAM Fellowship grant for a college graduate with a planning background; that the Public Safety Director position was posted on December 12 and a community survey is available on the City's website; that the Downtown Office has a photo contest available to submit photos for a 2024 calendar; and that the Crooked Tree Arts Center is hosting festivities for New Year's Eve.

Councilmembers discussed work session topics and prioritized action plan updates, an overview session to discuss where policy is needed and ethics, economic incentive policy and short-term rentals; and concurred to meet at 5:30 P.M., the first Council meeting of each month ahead of regular meeting for January, February and March to discuss these matters. Councilmembers further commented that either January 30 or 31 works for a special joint meeting with Planning Commission; inquired on the timeline and when a decision would be made for zoning amendment for height allowance in the B-3a district; and inquired if the City will be applying for a SPARK Grant.

The City Manager responded that there is no timeline set to finalize the Planning Commission's decision on proposed zoning amendment allowing for height increase in the B-3a district; that the City was informed that it would not be successful in the first round of SPARK grants since disbursements would be more for disadvantaged communities, but that the City will apply for the second round.

Mayor Murphy reviewed 2022 holiday light contest winners, locations and prizes.

Approve CDBG Rental Rehabilitation Program Grant Submittal – Resolution No. 19738

The City Manager reviewed that as part of the Downtown Strategic Plan, increasing the number and quality of upper-story downtown residential units has been an identified goal within downtown; that a key tool identified by staff is Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Rental Rehabilitation program; that if approved, \$531,790 in grant funding would be utilized to assist in the creation of five new, second floor residential units above City Park Grill, 432 East Lake Street; that three of the five units will be priced to be affordable for individuals making no more than 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI) for at least 5 years; that Housing North will assist City staff in the process; that before Council was a Letter of Interest (LOI) and pre-application that City Council can cancel at any time if there is no interest, but the LOI expires March 31; and disclosed that Dick Dinon, City Park Grill stakeholder, provides labor attorney services to the City for collective bargaining units and the City Attorney reviewed that there is no conflict of interest pertaining to grant.

Councilmembers inquired if the use of the City as the pass through of funds would create any increase in liability to the City; inquired if units at the AMI is required to be maintained for at least five years or if it could be expanded for a longer period; inquired on Housing North's participation due to City funding part of the position; heard from those supporting additional housing; and inquired how MEDC will help. The City Manager responded that there may be very little liability, but staff is comfortable moving forward in the process; that MEDC indicated that five years is the minimum for units to be maintained at an affordable price, but that a separate agreement with developer could be developed and go beyond five years; and that an MEDC administrator will be assigned to the City throughout the entire grant process.

Andrea Jacobs, Housing North Ready Program Director, reviewed that since the City is RRC certified, it shows a commitment to program and has availability to this type of funding.

Councilmember Wagner moved that, seconded by Councilmember Walker adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the City of Petoskey wishes to encourage the upgrading of downtown residential units and housing conditions in an effort to increase the inventory of available workforce housing; and

WHEREAS, the City of Petoskey on behalf of the Wine Guys Holding, LLC has submitted a CDBG Grant application for Rental Rehabilitation for City Park Apartments at 432 Lake Street; and

WHEREAS, this project would create three one-bedroom apartments and two studio apartments in the second story of the City Park Grill; and

WHEREAS, all five apartments would be appropriately prices for out year-round workforce with three units renting at rates affordable to those making up to 80% AMI and the remaining two units intended to be affordable to those making no more than 120% AMI; and

WHEREAS, the funding request for CDBG Rental Rehabilitation Grant is \$531,790 with \$393,329 private for a total estimated project cost of \$925,119; and

WHEREAS, the proposed project is consistent with the City of Petoskey's Community Development Plan as described in the Application; and

WHEREAS, at least 51% of the beneficiaries of the project will be low and moderate income persons; and

WHEREAS, no project costs (CDBG and non-CDBG) will be incurred prior to a formal grant award, completion of the environmental review procedures and formal, written authorization to incur costs has been provided by the CDBG Project Manager; and

WHEREAS, the City of Petoskey City Council authorizes the submittal of the CDBG Rental Rehabilitation Grant Application on behalf of the owner; and

WHEREAS, Petoskey City Council authorizes John Murphy, Mayor, to sign the Grant Application and Shane Horn, City Manager, to sign the Grant Agreement and all amendments, payment requests and designee as the Certifying Officer for the NEPA Environmental Review.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City of Petoskey City Council authorizes the City Manager to apply to the Rental Rehabilitation Program for the amount of \$531,790 for funding through CDBG and to take all necessary steps to execute agreements necessary to receive and redistribute funds through the Rental Rehabilitation Program.

Approve 2022 Budget Amendments – Resolution No. 19739

The City Manager reviewed proposed budget amendments in the General Fund and Library Fund; that General Fund revenue adjustments included ARPA grant in Public Safety, that revenue was lost in Parks and Recreation as a result of State and Local grant opportunities, increased Magnus Park rentals and increased fuel sales in the Marina; that total decrease in budgeted revenues are \$972,200; that expenditures increased in personnel cost for Public Safety due to overtime and lack of positions filled and total decrease in budgeted expenditures are \$615,100; and that the Library Fund adjustments consisted of various minor adjustments to revenue and expenditure accounts.

Councilmembers inquired who approved the \$301,200 ARPA funding for Public Safety; discussed the process so not as many adjustments have to occur each year; and suggested a better layout by the Finance Director so financials are easier to read.

The City Manager responded that ARPA funding was approved administratively by individuals who no longer are employed with the City and that budget adjustments are common and will occur annually.

Councilmember DeMoore moved that, seconded by Councilmember Shiels adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, at the close of the City's 2022 fiscal year, the City staff has determined that revenues and expenditures within two City funds are anticipated to differ from amounts that had been budgeted for:

City purchases are normally limited to road salt, vehicles and equipment.

City staff is currently working on specifications, which will establish availability and final pricing in the near future.

WHEREAS, the City of Petoskey has developed the plan as a guideline improving recreation and enhancing natural resources for the City of Petoskey; and

WHEREAS, at the December 12, 2022 meeting, the Petoskey Parks and Recreation Commission recommended City Council adopt the plan; and

WHEREAS, after the public hearing, the City of Petoskey, City Council voted to adopt the plan amendment:





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The City of Petoskey is located in the southwest corner of the County of Emmet, Michigan along the shores of Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay, approximately 65 miles north of Traverse City and 45 miles south of the Straits of Mackinac (see Map 1.1). Petoskey serves as the regional center within the County of Emmet, particularly due to the presence of McLaren Northern Michigan and the North Central Michigan College. In addition to these institutional centers, Petoskey has a thriving resort and tourism industry, attracting visitors from throughout the Midwest. Visitors are primarily drawn to Petoskey's scenic waterfront location, as well as its historic downtown business district. The prevalence of quality recreational facilities throughout the City helps to reinforce this reputation as a premiere resort and tourist destination.







The City's territory was expanded from 4.5 to 6.3 square miles in 1994 through a 50 year intergovernmental agreement with Resort Township. Under the agreement the City provides all municipal services to the 1,100 acre Bay Harbor development except for planning and zoning, which is provided by Resort Township, and electric distribution, which is provided by Consumers Energy Corporation. East and West Parks, the properties that were donated to Resort Township by Bay Harbor Company, are owned and operated by Resort Township. Cityowned and maintained recreational facilities within Bay Harbor include the Little Traverse Wheelway north of and adjacent to US-31 right-of-way and a 1/3 mile branch of the non-motorized trail that runs along the Village Harbor. This trail connects East

Park to the Bay Harbor Village. Several City-owned open-space areas within Bay Harbor are used for utility purposes or have been reserved for utility or public-safety purposes.

The City of Petoskey has a long history of adopting and implementing plans for parks and recreation. A strong vision and sustained commitment by both City leaders and active community members has enabled the City of Petoskey to develop an extensive, high-quality park system. In the spirit of continuous improvement, the City of Petoskey is seeking to continue the development of its recreational programs and facilities, ensuring it can satisfy not only the community's current recreational demands, but those of the future as well.

This Parks and Recreation Master Plan update is a critical component in the continuous improvement process, providing a roadmap that will help guide community leaders toward the City's desired future. This document provides an analysis of current recreational opportunities that exist within the City of Petoskey, evaluating these programs and facilities against the recreational demands of the Petoskey community. Based on the results of this analysis, the Parks and Recreation Master Plan provides a strategy for how these future needs can best be met.

In 2021, the City of Petoskey Parks and Recreation properties and City buildings underwent a capital needs assessment which categorized the immediate, 5 year and 10 year estimates of maintenance costs for existing properties. The master plan will reflect the immediate and 5 year priorities including accessibility, infrastructure and landscaping improvements.

While the focus of this plan is the development of parks and recreational opportunities within the City of Petoskey, it also provides information on the larger community context, providing connections and opportunities for cooperation between the City and other jurisdictions that may provide regional amenities for an even larger user group. Petoskey's long history of partnership and cooperation with adjacent Townships, Emmet County and the Petoskey Area School District demonstrate the desire to protect the valuable natural resources of the area, while still providing the quality recreational experiences that both residents and visitors desire.

The Petoskey park system is critical to the area quality of life and has always been integral to the community sense of place. To continue in the place-making tradition of past park and recreation master plans, this update examines a series of topics that provide an understanding of the Petoskey community, documents the wishes of its residents, describes the current recreational assets and deficiencies, and proposes a plan for addressing these issues. Topics addressed within this plan include:

- Analysis of Petoskey's social and physical characteristics.
- Description of the current administrative structure.

- Description of the parks and recreation planning process.
- Inventory of current park and recreational amenities.
- Documentation of current trends, issues and opportunities related to the Petoskey park system
- Documentation of parks and recreational goals that meet the expressed desires of the local community.
- Documentation of the action items and implementation plans needed to realize the recreational goals.

Demographic analysis is an important tool to help assess the strengths and deficiencies in a community's recreational system. Understanding topics such as population, age distribution, mobility issues, and other influences can lead to a stronger recreation plan that fully supports community needs. Although it is two years past the last U.S. Census, the 2020 Census numbers will be used for comparison purposes to the 2010 Census numbers as well as disability information from the American Community Survey 2011-2015. More Census data is becoming available daily, but this is the most up to date data available at the time of the adoption of this plan.

Population Characteristics


The 2020 Census indicated an increase in population for the City of Petoskey from the 2010 Census, with most adjacent townships also experienced a gain in population. Resort Township saw a decrease in population (see Table 2.1). The City service area for park and recreation facilities serves not only the City and Bay Harbor territory, but also Bear Creek, Resort and Springvale Townships. Therefore it is the population of the larger area that impacts parks and recreation services.

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Age Profile

Census data available shows that 20.7% of the City of Petoskey's age distribution was under 18 years old in 2020. People over 65 closely followed in number with 19.7% and people under 5 at 5%. Each of these age groups has different needs and preferences for recreational programming that need to be considered in resource allocation.



Mobility and Self-Care Limitations

While the data in this section is dated, the trends indicate the importance of recognizing these groups. Information regarding mobility and self-care limitations can be a useful input when designing recreational programming and facilities that will serve the entire community. The U.S. Census Bureau defines a disability as a "limitation in the ability to perform one or more major life activities" (U.S. Census 2000).¹ Such major life activities may include working, going outside the home, or taking care of personal needs. Within the service area of the City of Petoskey's Department of Parks and Recreation, the 65+ age group has 17.1% of the population identifying a disability. As this is a growing age cohort, it will be important to take this information into account when developing recreation facilities and programs (see Table 2.4). For the 18-64 year age groups, almost 15% of the population reported a disability, although the limitation most often cited related to an employment disability. The disability cited most often for the youngest age group reporting (5-15 years) was categorized as a mental disability.

Demographic trends indicated by these mobility and self-care limitation statistics point to the need for youth programming that is inclusive and accommodates those with a developmental disability, as well as facilities and activities that provide the needed support for the senior population that may be experiencing sensory or physical limitations.

Employment and Income

Large local employers include McLaren Northern Michigan, Public Schools of Petoskey, and North Central Michigan College, with the local economy primarily driven by the service and resort/tourism industries. The City is also considered a "regional center" for the Emmet County due to its large central business district and county government.

Impact of Seasonal Residents and Tourists

As a resort and tourism region, it is not only the local population that uses recreation facilities and services. A study by Michigan State University "Attitudes toward Tourism in Emmet County" based on seasonal population numbers indicates that county-wide there is an increase over year-round population of 40% in the slower months and approximately 300% during the summer, which can be assumed has only increased since the pandemic. Recreating is a primary reason people are drawn to the area, and therefore it is also the needs of this large influx of population that park and recreation facilities and services must meet.

Community Assessment

Regional Services:

Petoskey serves as a regional service center for the County of Emmet and other rural communities beyond. The City hosts health-care services, educational opportunities, a vibrant shopping district, and many recreational draws for the area's resort and tourism industry. The following is an overview of key resources found within the Petoskey Community:

- McLaren Northern Michigan This regional facility and its area clinics employ 150 physicians to serve a 202 licensed-bed facility. It offers specialized services in the areas of cardiology, oncology, neuroscience, and orthopedics.
- North Central Michigan College Located on a 280-acre campus within the city, this taxsupported community college, whose taxing jurisdiction is coterminous to the County of Emmet boundaries, had a fall 2022 enrollment of 2,169 students, with an additional 2,537 enrolled in non-credit training programs.
- Cultural Amenities Cultural resources such as the Crooked Tree Arts Center, the Bay View Association, and the Little Traverse Bay Historical Society's facilities are located in the Petoskey area and serve residents, resorters, and tourists. The Great Lakes Center for the Arts in Bay Harbor provides a 500 seat theater for the performing arts.
- Shopping Districts Petoskey is known for its historic downtown and the many shopping opportunities it offers. The "Gaslight District" is a collection of more than 100 original,

independent shops, restaurants, and cafes located in downtown Petoskey. "The Village" located in Bay Harbor, offers upscale stores, boutiques, and galleries. South of Petoskey is an area with many big box stores including, Walmart, Meijer, Home Depot, Lowes, etc.

Land Use

Within the Petoskey City Limits, the area is highly developed and can be considered almost completely built out, with the Bay Harbor territory being the primary exception. This general lack of developable property within the City has led to an increase in the population of the surrounding Townships.

- Commercial: The City has two main commercial districts: the historic downtown shopping area and the "strip" commercial area near the convergence of US-31 and US-131. There are also retail amenities located within "The Village" at Bay Harbor.
- Residential: The largest cluster of housing within the older portion of the City is located east of the Bear River, which bisects the older portion of the community from north to south.
- Institutional/Public: Three large public or institutional lands lie within the City's periphery. These properties are: Emmet County Fairgrounds and Greenwood Cemetery, located within the City on its western edge, North Central Michigan College, which occupies a large parcel of land on the City's southern tip, and the Petoskey High School/ Petoskey Middle School campus on the City's eastern side.
- Industrial: While Petoskey does not have a large number of industrial employers, the few properties that are considered to be industrial uses are located along the east banks of the Bear River in the southern portion of the City.
- Recreation/ Open Space: Petoskey has an extensive park system with particularly heavy concentrations along the Lake Michigan shoreline and the Bear River.

Transportation System

The main transportation corridors through Petoskey are US-31 and US-131, both state trunklines, which converge within the City limits and funnel traffic north along the lakeshore. In addition to these highways, the City itself is serviced by a network of 10 miles of major streets and 22 miles of local streets, 44 miles of sidewalks and 10.87 miles of multi-use trails. Roadways within Bay Harbor are privately owned, but serve as City-utility routes.

The Petoskey area has limited public transportation available, primarily to senior citizens and disabled individuals. These include bus services operated by the Friendship Centers of Emmet County, Charlevoix County Transit Authority and the Straits Regional Ride. There is a concerted effort to improve these services through a group known as FEET (Friends Enhancing Emmet Transit). Regional bus transportation is provided by Indian Trails.

Natural Resource Assessment

Hydrology




Figure 2.1 Hydrology and Topography

Considering Petoskey's location along the shoreline of Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay, the area's hydrology is one of its most critical natural resources. Its water resources are also one of its most popular attractions for resorters and visiting tourists. Figure 2.1 provides an overview of the area's hydrology.

- Little Traverse Bay The entire northern edge of the City, including its Bay Harbor territory runs along the Little Traverse Bay shoreline. This shoreline has experienced significant erosion in the past, including losing part of the Little Traverse Wheelway in 2020. Bayfront Park is now protected by revetment stone. Within its lakeshore park system, the City owns Bayfront Park, Solanus Mission Beach and areas to its west, and Magnus Park.
- Bear River The Bear River bisects the older portion of the City from north to south, with its final outlet draining into the Little Traverse Bay. Almost the entire length (80%) of the Bear River Valley is protected as recreational property within the City. Significant improvements to this area have been made in the past to both protect the river's water quality and to offer additional recreational amenities.
- Inland Lakes Bay Harbor Lake is the only inland lake within Petoskey's City limits, but there are several in the surrounding Townships. Crooked, Pickerel, Walloon, and Round Lakes are all located within several miles of Petoskey. Swimming, boating, and fishing are all popular activities on these inland lakes.

Topography

The geology and topology of Petoskey and its surrounding area is typical for communities along the eastern shores of Lake Michigan, particularly in the northern part of the state. These areas were heavily influenced by moraine deposits left during the last Ice Age. In general, Emmet County is characterized by upland moraines with outwash channels dug by the glaciers. Along the lakeshore are steep dunes and ridges.

