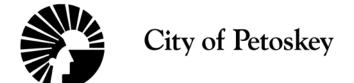

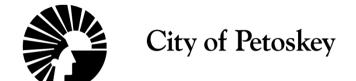

CITY COUNCIL

June 7, 2021

A regular meeting of the City of Petoskey City Council was held from virtual locations on Monday, June 7, 2021. This meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M.; then, after a recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, a roll call then determined that the following were

Also in attendance were City Manager Rob Straebel, Clerk-Treasurer Alan Terry, City Planner Amy Tweeten, Public Safety Director Matthew Breed, City Attorney's James Murray and Matt Cross and Administrative Assistant Lisa Denoyer.

Support Carbon Dividend Act – Resolution No. 19545

Ron Marshall, member of the Citizens Climate Lobby, gave a brief presentation on the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act H.R. 2307 and was asking City Council for their support.

City Councilmembers inquired on the political climate in Washington D.C. concerning this matter; inquired if large companies were in support of the Act; inquired on Representative Bergman's position; heard from those that are part of some groups in favor of the Act and if there were any procedures prohibiting Council involvement; inquired if the support resolution would be adverse to what is being discussed; and commented that there are several competing bills.

Mr. Marshall responded that there is support in Washington D.C. for this Act and Representative Bergmann serves on a bipartisan board.

The City Manager responded that there is no written policy on City Councilmembers being involved in matters relative to current issue reviewing this matter.

City Councilmember Walker moved that, seconded by City Councilmember Marshall adoption of the following resolution:

Resolution urging the United States Congress to enact the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2021 (H.R.2307)

WHEREAS, an Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change issued a special report on the impacts of global warming of 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels in October 2018 warning that global warming is likely to reach 1.5°C between 2030 and 2052 if it continues to increase at the current rate; and

WHEREAS, the United Nations climate science body said in a monumental climate report that we have only until 2030 to make massive and unprecedented changes to global energy infrastructure to limit global warming to moderate levels; and

WHEREAS, the United States government released its Fourth Annual Climate Assessment in November 2018 reporting that the impacts of climate change are already being felt in communities across the country, and that more frequent and intense extreme weather and climate-related events, as well as changes in average climate conditions, are expected to continue to damage infrastructure, ecosystems, and social systems that provide essential benefits to communities; and

WHEREAS, conservative estimates by the world's climate scientists state that, to achieve climate stabilization and avoid cataclysmic climate change, emissions of greenhouse gases (GHGs) must be brought to 80-95% below 1990 levels by 2050; and

WHEREAS, presently the environmental, health, and social costs of carbon emissions are not included in prices paid for fossil fuels, but rather these externalized costs are borne directly and indirectly by all Americans and global citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change issued a special report on the impacts of global warming of 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels in October 2018 stating that explicit carbon prices remain a necessary condition of ambitious climate policies; and

WHEREAS, to begin to correct this market failure, Congress can enact the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2021 (H.R.2307) to assess a national carbon fee on fossil fuels based on the amount of CO₂ the fuel will emit when burned and allocate the collected proceeds to all U.S. households in equal per capita shares in the form of a monthly dividend; and

WHEREAS, for efficient administration, the fossil fuels fee can be applied once, as far upstream in the economy as practical, or at the port of entry into the United States; and

WHEREAS, as stated in the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2021 (H.R. 2307), a national revenue neutral carbon fee starting at a relatively low rate of \$15 per ton of CO2 equivalent emissions and resulting in equal charges per ton of CO2 equivalent emissions potential in each type of fuel or greenhouse gas should be assessed to begin to lower what are now dangerously high CO2 emissions. The yearly increase in carbon fees, including other greenhouse gases, shall be at least \$10 per ton of CO2 equivalent each year, with the provision that the annual increase will be \$15 per ton of CO2 equivalent if statutory goals are not met; and

WHEREAS, the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2021 (H.R.2307) specifies that, in order to protect low and middle income citizens from the economic impact of rising prices due to the carbon fee, equal monthly per person dividend payments shall be made to all American households (one-half payment per child under 19 years old) each month from the fossil fuel fees collected. The total value of all monthly dividend payments shall represent 100% of the net carbon fees collected per month; and

WHEREAS, the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2021 (H.R.2307) encourages market-driven innovation of clean energy technologies and market efficiencies which will reduce harmful pollution and leave a healthier, more stable, and more prosperous nation for future generations; and

WHEREAS, the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2021 (H.R.2307) will lead to a decrease in America's CO2 emissions of 30 percent in five years relative to a 2005 baseline, based on the Columbia University report, and will preserve national employment; and

WHEREAS, border adjustments - carbon content-based levies on products imported from countries without comparable carbon pricing, and refunds to our exporters of carbon fees paid - can maintain the competitiveness of U.S. businesses in global markets; and

WHEREAS, a national carbon fee can be implemented quickly and efficiently and will respond to the urgency of the climate crisis because the federal government already has in place mechanisms, such as the Internal Revenue Service, needed to implement and enforce the fee, and already collects fees from fossil fuel producers and importers; and

WHEREAS, a national revenue neutral carbon fee would make the United States a leader in mitigating climate change and in the clean energy technologies of the 21st century and would provide incentive to other countries to enact similar carbon fees, reducing