Near Petoskey, the overall topography is gently rolling with some steeper ridges, particularly along the Lake Michigan shoreline and in the Bear River Valley. The topography rises when moving from north to south, with some particularly steep ridges in the more rural areas such as Bear Creek Township, which has elevations reaching 720 feet above the level of Lake Michigan. These changes in topography can present challenges when designing recreational activities that are universally accessible. This is particularly true along the Lake Michigan waterfront, where it is common to have a steep drop to the water.

Flora and Fauna

Native vegetation in the Petoskey area includes birch, maple, beech, pine (white, red, and jack), and a mixture of other hardwoods. Near the Lake Michigan shoreline, a typical successional dune ecosystem would be present. While development within the City proper has removed much of the natural vegetation, areas along the Bear River and in the Skyline Municipal Forest property in Bear Creek Township continue to maintain larger patches of intact vegetation. Such areas support a variety of wildlife such as deer, fox, mink, coyotes, rabbits, porcupines, and black bear as well as a variety of avian species. Local water resources also provide habitat for a variety of fish species including trout (brown, steelhead, and lake), salmon, whitefish, bass, pan fish, and walleye.

Climate

Petoskey's 4-season climate lends itself to year-round recreational opportunities. The warm summers provide a perfect backdrop for outdoor activities such as boating, golfing, swimming, and water sports. Petoskey's location along the shores of Lake Michigan also provides heavy snowfalls in winter, providing the necessary resources for skiing, snowmobiling, snowshoeing, and other winter sports.

Recreation Administration

Governed by a five-member City Council that consists of four City Councilmembers, all of whom are elected from four separate wards for staggered two-year terms, and the mayor, who is elected at large every 3 years, the City has functioned since 1916 as a council-manager form of local government, with the City Council serving as the community's legislative and policy-making body and the City Manager, who is appointed by and who serves at the pleasure of the City Council, being responsible for implementing policies of the City Council and overseeing the day-to-day operations of the City.

As shown in Table 3.1, the City's Department of Parks and Recreation is one of four departments within the City of Petoskey's organizational structure, the others being the Department of Finance, Department of Public Safety, and Department of Public Works, each of which is headed by a director who is appointed by and reports directly to the City manager. Regional library services also are provided by a public library program that is overseen by a five-member Library Commission whose members are City residents who are appointed by the Mayor for five-year staggered terms.

Also included within the City's organizational structure are Offices of the City Manager; City Assessor; City Clerk; Treasurer (also Director of Finance); and City Planner.


Although numbers of full-time employees fluctuate within the Department of Parks and Recreation, currently the Department is staffed by nine career positions that include; a Director of Parks and Recreation, one Parks and Downtown Lead Supervisor, a Recreation Programmer, Buildings and Grounds Worker, Parks and Special Facilities Supervisor, Special Facilities Supervisor, one Parks and Grounds worker, Parks Maintenance Assistant and an Administrative Assistant shared with the Department of Public Works and Office of City Planner. The number of part-time positions also fluctuates between 15-30. The department also utilizes contracted staff for specialized recreation programs as well as over 100 volunteers annually.

Services provided by the Department of Parks and Recreation consist of those that are common to similar agencies, that is, construction and maintenance of parks and special facilities and programming of recreation and sports activities, but Petoskey's Department of Parks and Recreation also is considered unique in that its staff provides construction and maintenance services associated with all buildings and grounds that are owned and operated by the City and its various departments and Public Library, as well as providing such services that are associated with all public facilities within the community's downtown area, which, for administrative purposes, is considered by the Department of Parks and Recreation staff as a special facility.

Established by City ordinance in 1954 and modified by City Ordinance in 1984, the City's Parks and Recreation Commission consists of seven members, all of whom serve for two-year staggered terms, five of whom are City residents who are appointed by the City Council and two of whom are each appointed by the Bear Creek Township and Resort Township Boards of Trustees (two ex-officio Parks and Recreation Commission members, who do not vote, consist of the City Manager and Community education Director for the Public Schools of Petoskey).

Serving as a planning and advisory body, without executive or administrative authority, the Parks and Recreation Commission oversees development of both short and long-term recreation and sports activity needs of the City and the greater Petoskey service area.





Another City board associated with the City's parks and recreation program is the Tax Increment Finance Authority Board, which was established by City Council resolution in 1985 under provision of Public Act 450 of the Public Acts of Michigan (1980) for an 18-year period. It was re-established for an indefinite time by City Council resolution in 2004. The Board consists of seven members who are appointed to four-year terms by the Mayor with approval of the City Council.

The tax-increment finance authority program serves as the statutory capital-financing mechanism that has been and continues to be used to offset costs of improvements at four development areas within its district: Bayfront Park, along with Sunset Park; the Bear River Valley Recreation Area, along with Mineral Well Park; Magnus Park; and Solanus Mission Beach.

More indirectly involved through their roles in reviewing and/or approving programs, facilities, and/or projects that are overseen by the Department of Parks and Recreation are the City's Planning Commission, Library Commission, Downtown Development Authority Board, Downtown Management Board and the City Council.

Budget and Funding

Funding for parks and recreation services are derived from a variety of sources, with most being accounted for within the City's General Fund although many projects are partially funded with grant dollars. Program categories within this division consist of areas that included buildings and grounds, parks and special facilities, Magnus Park, Bayfront Park Marina, recreation programs, and downtown maintenance.

For the most part the buildings and grounds, parks and special facilities, and downtown maintenance programs are financed with tax monies as their primary sources of revenues, though capital improvements associated with some buildings and grounds and certain parks and special facilities projects would be eligible for funding through the Tax Increment Finance Authority Development Fund.

Magnus Park operations are funded primarily through user fees, though long-planned capital improvements there could be finance by the Tax Increment Finance and Development Fund.

Bayfront Park Marina operations are routinely funded by a restricted account within the General Fund that relies upon rental fees that are charged to seasonal and transient slip users and launch-ramp users, as well as from the sale of fuel and certain commodities. From a policy standpoint, local tax dollars historically have not been used to finance Bayfront Park Marina operations or improvements, but costs for capital projects – and at times, certain repairs- would be eligible for grant-in-aid funding through the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' Waterways Division programs.

Recreation programs are funded through participation fees, which are set at varying rates depending upon the activity and upon City- or non-City resident status, with Bear Creek and Resort Townships providing subsidies based upon participation by residents of their jurisdictions. Certain staff positions associated with recreation programs are supported with property-tax revenues that accrue to the General Fund.

Budget requests are proposed by the Department of Parks and Recreation staff, with the Director of Parks and Recreation providing information to the Director of Finance and the City Manager. The City Manager ultimately provides a proposed City-wide budget to the City Council in November prior to the start of the City's next fiscal year on January 1. Such budget proposals include requested expenditures for both operations and capital needs, with forecasts of revenue that would be used to offset such costs.

Table 3.2 outlines the Department of Parks and Recreation categories within the General Fund and Tax Increment Finance Authority Fund budgets for 2022 and 2023.

Key Relationships

It is believed that intergovernmental relationships have enhanced the City's abilities to offer good parks and facilities, and to provide a high level of recreation and sports programming. Working with a consultant, staff members who represented the County of Emmet, North Central Michigan College, Public Schools of Petoskey, and City prepared in 1997 the "Community Educational and Recreational Master Plan for Southern Emmet County" that assisted in identifying facilities and providing recommended joint solutions. Following the long-standing model of cooperation between the Petoskey Public Schools of Petoskey and the City, which has entailed the City installing recreation facilities on property that is owned by the School District with sharing of such facilities, usually on a seasonal basis (that is, used primarily by the School District during the school season and by the City in the summer), and with sharing of costs for maintaining and repairing these facilities. Such additional arrangements were developed between the School District and City and similar first-time arrangements were planned for the County and City and the College and City.

Public Schools of Petoskey

For many years, City-owned athletic facilities have been used by the Public Schools of Petoskey for the school district's sports program and school district owned facilities, usually gymnasiums within school buildings, have been used by the City for its recreation programs. More than 30 years ago, outdoor tennis courts, baseball/softball fields, and related amenities were installed by the City at the school district's high-school-middle-school campus. Following preparation of the 1997 Community Educational and Recreational Master Plan for Southern Emmet County, the City installed additional tennis courts and upgraded a related service building and baseball fields there.

North Central Michigan College

Also following preparation of the 1997 Master Plan, the North Central Michigan College Board of Trustees authorized a lease agreement with the City Council (at \$1 per year) for installation of Bates Park, a Little League baseball complex with associated amenities at the College campus. The College and City staff continues discussion concerning the creation of links between the College campus and the City's adjacent River Road Sports Complex using a Bear River crossing as part of a potential inter-connected greenway system throughout and around Petoskey. Currently, North Central Michigan College offers recreation programs, many of which serve Petoskey's elderly population, in conjunction with operation of its recently developed multi-purpose complex. Future recreational needs listed within the 1997 Master Plan might also be met through the College's potential construction of a pool facility as part of the multi-purpose complex.

The County of Emmet

The County of Emmet and City of Petoskey share a long history of intergovernmental cooperation. The County's recent establishment of its own parks and recreation program and enhanced parks-related and community-use facilities probably will continue these long-standing County-City joint efforts in this area as well.

Bear Creek and Resort Townships

City-provided recreation and sports programs, along with their related facilities, are shared with neighboring Bear Creek and Resort Townships. Since 1980, agreements have been in place that permit residents of the two Townships to participate in City-sponsored recreation and sports programs at City-resident rates, with the differential between in-City and out-City charges being paid by the Townships, based upon actual participation by residents of the Townships. The City is solely responsible however for all the costs associated with planning, developing, operating, maintaining, and replacing parks and recreational facilities.

Other Organizations

In addition to the relationships described above, the City and its Department of Parks and Recreation routinely interact with a variety of other agencies and organizations, including but not limited to:

Planning Process

The process for this Master Plan update began with the Parks and Recreation Commission accepting the responsibility to represent the Steering Committee. The Committee reviewed the current plan and worked with staff to develop a public input process. After receiving the public input from the workshops and questionnaires, the committee updated goals, objectives and implementation strategies for the plan. Staff then worked on the draft document and began the review and approval process, including forwarding the draft to adjoining townships, Emmet County and Networks Northwest. The Planning Commission reviewed and provided recommendation on the plan, followed by a public hearing held by the Parks and Recreation Commission and adoption of an approval resolution. A final resolution was then passed by City Council.

In addition to the incorporation of public input, the plan process involved the collection and analysis of data, documentation of current conditions and establishment of goals, objectives and strategies for the next five years.

Community, Administration, and Recreation Analysis

Analysis and documentation of community demographics, material resources, and administrative structure was conducted by City Staff during the summer of 2022. As part of this analysis, annual budgets and capital-outlay proposals, as well as the City's Tax Increment Financing and Development Plans, the City of Petoskey Master Plan of 2021, Emmet County Parks and Recreation Plan 2018 and North Central Michigan College Master Plan of 2019 were reviewed. Data from several sources was incorporated, including the US Census 2020, the American Community Survey 5-year estimates (2011-2015), and GIS layers provided by Emmet County.

Recreation Inventory

A thorough inventory of existing recreational facilities and programs was conducted. This inventory included not only City facilities, but also those of the Public Schools of Petoskey, North Central Michigan College, County of Emmet, adjacent Townships and the larger region. Methods of conducting this inventory included personal observation and documentation of all Petoskey recreational facilities supplemented by other references that included the City's program participation annual reports and the current Parks and Recreation Master Plan, and the Emmet County Recreation Plan.

Public Input

Public input regarding Petoskey's recreational needs was collected through several methods. The input received is included in Appendix A.

1. Parks and Recreation Master Plan Open House and On-Line Survey

An open house was held in City Hall from 9:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. on September 28 and October 6 for the public to provide input on existing park and recreation facilities and services and provide recommendations for the future. Additionally, there was an on-line survey available on the City website and also promoted through the Petoskey Regional Chamber of Commerce, through a press release and social media channels. The City received 230 responses between the two opportunities.

2. User Participation and Feedback via Recreational Programs, Leagues, Associations and Service Clubs.

City staff interacts on a daily basis with the general public, as well as participants in the various programs and park users, and this "informal" input was also incorporated into the plan. In addition, evaluations will be performed at the end of recreation programs to gather additional feedback.

- 3. Discussions with Representatives of Local Government Agencies.
 - Staff members of the Public Schools of Petoskey and North Central Michigan College, as well as members of the City's Parks and Recreation Commission, Tax Increment Finance Authority Board, Downtown Management Board, Planning Commission, and City Council provide a voice for opinions of local residents. These staff, board and commission members are aware of resident concerns and ideas, and are responsible for communicating them as part of ongoing planning.

Documentation of Goals, Objectives, Inputs and Implementation Plans

Based on input received through the process, including questionnaires, public workshops, discussions with other agencies and recreation providers and review of current plans, the plan goals, objectives and strategies were drafted and are included in Chapter 7.

This chapter presents a detailed inventory and analysis of all recreation facilities and programs within the City of Petoskey. The inventory was updated based on park visits by City staff during the summer of 2022. It also presents a general overview of recreational and open space opportunities within Emmet County and adjacent townships, the information for which was collected from the Emmet County Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

Map 5.1 illustrates the many park and recreation facilities available in the City of Petoskey, while Table 5.1 provides a summary of park amenities and Table 5.2 provides a detailed narrative of these facilities.


City Facilities

Table 5.2 provides a summary of the recreational facilities and amenities that are available in the City of Petoskey's parks system and an individual analysis of each park. Each of these analyses includes the following characteristics:

- Size
- Location
- Description
- Amenities
- Facility Evaluation
- Barrier-Free Evaluation

In addition to the City-owned and other recreational properties, this inventory includes facilities operated and utilized jointly by the City of Petoskey and the Public Schools of Petoskey. A prime example of this partnership is the Petoskey High School-Middle School campus, where the land was provided by the school district and certain outdoor facilities were built by the City. These facilities are now operated jointly as parts of both the school and park systems. Some of the other educational facilities, such as the local elementary schools, do not have equipment specifically funded or operated by the City's parks system, but allow for public use of their outdoor recreation facilities during non-school hours.

ARLINGTON PARK

Size: 2.5 Acres

Location:

Fronting US-31 and Lewis Street, between US-31, Rose Street, Arlington Avenue, and Winter Park Lane.

Description:

Arlington Park is a small, formal park near downtown Petoskey close to the historic Stafford's Perry Hotel and the Penn Plaza,

a former historic railroad depot. It serves as an entryway to the City's downtown core, as well as a location for picnics, strolling, and educational gardens.

Amenities:

- Gazebo
- Rail passenger platform with intermodal drop-off/pick-up area
- Site Furnishings
- Historical Marker
- Napoleon Howitzer Confederate Cannon

Facility Evaluation:

The park is in excellent condition with educational gardens, a gazebo, rail passenger platform and stairway, and

accompanying site furnishings. The park hosts several historical markers and has on display a rare, restored cannon built by Augusta Arsenal Foundry of Augusta, Georgia around 1864. The park's location give it scenic views of Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay, although access to the waterfront and other nearby parks, such as Sunset Park and Bayfront Park below, are impeded by traffic on US-31 and steep bluffs adjacent to the waterfront in this location; however, a pedestrian cross walk was added to provide access to Sunset Park with the reconfiguration of Lewis Street with US-31 improvements in 2019.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 3

An "at-grade" sidewalk provides barrier-free access into the park. The education gardens could be improved by providing several additional raised gardens that would better accommodate wheel chair access.





BATES PARK

Size: 7 acres

Location:

1519 Howard Street (on property leased by the City from North Central Michigan College)

Description:

Bate Park was constructed in 1999 and open since 2000 as a modern baseball facility. It provides practice, game and tournament facilities for Little League, youth, and girls softball. It also hosts school groups who use the property for physical education classes.

Amenities:

- Two regulation Little League fields
- One softball/multi-purpose field
- Concession facility
- Score booth
- Restrooms
- Storage area/garage
- Picnic area
- Batting cage
- Parking lot

Facility Evaluation:

This complex provides excellent baseball and softball facilities, which are currently in high demand. It was developed on property leased for 35 years from North Central Michigan College by the City. If future park expansion is desired, additional land could be leased to accommodate new facilities.

Barrier-Free Evaluation:

At the time of construction the facility meets all guidelines for universal accessibility. It includes ramps and barrier-free access to all fields and amenities. It also provides a designated parking lot adjacent to the ball field reserved for handicap parking and maintenance vehicles. Enforcement of this parking area should be monitored to discourage its use as a drop-off and temporary parking area by officials, players, and players' families.

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BAYFRONT PARK

Size: 25 acres

Location:

Along Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay from west of Ingalls Avenue near the Solanus Mission to south of and adjacent to Belle Avenue to US-31 east of Stuart Avenue

Description:

This former industrial site was reclaimed as a linear park featuring 7800 feet of public shoreline on scenic Little

Traverse Bay. The park features various facilities and amenities. It is well maintained and provides varied uses for Petoskey residents. It is considered one of the "jewels" of the Petoskey park system.

Amenities:

- Central Promenade •
- Midway Commons
- Tunnel beneath US-31 linking Bayfront Park to downtown
- Resource Center (currently leased to the Little Traverse Bay Ferry Company), meeting room, food concession, and public restrooms
- Fred Friedli Children's Playground (New equipment installed 2006)
- Ed White Field tournament-class softball field
- Little Traverse Historical Society History Museum in former historic railroad depot (social history)
- Display gazebo (transportation history)
- Marina, with 144 boat wells for transient and seasonal users. Bboat launch, fishing pier, cooking shelter, services building
- Stair tower to Sunset Park and stairway to Liberty Street
- Waterfall •
- East Bowl Area that includes pond, fishing pier, arboretum and public restrooms
- City Hall complex, includes public restrooms
- Festival Place with pavilion and cooking area
- Little Traverse Wheelway throughout length of park •
- Parking areas •

Facility Evaluation:

The existing facilities at Bayfront Park are well maintained and have relatively few issues that need immediate attention. Some areas, particularly in the arboretum and along the waterfront, are experiencing erosion and sedimentation issues that need to be addressed. The stairway connection between Bayfront and Sunset Parks was upgraded in 2020.

Barrier Free Evaluation: 3

The majority of the park is universally accessible.





BEAR RIVER VALLEY RECREATION AREA

Size: 36 acres, 1.5 miles in length

Location:

Along the Bear River from Lake Street south to Standish Avenue

Description:

The rustic Bear River Valley is characterized by steep bluffs, woodlands, wetlands, open space areas and its dominant feature the Bear River with its white water rapids. The park is

and railways crisscrossing the valley. Today the dams have been removed and nature has reclaimed much of the valley. In 2010, a major development project was undertaken in the river valley that provided access to adjacent neighborhoods, improved hiking trails and multi-use trails, protected wetlands, added restrooms, picnic shelters and parking areas, and enhanced the white-water features of the river.

Amenities:

- Two foot-bridges spanning the river
- Improved hiking trails with boardwalks
- Parking areas and access
- Pedestrian access points
- Stair tower access with river overlook at Elizabeth Street
- Restrooms
- Two picnic shelters
- Intermediate and beginner whitewater area
- 1.1 Mile non-motorized concrete trail
- Storm water management improvements
- Landscaping

Facility Evaluation:

The Bear River Valley Recreation Area underwent extensive upgrades in 2010. Crushed stone hiking trails were developed the entire length, board walks were constructed in sensitive areas, an additional pedestrian bridge and stair tower were added, two universally accessible picnic shelters and a restroom facility were constructed and a 10-foot concrete non-motorized trail was built. In addition, several stairways were constructed to improve access to adjacent neighborhoods and two parking lots were added. Whitewater improvements included creation of eddie-outs and launch points along the Bear River. The improvements have re-introduced the community to the river valley's natural setting and high water quality, making it one of the City's most popular parks. All facilities are in excellent condition.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 3

The 2010 development project focused on improving accessibility to the Bear River Valley. The accessible non-motorized trail can be accessed from parking areas near Lake Street at the north end and Sheridan Street at the south end. All restrooms and shelters comply with ADA regulations.

Size: 1.7 acres



Description:

Play area and athletic facilities associated with school grounds.

Amenities:

- Play structures
- Basketball court
- Multi-purpose field
- Outdoor amphitheater
- Tether ball
- Indoor gymnasium (used by City)
- Benches







LINCOLN SCHOOL (Public Schools of Petoskey)

Size: 2 acres

Location: 616 Connable Avenue

Description:

Play equipment and athletic facilities associated with school grounds.

Amenities:

- Play structures
- Basketball Court
- Indoor gymnasium (used by the City)
- Benches



COMMUNITY GARDENS

Petoskey Community Victory Garden at Hungry Hollow

Size: Half Acre

Location:

West Sheridan Street, between Clarion Avenue and Spring Street

Description:

The former residential area had become vacant property with the demolition of the structures. The land was converted to a community garden in 2010, and had 38 family plots for residents of Petoskey. The garden is managed by Farming for our Future, a not-for-profit organization.



Amenities:

• 38 family garden plots

Facility Evaluation:

The gardens provide a means for residents to have garden space to grow their own vegetable or flowers, addressing an increasing interest in locally-grown produce. The garden has room to grow if interest increases.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 1 Access to the gardens is not barrier free.

CURTIS PARK

Size: 7.8 acres

Location:

Fronting Curtis and Jarman Avenues between Morgan and Lawrence Streets

Description:

This neighborhood park consists of open grassy areas interrupted only by mature deciduous and coniferous vegetation. The park's relatively flat topography slopes gently toward the east. The lack of formal amenities results in its use as a neighborhood picnic location, or occasionally as an informal, overflow sports field.

Amenities:

- Picnic tables
- Grills •
- Open area serving as temporary playing fields

Facility Evaluation:

This relatively large parcel of open space within an existing residential area provides a "green oasis" for neighborhood picnics and unstructured play. Other than a few picnic tables and trash receptacles, no formal park amenities exist. The relatively large grassy areas occasionally have been used as overflow soccer fields. Although there would be potential for adding improved recreational multi-purpose playing field at the park while retaining existing mature trees, residents near the park have been opposed to further field improvements. In 2004, the City Council directed that "facilities that would accommodate organized-sports activities not be constructed at Curtis Park." Many of the existing trees have reached maturity and are in decline however a variety of trees have been planted over the last several years to improve the overall forestry of the park.

Barrier-Free Evaluation:

There are no formal access points or sidewalks provided to or within the park, nor are there any barrierfree parking spaces or restroom facilities; accessibility is poor.



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LIBRARY COURTYARD PARKS

Size: one-half acre, combined.

Location:

The new Petoskey Public Library located at 500 East Mitchell Street. The old public library, now known at the Carnegie Building, is located at 451 East Mitchell Street.

Description:

The Department of Parks and Recreation maintains the grounds and courtyards at these facilities as "vest-pocket" parks within the downtown area. The elevated courtyard at the Public Library at 500 East Mitchell Street

has formal landscaping to compliment the building's architecture and the courtyard's main feature is the Community labyrinth constructed with paver bricks. The labyrinth also functions as a patio area.

Amenities:

Main Library Courtyard

- Flag Pole
- Stone Benches
- Labyrinth
- Landscaping
- Picnic tables
- Public art

Carnegie Building Courtyard:

- Landscaping
- Sidewalks
- Grass patio areas

Facility Evaluation:

Both courtyard areas have accessible walkways for the general public and landscape plantings that complement the buildings' architecture.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 4 Both buildings and courtyard have universal accessibility.

LITTLE TRAVERSE WHEELWAY

Size: 23.4 miles in length (8 miles within the City limits)

Location:

The multi-jurisdictional trail located within the Counties of Emmet and Charlevoix begins near the eastern limits of the City of Charlevoix and extends east and north to the City of Harbor Springs, along the shore of Little Traverse Bay.

Description:

This paved multi-jurisdictional, non-motorized trail connects the communities along Little Traverse Bay including the Cities of Charlevoix, Petoskey and Harbor Springs. The trail location adjacent to Little Traverse Bay provides users with scenic vistas as well as access to the bay at public parks. The City maintains the 8 miles of trail

from Townline Road to the west to near Boulder Lane at the east end. The trail also connects to the Bear River Valley Recreation Area trail system and connects to the Downtown Greenway Corridor nonmotorized trail. A portion of the Wheelway coincides with the North Country Scenic Trail. In 2020 a slope failure along with high water destroyed a section of the Wheelway forcing a closure between Magnus Park and East Park.

Amenities:

• Paved bike trail, benches, picnic areas, restrooms in public parks

Facility Evaluation:

This paved, non-motorized trail is an excellent asset that attracts both local and regional outdoor enthusiasts. The trail traverses several city parks and provides a pedestrian tunnel link to Petoskey's shopping district. Portions of the trail are over 20 years of age and paving will need periodic replacement.

Barrier-Free Evaluation:

Concrete and asphalt paving provides a universally accessible surface as do curb cuts at road crossings. Connections to existing parks provide accessibility to restrooms and other amenities.

LOCKWOOD PARK

Size: 2.8 acres

Location:

Northeast corner of Lockwood Avenue and Spruce Street

Description:

Lockwood Park is a relatively small neighborhood park on a hilltop site that contains a City-owned underground water-storage reservoir. It includes a ball field, one-half basketball court, two mini-soccer fields, and a large open space area used by neighborhood children for unstructured play.

Amenities:

- Softball field
- Two mini-soccer fields
- Basketball court (1/2)
- Informal sledding hill

Facility Evaluation:

Lockwood Park represents a neighborhood/community park, primarily serving local children and organizations using the ball field (U-10 softball). There are no formal play structures and relatively few amenities outside of the playing fields. The vegetation along the park's perimeter is in decline and in need of replacement. Because of the park's use for team sports, a play area might be considered. In addition, perhaps in conjunction with future water-utility improvements at the site, restroom facilities should also be considered.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 2

Two curb cuts provide access to the park. The portable restroom facilities are also accessible. While the existing bleachers are not accessible, there is an area for wheelchair seating behind the backstop.



MAGNUS PARK

Size: 21.2 acres

Location:

Along the Lake Michigan shoreline at the west end of West Lake Street with upper-elevation areas fronting Jackson Street and US-31 (Charlevoix Avenue).

Description:

Magnus Park is located along 1,000 feet of Little Traverse Bay shoreline. Lower Magnus Park has a 76 site campground, day use area, playground, beach area and restroom facility. The Little Traverse Wheelway runs along the north shoreline of the park. Upper Magnus Park bluff area provides scenic views to Little Travers Bay at the Wayside Park overlook.

Amenities:


- Beach area
- Day-use parking area
- 76 campsites
- Children's play structure
- Bathhouse
- Office and shop buildings
- Fire rings
- Cottage
- Paved, non-motorized trail
- Outdoor shower

Facility Evaluation:

Magnus Park is an older facility and its age is reflected in the quality of some of its amenities. Several of the buildings are in decline and in need of remodeling and/or replacement. The utility system is in need of upgrading as the modern RV's need more amps and water supply. Roadways and parking areas are in poor condition, and the beach area is in need of sand replacement. Despite these maintenance issues, the park is often at capacity and provides easy access to the waterfront and outstanding views of Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay. The Little Traverse Wheelway runs along the north end of the park. The city's adjacent wastewater treatment plant should be screened from the park's view.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 3

A uni-sex restroom adjacent to the main building provides a universally-accessible restroom. There are also several campsites that include ADA-compliant picnic tables and grills. Many upgrades have been done over the last several years that include; cabin remodel, outdoor shower, fencing, site improvements, bathroom counters, and partitions.







MEMORIAL PARK

Size: 0.5 acres

Location:

Fronting north side of US-31 between East Lake and East Mitchell Streets

Description:

Memorial Park is a small parcel that serves primarily as a "scenic" gateway in the downtown area. It consists of formal landscaping and a set of flagpoles.

Amenities:

- Three flagpoles
- Formal landscaping
- Sidewalk

Facility Evaluation:

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While the formal landscaping in this area creates an aesthetic entrance to the downtown area, it is in need of some maintenance. Because it is intended to be a visual amenity, rather than an active recreation location, there are no facilities, per se.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 2

A sidewalk provides pedestrian access to the area. No other amenities exist that would require special access.

MINERAL WELL PARK

Size: 1.5 acres

Location:

South side of East and West Lake Street between Bayfront Drive and Quaintance Avenue

Description:

This formal historic park is located at the transition between Bayfront Park and the Bear River Valley Recreation Area. Historic features include a 1917 pavilion, 1930s Mitchell Street Bridge, World War I monument, and a raised formal garden. The setting is enhanced by the proximity of the Bear River and the coffer-dam falls.

Amenities:

- Pavilion
- Picnic tables and grills
- Mineral Well fountain
- World War I memorial
- Formal Peace Pole
- Furnishings
- Access to Bear River fishing
- Access to Bear River Valley trails

Facility Evaluation:

Mineral Well Park is an attractive site directly across from the City Hall. Its historic pavilion, garden area, and mineral well fountain provide unique aesthetic appeal. Being adjacent to the Bear River provides convenient access for fishing and creates scenic views of the river and the Mitchell Street Bridge to the south. Periodic restoration of the pavilion is needed to maintain its appearance.

Barrier-Free Evaluation:

Cooking grills need to be replaced or lowered to accommodate barrier-free accessibility. Although the park appears to contain a drinking fountain that is not accessible, the structure is actually an exact replica of a historic mineral well fountain and is not intended to be used as a drinking fountain (the natural mineral water is not particularly palatable).

NORTH CENTRAL MICHIGAN COLLEGE

Size: 256 acres

Location: 1515 Howard Street

Description:

North Central Michigan College (NCMC) owns approximately 265 acres of property with the College Campus located on the northerly portion of the property. A major portion of the college property south of the campus is largely undeveloped and utilized as a natural area with trails and boardwalks. It is adjacent to the City's River Road Sports Complex with the two properties being separated by the Bear River. Immediately east of the campus, on land leased from the college by the City, lies the City's Bates Park complex. The main campus area has several recreational components operated by the college that include outdoor basketball courts and a large multi-purpose recreational facility that is programmed for its students and the community.

Amenities:

- Natural area with trails
- Outdoor Basketball courts
- Student Activities/Community Recreation Center
 - Multi-purpose gymnasium
 - Walking/Running track
 - Exercise equipment
 - Locker rooms
 - Concession
- Bate Park-City Operated
 - o One softball field
 - Two little league fields
 - Restroom/ Support building

Facility Evaluation:

The college property and facility is well maintained. Buildings and connecting walks are universally accessible.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 5

Buildings, walks, and parking areas provide universal accessibility.





OTTAWA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL (Public Schools of Petoskey)

Size: 9.5 acres

Location: 871 Kalamazoo Avenue

Description:

Play equipment and athletic facilities associated with school grounds

Amenities:

- Play structure
- Ball Diamond
- Sundial/story time area
- Indoor gymnasium (used by the City)
- Outdoor Basketball Court

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SHERIDAN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL (Public Schools of Petoskey)

Size: 5 acres

Location: 1415 Howard Street

Description:

Play equipment and athletic facilities associated with school grounds.

Amenities:

- Play structure
- Basketball court
- Indoor gymnasium (used by the City)



PENNSYLVANIA PARK

Size: 2.7 acres

Location:

Downtown Petoskey, along the former railroad corridor between Bay and Mitchell Streets.

Description:

Located in the heart of downtown Petoskey, Pennsylvania Park is a formal, well maintained "commons" area with a historic setting. This wide, but linear, park pleasantly links northern and southern portions of the central business district and provides a pleasant contrast to the urban streetscape. Due to its prime location and scenic atmosphere, it is well-used as a resting area for shoppers and downtown workers, as well as a location for picnics, concerts, community gatherings, festivals, and special events. Pennsylvania Park lies within the Downtown Greenway Corridor.

Amenities:

- Gazebo
- Public restrooms (at Petoskey Regional Chamber of Commerce office)
- Civil War memorial
- World War II and Korean Conflict memorials

- Vietnam War memorial
- Operation Desert Storm memorial

Facility Evaluation:

While it continues to be a high-quality facility, Pennsylvania Park shows signs of its heavy use in some areas. Some of the vegetation is in decline and in need of replacement, particularly the trees and areas of turf where pedestrian "desired paths" have destroyed the grass. In 2019 the downtown restrooms were remodeled to serve more people and also added a family bathroom. Although furnishings currently exist, they do not particularly complement the Victorian style of the central business district.

Barrier-Free Evaluation:

Sidewalks adjacent to the length of the park provide universal access. Picnic facilities should be upgraded to include ADA-compliant tables and benches.

PETOSKEY HIGH SCHOOL-MIDDLE SCHOOL RECREATIONAL COMPLEX (Public Schools of Petoskey)

Size: 15 acres

Location:

1500 Hill Street (High School) and 801 Northmen Drive (Middle School)

Description:

This recreational complex is located in the northwest corner of the Petoskey High School-Middle School campus. While 15 acres currently are developed with recreational amenities, an additional 90 acres remain undeveloped. This complex contains a variety of playing fields and equipment to support several school sports teams, as well as other public use during the summer months. Several of the facilities are jointly owned by the Public Schools of Petoskey and the City of Petoskey. Primarily, the school district owns the properties and the City provides funding for facility installations, often with grant-in-aid assistance. Use of facilities is prioritized according to the season – that is, during the school year, the school district has primary use of the facilities, and during the summer months the facilities are used by the City for the general public. Costs for replacements or upgrading of facilities, such as relighting and repaving tennis courts, have been shared equally between the school district and city. Turcott Field was reconstructed on the school complex, creating a state of the art facility. In support of these High School-Middle School campus facilities, the Public Schools of Petoskey also own the Curtis Field (formerly used as the stadium) and nearby McLaughlin Field on Standish Avenue.

Amenities:

City-owned facilities include:

- Twelve tennis courts (six lighted and six unlighted)
- Baseball field (Turcott)
- Two concession, restroom, and storage buildings

School District-owned facilities include:

- Four combination football/soccer practice fields
- Band practice field
- Two multi-level gymnasiums (used by the City for recreation programs)
- One single-level gymnasium (used by the City for recreation programs)
- Northmen Field
- Softball Field
- Cross-country trail system



QUARRY PARK

Size: 2.5 acres

Location:

Fronting US-31, Lewis Street, and Rose Street east of Howard Street (as extended)

Description:

This former limestone quarry was redeveloped as a parcel of open green space adjacent to Arlington Park at the edge of Petoskey's downtown business district. It is located near the historic Stafford's Perry Hotel and offers dramatic views of Little Traverse Bay from its bluffs. In 2005, the City Council authorized installation of statue honoring Ignatius Petoskey, the community's namesake, a gift from a former Petoskey resident.



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Amenities:

- Open Space
- Ignatius Petoskey statue

Facility Evaluation:

This park is primarily intended to provide a scenic view of Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay. This area's steep topography prevents it from being a suitable location for many specific park amenities. It is maintained as an open, grassy area with little formal landscaping. The realignment of Lewis Street established a T-intersection with US-31 and a sidewalk with crosswalk to Arlington Park.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 2

Access to the Ignatius Petoskey statue is barrier free. Remaining areas of the park do not contain specific amenities that would require accessibility for pedestrians. It is instead intended to be primarily a scenic vista.

RIVER ROAD SPORTS COMPLEX

Size: 91 acres

Location:

East side of River Road just south of Standish Avenue to south City Limit

Description:

The River Road Sports Complex has very little topographic relief. The northern half of the park is intermixed with wetlands and grassy vegetative plains. Vegetation is Dogwoods and bush-type shrubs intermixed with poplar and random conifers

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and grasslands. The southern half of the park has been developed into sports field with an underground drainage system. The soccer and softball fields are used by the City's recreation programs, the high school programs and community club sports. The park on its eastern edge is bordered by the Bear River its entire length. In 2021 the Bear River Iron Belle Bridge was installed that connects the North Central Michigan College land on the opposite side of the river, connecting miles of hiking trails through its nature preserve. The park also has a 24-hole disc-golf course.

Amenities:

- One softball field
- Two regulation soccer fields
- One temporary soccer field
- Disc-golf course
- Cross-country ski/hiking trails
- Picnic tables
- Portable restrooms
- Parking lot and drive
- Snowmobile trail crosses the park
- Bear River Iron Belle Bridge crossing
- North Country Trail

Facility Evaluation:

The River Road Sports Complex is geared toward organized, active sport and provides a trail system that runs through the northern wetland area of the park for more passive uses such as hiking, cross-country skiing, show-shoeing, and wildlife viewers. The sports complex portion of the park has limited shade trees and lacks shelters where visitors or spectators could escape the summer sun or heat. The sports fields are in excellent condition, with the exception of the practice soccer field that could benefit from underground drainage and additional grading.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 2

While no sidewalks exist within the park, there are no barriers per se from the parking area to the use areas. The parking lot also includes the necessary reserve spaces. Park amenities, such as the spectator seating and portable restroom facilities, provide access, as required by ADA regulations.

RIVERBEND PARK

Size: 2.5 acres

Location:

West side of Standish Avenue south of and fronting the Bear River and adjacent to the Public Schools of Petoskey's Curtis Field

Description:

This small, triangular-shaped property is bordered by the Bear River, Curtis Field, and the Michigan Department of Transportation-owned railroad right-of-way. Facilities include a 10,000 square foot skate park, skate board surf

and landscaped turf areas for passive uses. A trail segment of the North Country National Scenic Trail also extends through the park along the banks of the river, connecting to the Bear River Valley Recreation Area.

The park is accessible both by the City's sidewalk system and vehicle. Accessible sidewalks, paved parking area, and the skateboard park were constructed in 2007 and are showing signs of wear. A restroom and shelter were completed in 2011. In 2020 two dedicated pickleball courts were installed. The skate park amenities are in need of upgrades.

Barrier-Free Evaluation

Sidewalks, parking area, pickleball courts, skate park and the restrooms/ shelter are all ADA accessible

SKYLINE MUNICIPAL FOREST (Natural Resource Area)

Size: 865 acres

Location:

Bear Creek Township (T34N R5W, Sections 22-26), with vehicular access off of Krause and Brukaer Roads

Description:

This large, forested property consists of mixed hardwoods, poplar and conifer forest stands intermixed with open grass land and provides excellent habitat for a variety of



wildlife. The Skyline Municipal Forest property is located adjacent to large tracts of state forest property and several tracts of land owned by Emmett County. This highland forest property has significant topographic relief between its ridgeline and valleys and is one of the highest points in Emmet County. In 2009 the City acquired a critical connector with the help of a Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund grant in cooperation with the Little Traverse Conservancy. The purchase enabled the relocation of a section of the National Parks Service North Country National Scenic Trail from Krause Road onto City park land. The property also hosts a firearm range for public safety personnel but it is available for use by the general public.

Amenities:

- Woodlands
- Trail system
- Firing range
- Observation deck

Facility Evaluation:

The skyline Municipal Forest is largely undeveloped and is managed for passive recreation and forestry purposes. Access to the area is from several perimeter gravel roads and the interior is accessible by only seasonal roads and trails. Several areas in the park have sustained erosion damage due to unauthorized off-road vehicular use.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 1 Because it is an undeveloped parcel, no provisions are made for universal access.

SOLANUS MISSION BEACH

Size: One acre

Location:

Along Lake Michigan shoreline west of Ingalls Avenue and contiguous with Bayfront Park West

Description:

This 500 foot long lake front parcel, with its stony, dune-like environment, abuts a small cove on Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay. The southern portion of the property was landscaped in 2006 and is traversed by the Little Traverse Wheelway by an easement that extends from Bayfront Park West and then connects back to Lake Street along the west side of the Saint Francis Xavier Church's Solanus Mission property. An overlook deck, accessible boardwalk and concrete sidewalk



was added in 2022 with the support of a Coastal Management Grant.

Amenities:

- Beach area
- Open space
- Little Traverse Wheelway segment
- Overlook deck
- Accessible boardwalk and mobility mat
- Sidewalk leading to the boardwalk

Facility Evaluation:

The access to the beach is universally accessible as is the Little Traverse Wheelway that runs across the south side of the property.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 4 Trail segments are universally accessible.

SUNSET PARK


Size: One acre

Location:

Fronting US-31 at Winter Park Lane, above Bayfront Park

Description:

Included as part of Bayfront Park, or development Area #1 within the City's 1985 Tax Increment Financing and Development Plans, this roadside park is situated on top of the bluff that separate Bayfront Park from US-31. It provides outstanding views of Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay and of Bayfront Park below. Because its primary purpose is for a scenic vista, the park amenities focus on



Amenities:

- Turn-around drive and parking area
- Gazebo
- Binoculars
- Drinking fountain
- Stair tower to Bayfront Park

Facility Evaluation:

Patrons arriving by automobile have good access directly off US-31. Pedestrians can access via cross walk connecting Arlington Park, a sidewalk along US-31 and from Bayfront Park using the stairtower. While the park serves its primary purpose quite well – that is, as a scenic vista – its amenities could benefit from some upgrades, particularly to some of the walkways. In 2020 the original wood stair tower that connects Sunset Park to Bayfront Park was removed and replaced with a steel structure.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 2

There are several obstacles in the gazebo and binocular-viewing area; the gazebo has a small grade change that prevents universal access. Also, the binoculars are too tall for a patron in a wheelchair to access. The drinking fountain is also not ADA-compliant. ADA-compliant picnic tables with accompanying sidewalks also need to be added to the existing facilities.



VETERANS PARK

Size: 0.25 acre

Location:

West Mitchell Street (US 31) at Madison Street

Description:

This triangular-shaped site provides a greenbelt landscape area along the south side of West Mitchell Street/ US31 and contains a large community service group sign.

Amenities:

- Service-club sign
- Flagpole

Facility Evaluation:



This greenspace is highly visible to motorists along US-31 and with changes to US 31 in 2014, pedestrian access was greatly improved. All war memorials have been removed. The only other feature of this park is the service club sign, which is in need of upgrading or replacement. Additional tree planting would also be beneficial.

Barrier-Free Evaluation:

Sidewalks along US-31 and Madison Street provide access to the area. There are no specific amenities within the park that require modifications to insure universal access.

WASHINGTON PARK

Size: 5 acres

Location:

At dead ends of Petoskey Street south of Washington Street and north of Sheridan Street, between Emmet and Howard Streets

Description:

This park primarily attracts neighborhood children and participants associated with the use of softball and Little League programs that use the facility. Outside the ball field and children's play structure, there are few amenities that might serve as a draw for park patrons.

Amenities:

- Ball field
- Children's playground
- Portable restrooms
- Small, unpaved parking area

Facility Evaluation:

Washington Park is a relatively small neighborhood park that could improve its use level if additional amenities were provided. The ball field used to attract youth soft ball and Little League teams for practice but the old fence was removed. The field is still used for occasional practice. The park has unique topography and adequate open space. Vehicular access is currently provided via an unpaved extension of Petoskey Street to the north and a small unimproved parking area at the dead end of Petoskey Street to the south. These poor access points, combined with limited parking areas, make vehicular access to the park difficult.

Barrier-Free Evaluation:

Entry into the park from the south side is barrier-free; however, entry from the north is complicated by the existence of a gravel driveway, a material that is not universally accessible. Additional access barriers are found in the ball field itself; the fence openings near the infield are too narrow and the bleachers do not allow adequate space for a wheel chair in front. The children's play structure is ADA-compliant and provides play activities with suitable surface materials and transfer points.

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WINTER SPORTS PARK

Size: 30 acres

Location:

South ends of Winter Park Lane and Rose Street

Description:

Winter Sports Park is an excellent year-round facility, which was extensively renovated in 1992. Although primarily designed for winter sports (skiing, sledding, skating, and hockey), it also has soccer and basketball facilities and hosts a popular summer day camp program. It is located in a bowl-shaped valley that is subject to erosion and other effects due to the topography.

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Amenities:

- Sledding hill
- Hiking Trails
- Skating rink
- Hockey rink
- Multi-Use field
- Basketball hoops (3 half-courts along parking area)
- Warming house and concession building
- Biking and walking trails
- Paved parking area
- Outdoor park amenities lighted for nighttime use

Facility Evaluation:

In general, the facilities at the park are in good condition. The largest issue from a maintenance perspective is the need for erosion-control measures and bank-stabilization installation due to the rather steep topography. The basketball courts, located within the paved parking area, are informal and do not have permanent court markings. Parking lot is not lined and needs dedicated handicapped spaces.

Barrier-Free Evaluation: 2

The building and parking areas both provide universal access to all amenities.

Township Facilities

The neighboring Townships of Bear Creek and Resort and nearby Township of Springvale have limited recreational facilities and do not provide recreation services, relying to a large degree on the City of Petoskey to meet recreational needs of their residents. Following is a brief summary of the recreational facilities that are available in each of these neighboring Townships.

Bear Creek Township

Within Bear Creek Township, there are several local and regional recreation facilities (see Table 5.3). Three sites, totaling 17 acres, are considered local parks including Spring Lake Park, Walloon Lake access site and Round Lake public access. Another 1184 acres of land is categorized as regional recreational facilities that include Petoskey State Park and the City's forest land. In addition to these facilities, the Township contains 390 acres of private and semi-private indoor and outdoor recreation facilities (see Table 5.6).

According to Bear Creek Township's recreation plan, the Township's future recreational plans are focused on the creation of some additional active recreation facilities, such as the new Jones Landing on Walloon Lake or a community ball field. In addition to this more active recreation facility, the township is interested in expanding its trail system. The township does own approximately 41 acres of land just south of the City of Petoskey corporate limit along the Bear River that could be connected with trails to the River Road Sports Complex trail system.



Resort Township

Resort Township maintains four parks that include West Park and East Park, both of which lie within the City of Petoskey jurisdictional boundary, and Morford Park and Resort Pike Park (see Table 5.4). The West and East Parks are along the Little Traverse Wheelway and provide the most amenities including picnic facilities, access to Little Traverse Bay, trails systems and children's play equipment. The other Township parks (Morford and Resort Pike are quite small, primarily used to provide access to Walloon Lake. In total, these four parks provide approximately 70 acres of improved public park land for Resort Township residents.

Resort Township's East and West Park are within the corporate boundary of the City of Petoskey and connected by the Little Traverse Wheelway along the south border of the Bay Harbor Territory.



In addition to these four primary parks, there are several lake access sites such as Stolt Road End Access and Townsend Road Access, as well as some conservation lands such as Black Preserve Property and parcels owned by the Little Travers and Walloon Lake Trust Conservancies. A 50-acre forest area north of US-31 and east of Townline Road within the Bay Harbor development, provides additional open space. There are also 25.45 acres of privately-owned recreational facilities within Resort Township (see Table 5.6).

Both Bear Creek and Resort Townships pay an annual fee to the City of Petoskey to provide township residents access to city-provided programs rather than providing their own programming.

Springvale Township

As is common for the less populated Townships that are in proximity to the City of Petoskey, Springvale Township contains a relatively small amount of township-owned park land (42 acres), including the Channel Road Park, Botsford Road Lake Access, Township Park Road Park, and recreational property at Springvale Township Hall (see Table 5.5). However, Springvale Township has a large amount of State owned open space, forest land primarily owned by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and several large lakes. There are also regional open space properties that are owned by the Little Traverse Conservancy and the Emmet County's Camp Pet-o-se-ga. This regional land accounts for an additional 10,832 acres of open space within Springvale Township.

Springvale Township does have a local parks and recreation committee and is currently committed to resource protection, primarily as it relates to lake access around Crooked and Pickerel Lakes, and the protection of wildlife habitat. The Springvale Township Parks and Recreation Committee is interested in creating a community park and providing ball field, picnic facilities, and play equipment. The committee is also considering acquisition of additional shoreline property to provide more public access points for fishing, boating and swimming. Trails and greenways are also being considered to help link some existing property and to provide areas for biking. Springvale Township officials have elected to not enter into an agreement with the City of Petoskey for provision of recreational services, but instead residents pay non-resident rates to participate in these programs.

Regional Facilities

A variety of primary outdoor recreational opportunities are readily available in the greater Petoskey area and include golfing, boating, canoeing, cycling, hiking, fishing, hunting, camping, downhill and cross-country skiing, and snowshoeing. The County of Emmet also maintains three parks and several facilities.

- Camp Pet-o-se-ga Located along the shoreline of Pickerel Lake in Springvale Township, this 275 acre property offers camping and recreational facilities to County residents. It includes nature trails, fishing and boating facilities, play fields, and modern camping amenities with 90 campsites.
- The Headlands An International Dark Sky Park containing approximately 600 acres of pristine woodlands, more than two miles of undeveloped Lake Michigan shoreline and many species of rare and endangered plant life. It is home

to several species of rare and endangered plant life and provides habitat for a variety of animals, including bald eagles, osprey, white tail deer, turkey, coyotes, and an occasional black bear. The Waterfront Event Center was completed in 2017

- Cecil Bay This park consists of 800 cares at the northern tip of Emmet County along the Straits
 of Mackinac in Bliss and Wawatam Townships. It includes a mile of Lake Michigan shoreline and
 offers fishing and swimming opportunities.
- McGulpin Point Lighthouse A lighthouse purchased in 2008 on 11.5 acres, with 336 feet of Lake Michigan shoreline. The lighthouse was built in 1869 to guide ships through the straits was decommissioned in 1906 and is now a historical and cultural attraction for the county.
- Emmet County Community Center and Fairgrounds Located at the western edge of the City of Petoskey, the 37 acre property includes an 11,000 square foot community center, 10,000 square foot exhibit barn, a 2,500 seat covered grandstand, restroom and shower facility and a pedestrian entrance plaza.



• Maple River - This 315 acre parcel is located in Maple River Township on the banks of



the Maple River and is partially forested providing habitat for a variety of flora and fauna.

In addition to these County of Emmet parks and facilities, there are a number of regional facilities that are located within close proximity of the City, including:

Greenwood Cemetery – A municipal cemetery since 1897, Greenwood Cemetery was established by the City of Petoskey, Bear Creek Township, and Resort Township and contains 105 acres of land. There are 4.4 miles of paved drives and beautiful views of Little Traverse Bay that make it an excellent hiking location.

Petoskey State Park – Formerly owned by the City, this park has 273 acres on the northern shore of Little Traverse bay and provides camping, boating, hiking, fishing, and swimming opportunities.



State of Michigan Forest Land – Approximately 20% of Emmet County's total land area is comprised of State forest land owned by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

North Country National Scenic Trail – While work on its completion remains in progress, this 4,000 mile long footpath is planned to ultimately link communities in scenic wilderness areas across seven northern states. Portions of this trail corridor travel through Bear Creek Township, state-owned forest lands and parklands in the City of Petoskey. The routing primarily includes corridors through publicly owned lands and along public roads, including segments that traverse the City's Bear River Valley Recreation Area and the Little Traverse Wheelway through Bayfront Park.

Little Traverse Wheelway - The 23.4 mile non-motorized, paved trail extends from Harbor Springs to Charlevoix, partially in the M-119 right-of-way and the remainder primarily in former railroad right-of-way. However, the trail is closed between Magnus and East Parks due to a slope failure which destroyed sections of the Wheelway.

Northwestern State Trail – This 30 mile long trail begins at M-119 where it intersects the Little Traverse Wheelway. Constructed in a former railroad right-of-way, the trail is paved for 7.5 miles to Alanson and gravel from Alanson to Mackinaw City.

Friendship Centers of Emmet County -The Friendship Center is a tax supported facility located in Bear Creek Township that offers a wide variety of activities and programs for seniors age 60 and older. They offer fitness programs, activities and social groups – some are on-going, while others are offered periodically throughout the year.

Little Traverse Conservancy

The Little Traverse Conservancy maintains thousands of acres of preserves and conservation easements throughout Emmet County and northern Michigan that provide recreational opportunities such as hiking, biking, paddling, skiing and snowshoeing, fishing, and bird watching, in addition to protecting open space and sensitive areas.

Private Facilities

In addition to any public and quasi-public recreation facilities listed here, there are various private facilities in the Petoskey area that serve a variety of recreational interests. These include activities such a golfing, camping, tours and charters, marina, and numerous other amenities. Some of the most popular private facilities are listed in Table 5.6.

RECREATION PROGRAMMING

In addition to the numerous park and recreation facilities that are maintained by the City of Petoskey, the City's Department of Parks and Recreation provides organized programs that serve a variety of ages and interests. During the 2021 calendar year, the City offered 24 recreation programs that served 1,964 persons. Some programs are organized by City staff, while others are partnerships with other organizations, with a sharing of facilities. Department staff also work closely with the Public Schools of Petoskey to assist with school-sponsored sports activities.

Current Park and Recreation Programs

Table 5.7 identifies the 24 recreational programs that were sponsored by the Petoskey Department of Parks and Recreation in 2021 for the Petoskey area, as well as participation changes from the previous years. Programming numbers are trending up and approaching "normal" after being adversely affected and diminished the past few years due to the pandemic. Many (not all) of the programs that were canceled in 2020 resumed in 2021.

Program Trends

Table 5.7 identifies how the participation counts are allocated among each of the general activity categories. It also reflects the current recreation trends in the Petoskey area. The focus on the court and field sports continue to be popular & successful recreational programs. The summer kid's camp, as well as winter sports (volleyball, basketball, skiing, and skating) continue to show strong participation levels. The department continues to modify its offerings based on community demand. The use of City trails and park rentals have increased dramatically, particularly since the pandemic, and maintenance of these facilities has become a priority.

Recreational Partnerships:

As mentioned previously, the Department of Parks and Recreation staff assists with the organizational support for a number of recreation programs, as well as maintains the facilities for the programs, that do not fall under the management of the City. Such programs include, but are not limited to: Church League Softball, Girls Travel Softball, Petoskey Youth Baseball Association, and the Petoskey Youth Soccer Association. The Department also works closely with the Public Schools of Petoskey athletic staff to provide facilities and other services for school-sponsored sports programs. Programs currently offered through the School District include:

Special Services

Although not specifically considered recreational programming, there are a number of unique services that the Department of Parks and Recreation provides, including:

- Buildings and Grounds Construction and Maintenance In addition to parks and special facilities, the City's Department of Parks and Recreation staff oversee construction, repairs, and maintenance activities associated with all City-owned buildings and their grounds, regardless of which City department or operation uses them, including maintenance of certain rights-of-way.
- *Downtown Maintenance* Considered a special facility, Department of Parks and Recreation staff members oversee maintenance activities within the Central Business District.
- Special Events Support the Department of Parks and Recreation often is called upon to provide support services for a variety of special events. Its services may include the use of park facilities, setup and preparation activities, staff presence, and cleanup duties. These special events include community-wide festivals, civic events, historic displays, park concerts, outdoor films, and numerous other private and public activities.

While Chapter 5 focused on the current state of recreational facilities, this chapter looks to the future. It begins by outlining a series of potential trends that may affect the recreational needs of the Petoskey community, based on demographic trends as well as public input. Assessing these potential future needs to the City's existing facilities and programs allows the City to work on possible deficiencies as well as to build on existing assets and strengths.

Current Recreation Trends

Effects of Resort and Tourism on Recreational Needs

The City of Petoskey has a number of unique attributes that make it a popular resort and tourist destination. In particular, its waterfront location and its four-season climate provide unique recreational opportunities to which visitors from throughout Michigan and the greater Midwest are drawn.

This influx of visitors comes with a number of benefits, particularly from an economic perspective. It also has a profound effect upon the recreational planning required to satisfy this large number of annual visitors. As noted in Chapter 2, the year-round recreation service area for the City is just under 17,000, but with seasonal residents and tourists added, the recreation facility and service users county-wide are estimated to increase the population between 40% and 300%.

Therefore, the historical national standard that cities should provide between 6.5 to 10 acres of developed open space per 1,000 residents doesn't work for communities like Petoskey. While the standard is a good starting point, each community's unique characteristics, assets and local preferences should determine the correct amount of parkland. For the City of Petoskey, the protection of its waterfront – both Little Traverse Bay and the Bear River- by maintaining public ownership is a defining characteristic of the park system. In addition, the importance of the resort/ tourism industry for the city makes it necessary to focus on specific recreational opportunities that will be attractive to most seasonal visitors. Non-motorized facilities have expanded significantly in the region, which has increased use and demand. A 2021 trail survey conducted by the Top of Michigan Trails Council estimated that there are annually 116,000 uses on the Little Traverse Wheelway with a direct economic impact of \$1.4 million. There is a great need for continued funding of trail amenities and maintenance to meet the interests of trail users. Additionally, the entire parks system has experienced much more user pressure since the pandemic. The result of the added use strains the infrastructure, amenities and maintenance requirements executed by staff.

Influence of an Aging Population

As indicated by the community's demographics reported in Chapter 2, the recreation service area saw population increases in three age groups from 2010-2020 that is consistent with the five-year ACS estimates over the past 10 years: under 18 years old (21% of the population), adults (59% of the population) and seniors (make up 20% of the population). These numbers reflect other national trends that show an increase in the median age of the country's population, driven by advances in health care that extends life expectancies. These effects will continue to be felt in the future, and recreational programs will need to adapt accordingly.



The following trends reflect the preferences of an older community as they relate to recreation:

- Retirees will remain dedicated to health, wellness, and exercise.
- Interest will likely center around activities that have an educational and social component.
- Many will react negatively to games and activities they tend to associate with "senior."
- People's lives will remain busy even after retirement. The type, arrangement, and scheduling of activities will play an important role in attracting participants.
- Statistics show the trail systems and walking paths are favored by buyers in retirement communities.

As the area continues to move into retirement age, the demand for park and recreation facilities to serve older residents will continue to grow. According to the 2017 "Healthy Aging in Parks Survey" conducted by the National Recreation and Park Association, most communities deliver programming for this population at community centers, senior centers, or parks. For our area, that would include the Emmet County Friendship Center and North Central Michigan College, but facilities of these types are limited and expensive to sustain. To meet the challenge, we will need to identify reliable funding sources, additional space for these activities to occur, and ensure staff is versed in the needs and desires of older adults. Further, engaging with the older adult community, whether through surveys, one-on-one conversations, and/or market research data analysis may be necessary.

Role of Declining School-Age Population

According to the five-year ACS estimates, the school-age population continues to decline, but with the increase in young adult and adult populations, it is possible there will be an increase in the school-age population in the future. Traditionally, this is the age group most often associated with formal recreation programs, such as youth sports teams and other organized athletic activities. As shown in Table 5.6, the City's youth programs are recovering from the pandemic challenge. Studies show that recreational programs will see their role expand from simply providing an activity for children, to providing them with skills and experiences that will help prepare them for the future.



Trends regarding youth development include:

- An increased interest in youth participants being involved in the planning and responsibility for programs. They are no longer satisfied with the adults simply planning for them.
- Balancing quality opportunities for children in a time where overscheduling is the norm.
- After-school and school break programs continue to play a role in combating negative behaviors, and continue to assist schools in achieving their educational goals.
- Parks and recreation departments have an opportunity to expand their roles, transitioning from simply service providers to facilitators. Allowing them to coordinate other youth services and bring together various development agencies.

National Statistics

A 2010 "Sports Participation in 2010: State-by-State" study by the National Sporting Goods Association (NSGA) established a participation frequency index of various sports by state. Based on a sampling of 41,000 U.S. households, the index divides a state's percentage of participants in an activity by its percentage of the U.S. population to assess likeliness to participate in an activity. The activities for which Michigan shows a tendency toward participation include bicycling, exercise walking, fishing, boating, soccer, and archery. The NSGA also tracks participation nationally of youth sports (7-17 years) and

senior sports (55 years and older). The 2011 vs. 2001 study comparison indicates a significant increase (greater than 30%) in youth exercise walking, hiking, hockey, kayaking, and running. Due to the increased population numbers of seniors, most activities saw an increase in participation numbers.

Specific Activity Trends

In addition to the larger, national trends discussed above, the City of Petoskey's Department of Parks and Recreation staff has begun to see several specific trends that are starting to affect recreation programming within the City and surrounding area. These include an increased demand for new sports that may be less organized and not as well summarized in participation numbers, in addition to a growing popularity of City festivals and outdoor activities. Some of the more sought-after activities now include:



- Pickleball
- Archery
- Bicycling
- Disc golf
- Walking and running
- Kayaking
- City-wide festivals

Existing Deficiencies

Opportunities for improvement always exist, even in a recreation system as extensive and excellent as Petoskey's. The following discussion highlights some potential areas for improvement.

Issue: Design and Marketing of Programs Geared Toward Petoskey's Older Population


As mentioned previously, the City's Department of Parks and Recreation relies upon partnerships with other local organizations to provide some programming and facilities that might otherwise fall under the City's umbrella of services. By sharing these responsibilities, the City avoids duplication of effort and equipment, making a more efficient system. In the case of senior programs, a majority of activities are sponsored by the Friendship Centers of Emmet County and North Central Michigan College, rather than through the Department of Parks and Recreation. While the sharing of this responsibility is not an issue, it does require that the City take an active role in partnering with these organizations to insure the recreational needs of the elderly community are being met. Activities organized by these facilities that currently attract older adults include use of the walking track, pickleball, and water aerobics at an area hotel pool. The City should insure it is actively involved in determining the types of programming offered, as well as marketing these offerings to the public. If there are activities that are not being met through these other organizations, the Department of Parks and Recreation might need to add such activities to its programming.

Issue: Availability and Marketing of Youth Programming Related to Athletic Activities

The majority of programs offered by the City's Department of Parks and Recreation are focused primarily on athletic activities. Similar to the arrangement described regarding senior programming, the City depends on other local organizations to develop activities that are related to other areas of interest such as music, art, science, and history. Currently curriculums provided by groups such as the Public Schools of Petoskey Community Education, Crooked Tree Arts Council, YMCA, and the Little Traverse Historical Society all help to fill this need. As discussed above, the sharing of these responsibilities does not necessarily pose a problem, however, the responsibility is on the Department of Parks and Recreation staff to insure that adequate programming is being offered through these supplemental sources. Additionally, the quality of maintenance cannot be sacrificed when responsibilities increase because of more facilities. Seasonal staffing has been challenging and either contracting services out or not maintaining low impact areas need to be considered

Issue: Some Areas of the City are Lacking in Smaller, or Underdeveloped Neighborhood Park Facilities The influence of resort and tourism and the popularity of organized sports have created a tendency for the City to focus its resources in maintaining its larger park facilities and playing fields. Unfortunately, this has resulted in a lack of developed neighborhood parks in some areas of the City. City officials should look for opportunities invest in existing residential parks that could help to increase the number of recreational opportunities in neighborhood parks, highlighting the residential areas that are within close walking distance (that is, within 5 minutes). Neighborhood parks are generally categorized as smaller in size and are primarily focuses on providing neighborhood entertainment such as children's play structures and other equipment. As depicted on the map, the school playgrounds fulfill this need to a great extent and are open and available to the public, and Bayfront Park is included because it provides a playground that serves the adjacent residential areas as well as the region. The map also shows that almost all neighborhoods are within a quarter mile of a public park, with the exception of the southwest corner of the City.

To address these identified deficiencies, the following strategies should be followed.

- Increase the marketing of seasonal recreational activities. Petoskey's lake topography, combined with its climate, particularly its tendency to experience large amounts of "lake effect" snow, provides unique opportunities to promote skiing and other winter recreation activities that might not be possible in other areas of the state. Its distinct four-season climate also generates the potential to cater to season-specific activities such as fall color tours, spring wildflower walks and mushroom hunting.
- Continue to focus on water resources as a draw for resorters and tourists. Lake Michigan and Bear River Valley Recreation Area are distinct draws for resorters and tourists, and Petoskey has taken advantage of its waterfront location at a number of its local parks. This is particularly true at Bayfront Park, which is one of the "jewels" of Petoskey's recreational system. The City should continue to look for opportunities to include facilities as they relate to Petoskey's water resources, along Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay and the Bear River.
- Continue to improve parks in the downtown business district. Local business owners and operators rely on resorters and tourists as a large portion of their customer base. Petoskey's marketing of its downtown as a scenic and historic destination has certainly increased numbers of resorters and tourists who frequent the area. The location and condition of downtown parks, particularly Pennsylvania Park and Arlington Park, play large roles in the aesthetics of this area. To continue to promote the patronage of downtown businesses, the City should continue to look for ways to improve parks with the downtown area.
- Look at hiring a different demographic for seasonal employment. Active retired adults should be recruited to do season jobs not requiring a high physical demand. Working with local senior agencies, advertising using different messaging and restructuring the current seasonal job descriptions are all avenues to consider to recruit and retain a solid seasonal workforce.

The recreational goals, objectives and strategies were developed through constant evaluation of current facilities and programs and community input. The goals and objectives therefore reflect the preferences of the Petoskey community in addressing recreational trends and deficiencies discussed in previous chapters. These goals are also intended to complement the recreational goals of both the neighboring townships and the County of Emmet. Traffic to local parks has dramatically increased during the time of the COVID 19 pandemic. People use parks as a place to be able to get outside, exercise and socialize while still being able to follow social distancing. The National Recreation and Park Association has publicized numerous articles and performed an abundant amount of research on how parks are good for the body, mind and emotional wellbeing. Parks provide people in the community with an opportunity to increase their overall health and wellness. While general strategies are provided below, specific action items and implementation steps for achieving these goals in individual parks will be detailed further in Chapter 8.

Goal: The Petoskey Park System is integral to the unique sense of place of the City and Region

Objectives:

- 1) Maintain the City of Petoskey status as a top-rated park system by enhancing and protecting funding for existing parks.
- 2) Promote the park system as a key place-making strategy.
- 3) Increase awareness of the successful cooperation occurring in the provision of parks and recreation facilities and programs.
- 4) Promote additional cooperative agreements for the provision of parks and recreation facilities and programs.
- 5) Improve marketing efforts to promote all the recreational opportunities available to the community.
- 6) Consider opportunities to improve existing neighborhood parks.
- 7) Evaluate vacant City-owned property for identified City needs.
- 8) Maximize use of existing, unique recreational opportunities in the City such as the Bear River Valley.

Strategies:

- Cultivate additional partnerships that would allow the City to provide improved recreational services.
- Address in-demand activities by working with regional partners to identify locations and funding.
- Budget for interactive park maps, way-finding signs, and cell-phone tour development.
- Identify additional funding and resources for parks maintenance, programs and upgrades through millage conversations, partnering with "Friends" programs, non-profits and other organizations.

Goal: The Petoskey Park System is a known asset for community-wide health and wellness

Objectives:

- 1) Develop and maintain a year-round interconnected City-wide trail and sidewalk system available to users of all ages and abilities.
- 2) Connect City parks and township, state, and school district facilities through a regional greenway system (see Map 7.1).
- 3) Enhance the livability of City neighborhoods by investing in neighborhood parks.
- 4) Improve accessibility and barrier-free ratings of neighborhood parks.
- 5) Work with all recreation providers to ensure provision of recreation programs that address the needs of all age groups.
- 6) Promote the City parks and trail system as avenues to improve/support mental, emotional and physical health.

- 7) Create partnerships with the medical community.
- 8) Strive for universal accessibility in all park facilities and recreation programs.

Strategies:

- Perform annual maintenance and reconstruction of older sections of the Little Traverse Wheelway within the City of Petoskey.
- Collaborate with shareholders to identify design and subsequent funding sources to solve the closed section of the Little Traverse Wheelway (between Magnus and East Parks).
- Work with neighboring jurisdictions and the Top of Michigan Trails Council to create a funding mechanism for trail-wide maintenance.
- Continue to work with adjacent communities, the North Country Trail Association and the Top of Michigan Trails Council to make additional trail and greenway connections.
- Promote the use of on-street bike-routes where off-road trails are not possible.
- Connect City parks with sidewalks and trails.
- Install bike racks and sidewalks in neighborhood and community parks.
- Continue to test new recreation programs to address the needs of a changing demographic.
- Partner with McLaren Northern Michigan and the Health Department of Northwest Michigan to promote use of parks and trails for improved health outcomes, such as the provision of tobacco/vape/marijuana free facilities and breast feeding/pumping location where appropriate.

Goal: The basis of Petoskey's high quality of life- its valuable natural resources – are managed and protected.

Objectives:

- 1) Continue the preservation of publicly-owned waterfront land (Little Traverse Bay and Bear River) to ensure recreational enjoyment by future generations.
- 2) Continue the protection and management of the important water resources provided by Little Traverse Bay and the Bear River.
- 3) Work with adjacent communities to protect open space and connections between existing public lands.
- 4) Balance the community desire for scenic views with the environmental benefits of trees and landscaping in public parks and public rights-of-way.
- 5) Enhance water resource access.
- 6) Manage shoreline and vulnerable park areas with native plantings and landscaping best practices.

Strategies:

- Update and complete the City's urban forestry inventory and develop a forestry plan.
- Explore the use of pervious pavement or other non-pavement surfaces for park trails and parking areas where appropriate.
- Continue funding of waterfront management programs, including education on the eradication and control of invasive species.
- Utilize storm water management best management practices and green infrastructure where appropriate.

The following goals are specifically related to the City's efforts to focus on sustainable and resilient park maintenance and design.

Goal: Incorporate sustainable design elements and methods for future park developments.

Objectives:

- 1) Identify alternative energy methods into future planning when applicable.
- 2) Design park facilities/amenities using natural/environmentally friendly materials.
- 3) Utilize storm water best management practices.

Goal: Focus on designs that support long term resiliency.


- 1) Integrate natural designs for shoreline improvements.
- 2) Identify landscaping/forestry best practices.
- 3) Focus on living shoreline concepts as a priority.
- 4) Ensure long term public accessibility to the water.

Action Plan

Action plan items are specific in nature to achieve the goals and objectives. The action plan is used to budget for upcoming projects for the next several years.

A community plan is only as good as the commitment to its implementation. This chapter outlines a series of specific action items that will be necessary to achieve the City of Petoskey's overall recreational goals. It also documents cost estimates for these planned improvements and addresses potential funding sources to help make these plans a reality.

On-going Improvement Efforts

While most of the planned improvements for the recreational system refer to a specific park or amenity, several of the City's goals relate instead to process or programming issues. The City is committed to monitoring these issues and making progress when the opportunity arises. This approach applies in particular to the following:

- Development of additional cooperative partnerships. Seeking partnerships with local municipalities and other organizations should be an ongoing process for the City. Historically, the City has partnered with community organizations such as Bear Creek and Resort Townships, other townships, Emmet County, Public Schools of Petoskey, and North Central Michigan College. In the future, there might be the potential to partner with townships in addition to Bear Creek and Resort, such as Springvale or Little Traverse, to provide recreational services to residents of those townships using agreements similar to those that are in place for Bear Creek and Resort Townships. Partnerships with these governmental organizations might also be formed to implement the City's plans for a regional trail system or special interest parks.
- Partnerships with the medical community to promote the use of park facilities for improved health outcomes should also be explored through programs that benefit mental, physical and social health.
- Development of additional program offerings. Petoskey's rich history, scenic setting, and ecological resources provide numerous opportunities to develop new recreational programs. It is essential that programs meet the needs of the community, including changing demographics. Partnering with local historical, cultural, and environmental groups to develop new initiatives will be necessary to make the most of limited resources.
- Promotion of parks, recreation programs, festivals and public displays. As indicated in the description of recreational goals, the City is looking for ways to market its parks and recreation services as an integral component of Petoskey's resort and tourist economy. Due to the current involvement of the Department of Parks and Recreation in community events and other gatherings, the department staff is in a position to help increase resort and tourist dollars in the community. Specific recreational facilities such as Ed White Field, Turcott Field, Bayfront Park and Bates Park at North Central Michigan College campus should continue to host regional and statewide tournaments. The Downtown Greenway could serve as an ideal location to host City-wide festivals, and other gatherings. While the City now hosts a number of events (see Table 8.1), new community opportunities could include, waterfront activities such as regattas, boat races or whitewater competitions, and other historical and cultural programs.
- The City has an aging infrastructure, as supported by a Parks Capital Needs Assessment which
 was completed in 2021. The assessment identified immediate, medium (1-5 year) and long (6-10
 year) range maintenance needs on the current inventory. The estimate ranged between \$12-14
 million to upgrade and maintain current levels. In addition to staffing shortages, funding for the
 perpetual maintenance will need to be secured before additional, higher maintenance properties
 are developed.

Action Plan

This action plan provides specific documentation of the necessary steps that the City of Petoskey might take to realize the recreational goals that relate to 24 specific park properties or amenities. Some of the plans relate to large-scale undertakings, such as the continuation of a City-wide greenway system. Others refer to changes and upgrades of specific parks and recreational facilities. For each proposed project, a description of the future vision for the park is provided, as well as a list of specific action items that are believed needed to implement the desired changes. Finally, a review of rationale and justification for the changes are provided along with cost estimates. The rationale provided for each project focuses on a set of five specific reasons that make these changes imperative, including:

- ADA compliance Changes are necessary to meet current ADA-accessibility standards.
- User Demand Changes reflect the current demand for this resource by local residents.
- Resort/tourism and/ or economic development- Changes are necessary to promote Petoskey as a premier resort and tourist destination.
- Environmental protection Changes are needed to protect valuable environmental resources.
- Facility maintenance Changes are needed to insure facilities are of the proper quality.

ARLINGTON PARK

Future Park Vision:

The vision for Arlington Park includes changes at two different scales. From an individual park perspective, there are several opportunities to improve the overall landscaping and Arlington Park represents a critical piece of the proposed downtown greenway.

Rationale:

Resort Tourism/Economic Development

Located on the edge of Petoskey's downtown business district, Arlington Park serves as a key "gateway" to this area particularly for seasonal residents and tourists who frequent the popular downtown stores and amenities.

The reconfiguration of Lewis Street when US 31 work was completed 2019 provided additional green space to Arlington Park and provide a safe pedestrian crossing between Arlington Park and Sunset Park above Bayfront Park.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Children's Garden in cooperation with the Petoskey Area Garden Club
- Improve Accessibility
- Improve tables and site furnishings.
- Naturalize current "drainage ditch" such a project could tie into the current "livable landscaping" by demonstrating a wetland garden and its implications associated with the larger watershed
- Implement general landscape improvements such as tree replacements for aging Maples, expansion of the irrigation system, and tree and shrub plantings
- Install uniform City-facility signage
- Installation and dedication of a second Civil War-Era cannon currently being restored by the local chapter of the Sons of Union; the cannon is one of 138 known to still exist out of the 394 cast
- Development of a "Veterans Memorial Area" on the south side of the park (between Lewis Street and the parking lots)

BATES PARK

Future Park Vision:

Completed in 2000, Bates Park is a high quality "Little League" baseball and youth and adult softball facility. The facility is over 20 years old and will need to be gradually updated. There are relatively few major changes planned for Bates Park, except for the eventual build-out of the fourth quadrant.

Rationale:

Use Demand

Baseball is one of Petoskey's most popular sports. The construction of the complex on property leased from North Central Michigan College has allowed the consolidation of youth baseball programs and expanded programming for youth and adults softball. There is a sidewalk connector from Atkins Street was extended to improve accessibility.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Provide scoreboard for Field C •
- Provide enclosed dugouts for Field C •
- Use the site's undeveloped "fourth quadrant" •
- Add children's play area
- Repair dougouts for A and B fields •
- Install uniform City-facility signage •
- Replace pathway from NCMC parking lot to field •
- upgrades including siding, Buildina roof. • concession, restroom and ADA upgrades
- Landscaping enhancements •
- Field maintenance and fence replacement

Possible uses for the fourth quadrant:

BAYFRONT PARK

Future Park Vision:

Much of the development of Bayfront Park has been accomplished, based upon the park's original 1981 comprehensive-design plan. Considered one of the City's high profile parks, the park's highly visible location on Lake Michigan, its proximity to downtown Petoskey, and its multiple facilities – both passive and active – will require that Bayfront Park continue to be well maintained and constantly upgraded to remain a community showcase. Although most major elements of the park's original comprehensive plan have been accomplished during a 30-year period, several proposed improvements for Bayfront Park have been listed within the near future to achieve Bayfront Park's



overall completion as originally proposed. The East Bowl Area and Bayfront Park West still have components that need to be completed.

Rationale:

Tourism and Economic Development, Use Demand, and ADA Compliance

Planned upgrades at the Bayfront Park Marina and Bayfront Park History Museum could satisfy ADAcompliance issues. It is believed that Marina-facility upgrades and other proposed improvements will assure that Bayfront Park continues in its role as a regional destination and one of the City's most popular park sites for year-round and seasonal residents as well as visitors. Continual upgrades and other proposed improvements are believed necessary to keep pace with the tremendous use of these facilities.





Planned Park Improvements:

The rebuilding of the harbor's protection breakwall in 2008 and 2009 by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the long awaited expansion of the marina in 2010-2011 has allowed the City to re-focus its efforts on remaining projects.

- Complete finishing touches to the park's arboretum, Festival Place, and west end areas, including continued park-wide miscellaneous and on-going improvements and enhancements
- Continue improvements to the Historical Museum
- Install additional park irrigation
- Replace/remove stairways
- Maintain and upgrade the Little Traverse Wheelway, Bayfront Drive, parking areas and overall park landscaping
- Construct shelter, restroom facility and water-spray park/playground in the Bayfront Park West area
- Install boat washing station
- Canoe/Kayak storage
- Provide accessible pathways and park amenities
- Focus on natural or livable shoreline landscaping best practices
- Parking lot maintenance
- Resource Center Building Improvements
- Ed White Press Box Building Improvements

BAYFRONT PARK MUNICIPAL MARINA FACILITY

Future Park Vision:

The 144 slip Petoskey Municipal Marina is a vital part of Bayfront Park, attracting boaters from across the Midwest and is an economic driver that benefits our local merchants, businesses, and seasonal attractions. It is of vital importance to provide high end service and keep the facility attractive and competitive to insure that the boating public continues to visit the facility.



Located at 231 Bayfront Drive (45° 22' 52"N 84° 57' 40"W), the marina was expanded in 2010-2011 to its current 144 slips and the existing Marina Services Building was expanded and remodeled to accommodate the anticipated increase in visitor traffic. Restrooms were also enlarged and shower facilities were expanded to meet all Americans with Disabilities Act standards. The marina has four piers with slips ranging in size from 30 feet to 80 feet. Piers A and D are multiuse piers. Pier C was constructed in 2010-2011 and accommodates 44 boat slips of various lengths, broadside moorings and sewer pump-out facilities near each slip area. Pier B provides slip sizes from 30 feet to 60 feet and houses the marina fuel dock, pump-out area and dock office. Both diesel and gasoline fuel is available. In 2018, Piers A, C, D all received GFCI and Marina Guard electrical upgrades. All pedestals we're upgraded in the slips. The fuel system storage tank is scheduled to be replaced in 2022 that includes a 20,000 gallon tank split 14,000 diesel and 6,000 gas in addition to another diesel dispenser. On-going maintenance is budgeted for re-decking, dock office expansion, dredging, ice damage repairs, electrical upgrades to B Pier and parking lot resurfacing.

The marina is a Michigan Grant-Aid Facility and is part of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources reservation system. Revenues and expenses are accounted for under a City approved budget. Revenues after expenditures are reserved as restricted funds for marina use only. To assist with maintenance projects, Michigan Waterways grants have been obtained.



Rationale:

Tourism, economic development, and use demand that planned upgrades to the marina area be designed to keep the marina as a fully functional, attractive and competitive destination marina. The marina plays a vital role in our community as a recreational outlet for our local boating public and as an economic generator attracting boating public from across the Midwest to our marina who in-turn frequent the local businesses, restaurants and shops located in our downtown area.

Planned Improvements:

- 1. Re-decking of the main and finger piers, including wood supports. Composite Decking material should be considered.
- 2. Identify future dredge spoil site location and acquire, if necessary.
- 3. Perform needed repairs caused by ice damage. Costs vary between \$0 and \$60,000 per year

depending upon weather conditions, water levels, and flow ice.

- 4. Resurface or sealing of marina parking lot.
- 5. Perform dredging as needed see dredging section.
- 6. Explore feasibility of ADA kayak launch with cost to be determined.
- 7. Re-seal or replace marina parking lot
- 8. Develop a public ADA compliant kayak launch
- 9. Consider being designated as a host city on the Lake Michigan Coastal Water Trail
- 10. Potentially add electric charging stations specifically for boaters

Estimated Costs and Timeframe:

Infrastructure Monitoring: City, working within the six year Capital Improvement Plans and Parks and Recreation Master Plan, continually monitors and anticipates future repairs to existing infrastructure, buildings, and facilities to determine costs of said repairs through preliminary engineering reports, cost estimates, and previous related project improvements. These improvements are then prioritized, placed into the Capital Improvements Plan and into yearly budgets.

Marketing / Events / Partnership:

Marketing: The City promotes its marina through the City's website, the Michigan Waterways Guide, several marina related magazines, the Petoskey-Harbor Springs Community Guide, the Petoskey Regional Chamber of Commerce, and the Petoskey Area Visitors Bureau through their various publications and clientele promoting the Petoskey Municipal Marina.

Events: Bayfront Park, of which the marina is a part of, hosts numerous events that include the 4th of July celebration, and numerous other events throughout the summer. As part of these events the City provides broadside mooring to educational related boats such as the "Inland Seas" or visiting tall ships who provide an educational component for the community.

Ferry Service: The Little Traverse Bay Ferry Company leases docking space broadside to A Pier for the Special Event Vessel (2022) and also provides a ferry service to Bay Harbor and Harbor Springs (2020)

Partnerships: The marina is a grant-in-aid facility and utilizes the Michigan Department of Natural Resource's reservation system. The City is a member of Michigan Boating Industries Association and meets annually with other Michigan harbor masters. The City meets annually with the Great Lakes Shallow Draft Harbors stake holders. Locally, the City works with the Top of Michigan Watershed Council on water quality and invasive species controls as well as Lake Charlevoix, Antrim, Kalkaska and Emmet County organizations on invasive control measures. The marina also provides boat slips to the Michigan Department of Natural Resource Law Enforcement and Conservation Officer Programs and, on occasion, to the Little Traverse Bay Odawa Indian Natural Resources Department for related research and enforcement vessels.

<u>Right Sizing</u>: The marina has maximized its footprint and does not anticipate any further expansion of docking facility, with the exception of an ADA compliant kayak launch area. The current 144 slip marina accommodates 72 seasonal boaters and the remaining 72 transient slips operate at near capacity from July to mid-August. This allows for shoulder season expansion of use and provides a sustainable income for the marina during low use season. The current number and blend of slip lengths also matches the needs of boaters currently seeking slips.

BEAR RIVER VALLEY RECREATIONAL AREA

Future Park Vision:

The Bear River Valley Recreation Area provides a secluded and natural-park environment that traverses the center of the older portion of the City. It serves as "Development Area #4" within the City's Tax Increment Finance Authority District, which also includes Mineral Well Park. The park underwent major redevelopment in 2010 following the Bear River Recreation Area Master Plan, vastly increasing community use. Improvements included perimeter and interior parking areas, a concrete non-motorized trail, two modern restrooms, improved nature trail with



boardwalks, a pedestrian bridge, stair tower and multiple stairways for access from adjacent neighborhood, whitewater improvements, two picnic shelters, storm water management improvements and landscaping. Some items from the plan remain undone (see below) and will be completed as funding allows, continuing the enhancement of this regional park.

Rationale:

ADA Compliance, Use Demand, Environmental Protection, Economic Development

It is believed that the Bear River Valley Recreation Area represents one of the City's most important ecological resources. The accessibility improvements have greatly increased park use and defined trail and stairway construction has decreased the amount of "desired paths" to help bank stabilization. Installation of storm water management and fish habitat improvements also have provided environmental benefits. Development of the whitewater features has increased use of the park by kayakers and whitewater canoeists, drawing users from throughout the Midwest.





Planned Park Improvements:

- Renovate the Bear River Heritage Center, including improvements to the building's foundation and basement and construct an addition of a hose tower to replicate original historic structure
- Explore options (including sale of property) for the City-owned former Hayner property at Ingalls Avenue near lone Street
- Expand the whitewater improvements from the pedestrian bridge near Fulton Street to the Bridge Street bridge
- Construct a pedestrian bridge under Bridge Street
- Construct a trail head/parking area and improved boat launch on the south side of Sheridan Street
- Consider removal/renovations of the existing Lake Street Dam and add additional fishing/water access along river.

Eventually, the Bear River Valley Recreation Area between Bayfront and Riverbend Parks could be linked to the City's River Road Sports Complex via property that is owned by the Public Schools of Petoskey east of Standish Avenue and north of River Road as well as onto the North Central Michigan College campus via the City's Grimes Street right-of-way that connects Standish Avenue to Howard Street. Such a pathway also could be linked to the City's former landfill site between Howard and River Roads in Bear Creek Township just south of the City Limit, where limited recreation facilities could be installed

The Jarman railroad spur in allows construction of improved access to Curtis Park and the surrounding neighborhood.

CITY-WIDE/ REGIONAL GREENWAY SYSTEM

Future Park Vision:

The City of Petoskey is fortunate to have an extensive and highly connected park system. The spatial distribution of the City's land, in addition to those properties that are owned by the Public Schools of Petoskey, North Central Michigan College, County of Emmet, and Resort Township creates the unique opportunity to develop a City-wide, and connected trail system that would provide pedestrian and non-motorized access around much of the City. On a larger scale, there is potential to extend this trail outside the City's corporate limits to connect with large City, Township, and Stateowned parcels within Bear Creek Township and allow for a realignment of the North Country National Scenic Trail and Iron Belle State Trail.



Rationale:

Use Demand, Environmental Protection


The development of a regional trail system has been a priority of the City of Petoskey and County of Emmet, and several neighboring Townships. Acquisition of green space and conservation would allow for the protection of needed green buffer around the City. It is believed that using a proactive approach to land conservation would allow for the protection of needed green spaces and habitat, particularly in areas of the twnships that currently are experiencing increased development pressures.





Both the City-wide and regional greenways would require acquisition of land and easements to provide uninterrupted trail connections. Such connections could be made through the purchase of lands, conservation easements, and nonmotorized trail along exisitng former rail corridors. Also influencing the development of this regional greenway system is the proposed relocation of the North Country National Scenic Trail/ Iron Belle Trail. Any new regional trail system is not intended to be a replacement for this larger interstate trail, but would interface with the trail, providing

mulitple trail options for varying distances for local residents to enjoy. The creation of a regional trail system would necessitate the cooperation and parthership of a number of parties, including the City of Petoskey, Bear Creek and Resort Townships, Emmet County, and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. There is also interest in development of trails for winter use by cross country skiers within the City of Petoskey. While a proposed trail is depicted elsewhere in this plan, the specific route could be modified to meet wishes or concerns of involved parties.

CURTIS PARK

Future Park Vision:

Curtis Park was donated to the City with no restrictions as to what park uses could be developed at the park. To date, the park has functioned as a neighborhood park for use by local residents for picnics, unstructured play, and open space. Although City staff believes that the park has the potential to provide other recreational opportunities, including a multi-purpose playing field, residents near the park have been opposed to field developments. Historically residents within the area of Curtis Park have indicated that they wish to see no changes at Curtis Park, however new residents are now interested in improvements. Without changes to Curtis Park, it is believed that a link could be developed



to the Bear River Valley Recreation Area, with use of City-owned properties at Curtis Avenue and Sheridan Street.

Rationale:

ADA Compliance, Neighborhood Utilization, Beautification

Curtis Park is a large, open green space with both mature and declining tress. A tree-replacement program would improve and enhance the park and neighborhood. Only one curb cut exists at Curtis Park, near Jarman and Morgan Streets, to allow ADA access. The addition of several more curb cuts and a sidewalk would make the park more accessible for those with limited mobility and use by the general public.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Install picnic tables, grills, trash receptacles
- Install City branded signage
- Establish pedestrian-access points
- Improve ADA
- Construct sidewalk/trail system
- Replace trees
- Off leash dog run
- Construct shelters for picnic areas

DOWNTOWN GREENWAY

Future Park Vision:

A long-planned connection of Arlington and Pennsylvania Parks along the Penn Central Railroad Company rail rightof-way. The City acquired from the State of Michigan the right-of-way from Rosedale Avenue to Emmet Street in 2011, and the first phase of the 1.5 mile Downtown Greenway Corridor between MacDonald Drive and Bay Street was completed in 2014. The greenway was expanded in 2019 from Mitchell Street to Emmet along the route of the rail road corridor. In 2016, a one-block stretch of widened sidewalk was constructed between Bay Street and E. Lake Street was constructed.



Rationale:

Economic Development/Non-motorized Facilities/ ADA Accessibility

It is believed that this park enhances the walkability and bike-ability of the community by linking residential neighborhoods and outlying commercial areas to the downtown and by creating a second non-motorized link between the downtown and the waterfront.

Planned Park Improvements:

In 2020, the City purchased the rail route from Emmet to Sheridan for future development. The improvements would enhance residential and business development along the route.

Further details of the improvements in Arlington and Pennsylvania Parks along the Downtown Greenway are provided in those park summaries.

Estimated Costs:

Phase III – Park Avenue Phase IV – Emmet to Sheridan \$375,000 \$600,000





LIBRARY COURTYARD PARKS

Future Park Vision:

The Library Courtyard Parks, which are maintained by the Department of Parks and Recreation, are recent additions to the Downtown Area. The Courtyard Park west of the library at 500 East Mitchell Street was completed in 2005 as part of the Library-development project, and the Courtyard Park to the north of the former Carnegie Library Building at 451 East Mitchell Street was completed in 2007. Planned improvements will revolve around maintenance of existing landscape and the possible addition of community art-display areas.



Rationale:

General Maintenance, Promotion of Community Arts

These two courtyard areas have been designed to complement activities that may overflow from interior uses of the buildings as well as to provide for quiet reflective, open-space areas within the downtown business district, as well as to provide appropriate settings for the display of public art.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Develop community art display areas within both courtyards that would allow for permanent and revolving displays
- Enhance landscape and site amenities to compliment the art displays

Estimated Costs:

LITTLE TRAVERSE WHEELWAY

Future Park Vision:

The first phase of the Little Traverse Wheelway within the City was constructed in 1991 and the entire 23.4 mile non-motorized trail was completed when the City constructed the Resort Bluffs segment in 2009. The City maintains 8 miles of the trail, from Stuart Avenue at the east end of the City to East Park in Resort Township, as well as the stretch along Bay Harbor parallel to US-31 to West Park. The trail provides an important non-motorized amenity to the community and visitors alike.

The Wheelway has been connected to other trails including the Bear River Valley non-motorized trail, the Quarry Harbor Trail link between the Bay Harbor Marina District and Resort Township's East Park, and the Downtown Greenway Corridor that provides a connection between the Wheelway and Downtown Petoskey. Continued maintenance and resurfacing of the existing trail – parts of which are over 25 years old – will be needed as well as reconstruction of the sections that are 8 feet to the current 10-foot standard. High water damaged many sections of the trail including the marina trail in Bay Harbor and the Arboretum.





In April of 2020, the trail between Magnus Park and East Park was closed due to a major slope failure. The stability of the trail was already compromised due to shoreline erosion caused by record high water and storm surges. The slope failure occurred when a portion of the bank along Eppler Curve failed and eliminated the trail. Since the failure, additional sections of trails have been lost. The City of Petoskey, Emmet County and Resort Township jointly funded a study to determine the cause and potential solutions. The bodies agreed to get a schematic design for a trail that would run parallel along US-31 on the South side. Once the results and cost of the design were determined, the consensus was to evaluate putting the trail close to the original bluff. Additional conversations with permitting agencies, consultants, and engineers are taking place to develop schematic plans and estimated costs. At the publishing of this document, plans and costs for the lower bluff aren't completed.

Rationale:

Walkable/Bike-able Community, Resort/Tourism, Public Safety

It is believed that this trail greatly improves the walkability and bike-ability of the Petoskey community, and enhances the community's popularity as a resort/tourism area. As a result of the tourism linked to the trail, the community receives substantial economic benefit.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Install site amenities and trail signage
- Maintain, resurface, and replace trail
- Explore improvements to curb cuts through the Bay Harbor section
- Determine design and costs of the slope failure stretch between Magnus Park and Arrowhead Shores. Possible replacement.
- Replace the quarry harbor stretch in Bay Harbor

LOCKWOOD PARK

Future Park Vision:

Improvements to this neighborhood park include upgrades to the existing basketball court and the addition of a restroom and storage facility could be considered in conjunction with potential improvements to the City's underground water reservoir that is located at Lockwood Park. Irrigation of the park area, tree replacement and landscape improvements, minor field upgrades, and improved pedestrian and accessibility access to the park are planned.

Rationale:

ADA Compliance, Facility Management, Facility Enhancement

The changes planned for Lockwood Park are primarily to enhance usability, insure ADA compliance, and protect the park's existing resources through regular maintenance.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Upgrade landscaping, stabilize the embankment along Lockwood Avenue, and replace trees, as needed
- Upgrade basketball court to multi-use court
- · Construct restrooms and storage facility; Design to minimize impact on park area
- Provide accessible route to ball field and park
- Upgrade ball field area
- Install irrigation system
- Provide ADA parking and improvements

MAGNUS PARK

Future Park Vision:

Listed as "Development Area #1" within the City's Tax Increment Finance Authority Financing and Development Plans, Magnus Park's facilities are aging. The issue of how Magnus Park should be used in the future was decided in 1995, when the City's Parks and Recreation Commission, Tax Increment Finance Authority Board, Planning Commission, and City Council concluded that Magnus Park should continue to be used for camping, but that the park also should be enhanced to offer facilities that could be shared by day users. As a result, a conceptual development plan for the park was prepared in 2002.



Rationale:

ADA Compliance, Tourism/Economic Development/Safety

The redevelopment of Magnus Park would allow the park to better serve both day-use visitors and campers. Separation of day-use activities along with the creation of a day-use parking area and the relocation of the main entrance road would provide better internal control of vehicular traffic and increase safety to pedestrian and bicyclists. Any new support facilities or amenities must address ADA compliance issues.



Planned Park Improvements:

- Update the park master plan
- Construct new restroom/shower and storage facility
- Construct picnic shelter
- Improve the water access for swimmers and paddle sports
- Construct paddle boat storage
- Upgrade internal roadways and day-use parking lot
- Replace all utilities to accommodate modern RV's
- Construct cabins
- Improve Upper-Magnus Park area

MEMORIAL PARK

Future Park Vision:

Memorial Park would remain a "gateway" park, without installations of specific recreation facilities. Planned improvements include replacement of the aging irrigation system and flag poles, as well as installing landscape enhancements and site furnishings. Incorporation of elements of downtown gateway may also be incorporated.

Rationale:

Facility Maintenance

Changes planned for Memorial Park are primarily related to general maintenance of the grounds and site amenities.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Replace flag poles with lighted poles
- Install landscape improvements
- Incorporate new site furnishings

Estimated Costs:

Replace flag poles Add site amenities and landscaping Install signage \$25,000 \$15,000 \$5,000



MINERAL WELL PARK

Future Park Vision:

Included as part of the Bear River Valley Recreation Area and "Development Area #4" within the City's Tax Increment Finance Authority Financing and Development Plans, Mineral Well Park, with its historical architecture and facilities, provides a unique glimpse into Petoskey's past. The 1917 gazebo, which has undergone several renovations, will require periodic restoration of certain features, particularly its milled, wooden elements, as well as on-going maintenance to insure its long-term preservation.

Rationale:

ADA Compliance, Historic Preservation, Facility Maintenance, Access

The proposed changes for Mineral Well Park relate primarily to the maintenance of the historic structures and the incorporation of ADA-compliant furnishings and access points for the park. It is believed that these maintenance activities are essential for the protection of the City's valuable historic remnants.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Restore historic gazebo features
- Provide improved site furnishings
- Improve landscaping

PENNSYLVANIA PARK

Future Park Vision:

Similar to Arlington Park, the vision for Pennsylvania Park is integral to its inclusion in the Downtown Greenway. Indeed, Pennsylvania Park's location between Bay and Lake Streets and between Lake and Mitchell Streets places it at the core of the planned Downtown Greenway. The park will continue to be maintained as the community focal point for special events and concerts.

The consolidation of all community war monuments at Pennsylvania Park into a War Memorial Plaza was completed, as was installation of a Hemingway Statue and new gazebo landscaping.

Rationale:

Community Events/Tourism/Economic Development

Changes proposed for Pennsylvania Park are believed critical components of the City's overall, long-planned Downtown



Greenway development project. Pennsylvania Park's location in the heart of the community's central business district has, historically, provided a gathering place for visitors and local residents alike. It is believed that on-going community programs, coupled with planned improvements to the park, should assure that the community's downtown area – and its businesses – would remain viable.

Planned Park Improvements:

In 2019 public restroom renovations were completed. A planned sidewalk widening along Park Avenue is scheduled for spring of 2024.

- Installation of widened sidewalk along Park Avenue to enhance outdoor dining opportunities
- Replacement of the irrigation system
- Updated park signage
- Relocation of the war memorials along the west edge of the park to Arlington Park
- Accessible pathways to picnic tables and seating areas



• Removal of the holiday tree and replaced with a seating area and potentially modified with a sleeve for a seasonal holiday tree.

PETOSKEY HIGH SCHOOL – MIDDLE SCHOOL RECREATION COMPLEX (Public Schools of Petoskey)

Future Park Vision:

Through a long-standing cooperative effort with the Public Schools of Petoskey, the City of Petoskey has been able to develop facilities at the School District's Petoskey High School-Petoskey Middle School Campus, with the two entities then sharing in the programming and the maintenance of these facilities. In turn, the City enjoys use of facilities that initially had been developed by the School District both at the High School-Middle School Campus and elsewhere. With grant assistance from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the City constructed six lighted tennis courts, recreation fields, and restrooms at the Petoskey High School



campus between 1973 and 1976. The courts were upgraded in 2016. This cooperative effort continues and development of additional facilities at the High School-Middle School Campus have been completed, including relocation of Turcott Field to the school complex, the Northmen Sports Complex was completed, a cross-country trail system through school property was developed, and the six lighted tennis courts were reconstructed.



The City will work with the school district on future uses for the Curtis Stadium facility adjacent to the City-owned Riverbend Park.

Rationale:

Use/Demand/Replacement Facilities

The demand for quality athletic facilities at both the Middle School and High School athletic levels and at the recreational sports program level continues to fuel the need for rehabilitated, upgraded and or expanded indoor/outdoor facilities.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Add score booth and score board to baseball field near Middle School
- Replacement of lower tennis courts with pickleball courts
- Lower Tennis Court Upgrade
- Provide for periodic color top coating and striping of tennis court facilities
- Add landscape and signage improvements

QUARRY PARK

Future Park Vision:

This greenbelt park is positioned within a triangle-shaped area bounded by US-31, Lewis Street, and Rose Street that provides a scenic buffer to Arlington Park and the Lewis Street entryway into the City's Downtown area. Filled, graded, and landscaped in recent years, the Petoskey Area Garden Club now maintains the Lewis Street Gateway flower bed at the park and has planted flower bulbs for a Spring floral display along the hillside that is visible from US-31. In 2005, through the generosity of a former Petoskey resident, a statue was erected at the corner of Lewis and Rose Streets in honor of Ignatius Petoskey, the



City's namesake. The statue and accompanying seating area overlooks Quarry Park and Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay.

Rationale:

Community Events/Tourism/Economic Development

Quarry Park is highly visible from US-31 and Lewis Street and provides a scenic overlook and green belt area along US-31. The development of the T-intersection with Lewis Street at US-31 improved vehicular access to the City's Downtown area and pedestrian crossing between Arlington and Sunset/Bayfront Parks. The installation of an accessible overlook deck could be an added benefit to the park.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Upgrade park landscaping materials and features
- Install City branded signage

RIVERBEND PARK

Future Park Vision:

Located along the southwest bank of the Bear River at Standish Avenue, Riverbend Park underwent major improvements in 2010. An ADA compliant restroom/shelter building was constructed with sidewalks to connect the facilities in the park. The park was also connected with a gravel path to the Bear River Valley Recreation Area. In 2019 the city installed two dedicated pickleball courts. Additional courts could also be added. The skate park features are worn and need to be replaced. Best practice for skate park improvements would be formed concrete.



A continued cooperative arrangement with the Public

Schools of Petoskey allows for access between Riverbend Park and Curtis Stadium and now that the stadium is no longer in use, the City could have greater use of the existing Curtis Stadium site, perhaps eliminating perimeter fencing to join this site with Riverbend Park.

The City is also exploring possible lease, acquisition or easement opportunities to land adjacent to Riverbend Park and corridor easements or acquisition for trail connections to link Riverbend Park to River Road Sports Complex and the former City Landfill property.

Rationale:

Community Events/Tourism/Economic Development

This is the only City facility that serves such activities as skateboarding, pickleball and sand volleyball. The park's redevelopment will provide upgraded facilities in a location that is immediately adjacent to the School District's football and track stadium and a sufficient distance from residential districts to minimize noise concerns.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Replace components of skate park equipment as it ages
- Develop accessible canoe and kayak launch and retrieval area
- Explore easements, lease options or acquisition of adjacent land to expand park area and to provide trail connections to the River Road Sports Complex and land fill site.

RIVER ROAD SPORTS COMPLEX

Future Park Vision:

Following their completion in 1994, the sports fields at this popular park have been heavily used for recreation and sports programs that are sponsored by the City, Public Schools of Petoskey, and Petoskey Youth Soccer Association. Planned improvements include the expansion of construction of additional sports fields; parking-lot expansion and upgrades; disc golf course upgrades; field upgrades; addition of a restroom, concession, and storage building; general landscape improvements; accessible pathways to park features; dedicated off dog leash run area, and installation of a trail that would connect the River Road



Sports Complex to City-owned open space fronting River Road across from the Complex.

The City received a MDNR grant in 2021 for the installation of a Bear River pedestrian bridge that would also serve as a relocation of the North Country/Iron Belle Trail.

Rationale:

User Demand, Public Property Corridor Connectors

The popularity of organized sports, particularly baseball/softball, soccer, and – most recently – lacrosse, has created a need to develop additional ball diamonds and practice and competition sports fields. It is believed that improvements to existing facilities and construction of additional sports fields and related amenities would assist in keeping pace with this growing demand.



Planned Park Improvements:

- Construct restroom, concession, storage building
- Extend City utilities
- Expand sports fields and parking
- Off leash dog run area
- Upgrade trail and disc-golf
- Install general landscaping

SKYLINE MUNICIPAL FOREST

Future Park Vision:

Located in Bear Creek Township, the City's municipal forest property comprises 865 acres and is managed for both recreational and forestry purposes. The property is in proximity to several State-owned parcels that are managed by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and could eventually be linked to other publicly-owned properties, as well as sites that now are owned by not-for-profit groups in Bear Creek Township. It is believed that a significantly larger trail system for hiking, cross country skiing and snowshoeing could be developed on the publicly-owned and privately-owned-but-publicly-used properties. These trails could then be linked to other publicly-owned parcels within the City's corporate limits. Such links would require additional purchases or leases of properties that now are privately owned.



Working with the North Country Trail Association headquarters in Lowell, Michigan, and others, the City could improve and expand hiking and cross-

country ski trails on these forest properties, install directional signage, and construct vehicle-parking areas. In addition, an outdoor firearms range that now is used by the City's Department of Public Safety personnel for training could be expanded and improved for use as a weapons and archery facility by the general public. Future plans have called for constructing a building at the site that could be used as a warming house and rental station for cross-country skiing, as well as a shelter building in other seasons for use as part of recreational programs. The City staff also believes that the need exists to engage in services of a forestry-management consultant to develop a program for periodic harvesting.

In 2022, the City was recommended funding to acquire 58 acres of additional land that is currently surrounded by City owned Skyline Property. The land could be used for the development of a mountain bike course or additional hiking trails.

Rationale:

Environment/Open Space Protection, Use Demand

Preservation of this large tract of forest land provides multiple benefits that include protection of wildlife and forest habitat, open space, views, and watersheds. It is believed that the rustic nature of the property could provide a prime location for passive-recreation uses that might include hiking, crosscountry-skiing, and equestrian trail systems in close proximity to both in-City and rural residential areas.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Continue renewable forestry management procedures
- Improve trail network for motorized and non-motorized use
- Explore expansion of existing City shooting range to a shooting/archery range for public use
- Expand public parking area at trailheads
- Improve signage, access and parking for existing trails
- Explore developing mountain biking or additional non-motorized trails

SOLANUS MISSION BEACH

Future Park Vision:

Listed as Development Area #2 in the City's Tax Increment Finance Authority Financing and Development Plans, work at Solanus Mission Beach was completed in 2005 with extension of the Little Traverse Wheelway through this area, using City-owned properties and an easement that was granted to the City by an adjacent property owner. In addition, improvements along Ingalls Avenue and Water Street also included installations of vehicle-parking areas for use as a trailhead. Landscape improvements as part of these recent projects included enhancement to the City's Ingalls Avenue water-pumping station, and future work at Solanus Mission Beach, which would include the possible installation of a shelter structure, restroom building, and/or spray park and playground area, would be



contingent upon needs of the City's water-utility system, which owns a four-acre portion of the Solanus Mission Beach site.

In 2019, the City submitted a feasibility grant through the Coastal Management Program (EGLE) and was recommended for development of an overlook deck and shoreline boardwalk. The City applied for and received a development grant for the project with was installed in 2022.

Rationale:

Shoreline Preservation/Use Demand, Tourism

It is believed that the development of the Solanus Beach properties, along with the adjacent West Bayfront Park properties, insures that the general public will continue to have use of parklands that will both protect and insure access to Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay. The extension of the bike path across this property and future facilities such as a spray park and/or playground, restroom and shelter facility, and other improvements in Bayfront Park West will only enhance Petoskey's reputation as a tourist-destination community.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Add site amenities
- Restroom
- Playground
- Shelter

SUNSET PARK

Future Park Vision:

Sunset Park provides spectacular views of Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay and serves as a scenic roadside park along US-31. The stair tower connecting Sunset and Bayfront Parks was completed in 2020. Other improvements could include: improvements to the parking area and sidewalks, lighting, natural barrier using landscaping, accessible pathways and an overlook deck.



Rationale:

ADA Compliance, Facility Maintenance

Modifications proposed for Sunset Park primarily relate to upgrading park amenities to insure ADA compliance and general maintenance issues. This work would include sidewalk and parking lot replacement, long-term replacement of barrier fencing, and an overlook deck with seating areas.

Planned Park Improvements:

- Replace sidewalk and parking lot
- Correct ADA deficiencies
- Replace barrier fencing (long-term project)

WASHINGTON PARK

Future Park Vision:

Washington Park continues to function as a neighborhood park, though the ball diamond would continue to be used for organized-sports activities, such as T-ball or youth Planned site improvements baseball/softball practice. include development of a pedestrian access to the park from Emmet Street, installation of parking areas at the Petoskey Street street-ends. and installation of pathwavs. landscaping, signage, playground replacement, accessibility upgrades and possible a pavilion and restroom. Possible incorporation of a dog obstacle course could be considered. A master plan for Washington Park should be developed.



Rationale:

ADA Compliance, Use Demand, Facility Maintenance

Proposed installations of pedestrian-entry and parking improvements would provide greater accessibility to the site. Improvements for the ball diamond and its features would be necessary and also replacement of the playground. The site needs accessibility improvements if trails and amenities are added.

WINTER SPORTS PARK

Future Park Vision:

As a popular, multi-use, and year-round facility, the vision for the Winter Sports Park is to maintain and improve this park so that it can continue to provide a variety of recreation opportunities to the community through well-maintained and upgraded facilities and equipment. Investment in the lodge and hockey rink will only enhance the usability of the property

Rationale:

Use Demand, Facility Maintenance

It is believed that the year-round popularity of Winter Sports Park facilities requires that be refurbished periodically. Greater access to the park, particularly by pedestrians, is also seen as important. Finally, long-range improvements are believed advantageous to lengthen the outdoor skating season and to provide other multi-use facilities for summer-season activities.

Planned Park Improvements: Following the comprehensive redevelopment of the Winter Sports Park in 1992, major future work at the park would involve primarily the upgrading of facilities and completion of certain other projects that had not been included as part of major work years ago, but instead had then been considered long-term in nature. In 2022, the City was recommended funding through the MDNR Trust Fund program for a pavilion over the existing hockey rink. The match for the program was given by Petoskey Rotary and other donors. A capital campaign is currently underway for a total overhaul of the hockey rink:

- Refurbish building, including replacements of decks, interior floor, windows, doors, roof and furnishings
- Install landscaping at entry road, parking area, and hillsides
- Hill grading to accommodate tubing/snow activities
- Upgrade basketball court (with pavilion upgrade)
- Upgrade soccer-field area
- Improve pathway entries off Bay Street and Lake Street
- Improve hockey rink with new surface, boards and covered pavilion for year around recreation activities.

FUTURE PROJECTS

In addition to the specific improvements outlined earlier in this document there are several long- range projects that have tentatively been considered. These include potential disposal and/or reuse of City owned, non-park properties; acquisition through conservation easements or other means, provide open space areas both within and outside the City that possibly would provide buffers between residential areas, provide links between publicly owned or publicly used properties; acquisition and/or conversion of properties for use as neighborhood park sites; development of a community swimming pool and related facilities; preparation of site plans for parks; and installation of signs to identify City owned and City operated facilities, including parks.

City wide Art Program

Staff and elected officials, along with other community organizations have an interested in developing a city wide art display program. The art program could be a mix of events, permanent and temporary displays located on public property throughout the city limits. Parks certainly would play a major role in the program. There are several routes being discussed to make the art a more physical and interactive for the users.

Disposal of and/or Re-Use of City-Owned Properties

The City currently owns several parcels of property throughout the City and outside of the City's corporate limits that are used for a variety of purposes other than as parks. It is believed that these parcels could be considered for use as parks and/or sports and recreation facilities, or that certain parcels could be disposed of, the proceeds from such sales then being used to offset costs of other City expenditures including the costs related to developing or improving park facilities.

Waterfront Access and Park Connections

City owned parcels within the Sheridan Street/Clarion Avenue area, which originally had been acquired for a variety of reasons and that are now being used for a variety of purposes, could and have been converted to park uses and some could be sold to finance park improvements. Examples include a collection of adjacent parcels along the north side of Sheridan Street, near Clarion Avenue, which have been converted for use as a community garden and could further be utilized to provide pedestrian connectors to the Curtis Park Area and the Bear River Valley Recreation Area; the City-owned property at the southwest corner of Sheridan Street and Clarion Avenue, which has for several years been used for storage primarily by the City's Department of Public Works, that could be used for a neighborhood park and/or open-space area, but that also could be sold; the City-owned property on the south side of Sheridan, just east of Clarion Avenue adjacent to the Bear River which now contains storage buildings and drop-off for composting materials, is being partially used for a trail connection along the Bear River Valley Recreation Area and with the removal and relocation of the existing facilities could provide an opportunity for a boat launch/retrieval area. Also in close proximity to the river valley is City-owned property at the southwest corner of Charlevoix Avenue - Ingalls Avenue curve (620 Ingalls), the site of a former store building that was donated to the City and was being leased by the Little Traverse Historical Society, where it is believed a small park or small residential house could be installed on-site with removal of the building. Further, it is believed the properties adjacent to or in close proximity of the Bear River could be acquired, either by purchase, lease, or donation, for use as additional open-space attached to the Bear River Valley Recreation Area, Riverbend Park, and River Road Sports Complex. Such a potential site exists along Standish Avenue. Bear Creek Township also owns land adjacent to the River Road Sports Complex that could be used for recreational purposes or to house certain shared uses.

Community Dog Park

Public input regarding the need for a community dog park was very strong in development of the last few master plans. There have been several conversations with other local units of government and

non-profit organizations to develop a "Community Dog Park" which would all have a shared responsibility to oversee the park. No individual municipality, at this time, has the maintenance resources or funding to fully operate and maintain a dog park designed to best practice.

Creation of or Investing in Neighborhood Parks

In addition to the City's three neighborhood parks, Washington, Lockwood, and Curtis, the School District's four elementary schools, because of "strategic" locations throughout the City, provide parklike setting with playgrounds and other amenities function as neighborhood parks. However, there is the possibility of creating additional "pocket" parks by acquiring other selected properties. In some cases, non-park properties that are owned by the City could be converted to park use or the proceeds from the sale of these properties utilized to offset costs of developing or improving parks. Such City owned properties exist on Sheridan Street, Clarion Avenue, Grand Avenue, and Washington Street. Several properties on Sheridan Street and Lindell Avenue have already been converted to park or trail-head use.

Bay Harbor Connection

Although Resort Township's East and West Parks are located within the City Limits as a result of the Township-City Intergovernmental Agreement that transferred jurisdiction of the Bay Harbor territory to the City, connections between the Little Traverse Wheelway, East Park and the Village have been improved through completion of the Quarry Park Trail. Continued efforts to improve connections will be made.

Development of a Community Swimming Pool

More than a swimming pool specifically, public input through the planning process identified a need for improved water access for swimming. Over the years residents and several formal groups, including the local YMCA, have expressed the desire for an indoor climate-controlled facility that could provide for recreational use, general fitness, swimming and water safety instruction, lap swims, aquatic therapy and competitive swim events. Although the community desires such a facility, where to locate and how to finance construction and maintenance of such a facility has yet to be resolved.

Preparation of Site Plans

It is believed that site plans should be prepared for several parks that currently lack such plans to help aid and guide potential development or redevelopment. These include updates to the Magnus Park Master Plan, and master plans for each neighborhood and downtown area parks.

Improve Signage

The City recently embarked on a signage program for its park system and had new entry signs and facility signage designed and installed at Bayfront Park, Sunset Park, Bear River Valley Recreation Area, Riverbend Park, and the Winter Sports Park. It is believed that this signage program should continue at other City parks as existing signage comes up for replacement as parks are redeveloped. City staff also believes that interpretive and informational wayfinding signs should also be expanded within the Bear River Valley Recreation Area and other park areas where such signage would benefit the general park users, especially along non-motorized trails and nature trails.

Lamprey Barrier Modification

Fishing interests have also expressed the desire to modify the existing Lamprey Barrier installed by the U.S. Fisheries and Wildlife Service on the Bear River near Lake Street so as to allow steelhead, salmon and other species access to the upper Bear River. Again, fisheries studies should be undertaken to insure that the fish migration, if allowed, does not significantly impact the Bear River and the headwaters of Walloon Lake, as well as to continue to provide an effective barrier to the invasive and destructive lamprey eel population.

Livable Shoreline/No-Mow Areas

Whenever possible and plausible the City will consider creating "no mow" designated areas within the parks. These areas will be considered in locations where active public benefit will not be compromised. The conversions will be professionally evaluated and planned with native species with natural design elements. The shoreline properties are also candidates for "livable" design implementation. A livable shoreline mimics natural elements such as sloping/grading, native shoreline landscaping, cobble stone and wave/water attenuation improvements.

Local property values are increasing however, the limits on local governments due to the Headlee Amendment and Proposal A continue to impact the availability of local revenues for parks and recreation. To continue the maintenance and expansion of the high quality park system the residents and visitors of Petoskey have come to expect, the use of partnerships and outside funding sources remains essential. Funding sources from the local, state, and federal levels will change and the City will be prepared to take advantage of these opportunities to implement this Master Plan.

An essential part of planning for Parks and Recreation is resiliency and sustainability. In 2020, the Parks and Recreation Department underwent a master plan amendment to include a resiliency and sustainability chapter. The ability of parks and recreational spaces to withstand and recover from disruptive events such as storms, high water levels, erosion, fluctuating temperatures, and flooding is a high priority for the City of Petoskey.

Planning for the long-term resiliency and sustainability of the parks and open spaces is significant for the City. Over the last several years, the City has seen shoreline devastation, erosion, flooding and storms that have pommeled 100-year-old trees in parks. Additionally, the water levels have fluctuated from record lows to record highs at an unprecedented rate. Resiliency planning is important to the success of the future of the Parks and Recreation system.

As park use increases, potential impacts on resources increase. The purpose of the amendment is to add to the existing Park and Recreation Master Plan to address resiliency and sustainability best management practices.

SUSTAINABILITY AND RESILIENCY

Resiliency is the ability of a system or organization to respond to or recover from a crisis and/or disruptive process. Sustainability pertains to a system that maintains its own viability by using techniques that allow for continual use. Table 2 highlights the City Parks and which sustainability measures should be implemented at each park.

Shoreline Improvements

Shoreline Improvements respond to the irregular seasonal fluctuation of the Great Lakes in order to provide greater resiliency to the shoreline using best practices for long-term stability and environmental impact.

Sustainable Facility Design

Sustainable facility design is the philosophy to be implemented for development of new parks and recreation facilities and for upgrades to existing parks facilities, and includes emphasis on sustainability from several perspectives: use of native or locally available materials, use of native, hardy, site-appropriate plant materials, implementation of best management practices with regard to stormwater management.

Recycling

Improve recycling efforts to the degree possible, as applicable for each facility identified. Consider placement of recycling facilities for intuitive use and ease of maintenance in order to maximize effectiveness.

Invasive Species Management

Control or elimination of invasive species is a focus for all park's projects. However, some parks facilities have exhibited a sensitivity to the spread and impacts of invasive species. For these facilities, an advanced invasive species control plan is critical.

Landscaping BMP (Best Management Practices)

Landscape improvements should not only seek to improve aesthetics and function, but should also consider native species, nursery origin, hardiness and tolerance of specific site conditions, longevity, and growth rate. Consideration of these objectives will result in landscape improvements that are resilient and cause minimal impact on the surrounding environment.

Stormwater Management BMP (Best Management Practices)

Stormwater Management BMP refers to minimizing the impact of stormwater runoff using sustainable measures that provide minimal to no impact to the surrounding environment. This

includes emphasizing on-site stormwater treatment and controlled release, which results in improved stormwater discharge quality. Some common stormwater management BMP include rain gardens, bioswales, and stormwater structures with solids and oils separators. BMPS should also be engineered for maintenance efficiency where possible.

Riverbank Stabilization

The Bear River features a significant drop within city limits, and a water level with a broad range of fluctuation. On the last mile before meeting Little Traverse Bay, the river drops over 80' in elevation and accepts numerous stormwater outflows from regional stormwater facilities. For these reasons, riverbank stabilization is a critical component of any riverside park's facility. Sustainable stabilization measures can include soft reinforcement such as live staking and planting, which can also result in habitat improvements and improved aesthetics.

PARTNERSHIPS AND COLLABORATIONS

The City of Petoskey continues to work with organizations to develop and expand partnerships to work towards sustainable parks and recreation facilities and amenities.

Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council

The City Parks and Recreation Department often consults Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council regarding shoreline revetment, stormwater management, and plant identification.

Top of Michigan Trails Council

The City of Petoskey and Trails Council partner on trail advocacy, planning, funding and coordination with the "LTW Trail Ambassador" program.

Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians

The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians assists the City with planning improvements, grant support and providing historical context to areas of cultural significance.

Public Schools of Petoskey

The Public Schools of Petoskey and the City of Petoskey share responsibilities for a few park properties. Both entities collaborate to maintain sustainable facilities for long term use.

CAKE CISMA

The Cooperative Invasive Species Management Area (CISMA) serving Charlevoix, Antrim, Kalkaska, and Emmet Counties (CAKE) is relied heavily upon for invasive species mitigation, treatment and funding.

Local Units of Government

The City collaborates with Resort Township, Emmet County and Bear Creek Township for regional issues. The Little Traverse Wheelway extends through multiple jurisdictions and each municipality plays an integral role in maintaining the trail. The City and Bear Creek Township has been in discussions about partnering to construct a dog park to serve both City and township residents.

North Central Michigan College

The City and North Center Michigan College (NCMC) continue to have a fruitful relationship. Bates baseball complex operated by the City is located on NCMC property. Most recently, the City and the college collaborated on the installation of the Iron Belle/Bear River Bridge that connected the college Natural Area to the River Road Sports Complex.

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
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
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

Q2 How often have you or a family member participated in a fee based recreation program through the City of Petoskey in the last 5 years?






Q3 What age for recreation programming are you or your family most interested in? (Check all that apply)



Q2 How often have you or a family member participated in a fee based recreation program through the City of Petoskey in the last 5 years?






Q3 What age for recreation programming are you or your family most interested in? (Check all that apply)



That being said, I find that far more kids and families utilize the playground equipment than I had thought would when I originally moved to the house 1.5 years ago. Last winter I ended up calling the police on more than one occasion because cars liked to park here with lights directly on the nearby houses or people camped out in their cars overnight. If there is additional parking, I think having a gate or other security measures would be helpful. Since it is outside of the main downtown I worry people would utilize this space unnecessarily. 

The enclosed map highlights the proposed project limits.

Scope Upgrades relative to the Bridge Street reconstruct include water main and valve replacement; water service line investigations and upgrades; sanitary sewer main and manhole structure replacement; replacement of storm sewer main and catch basin structures; new pavement and subgrades; curb and gutter replacement, new concrete drive approaches and new sidewalks. Highlights relative to the mill and fill or resurfacing of Porter and Maple Streets includes curb and gutter revisions at the intersection of Maple Street and Charlevoix Avenue along with miscellaneous as-needed repairs to both streets that will include curb and gutter, water and sewer facilities, drive approaches and sidewalks.

Electric system upgrades include duct-bank installations for conversions from overhead to underground, service line conversions and new street lighting.






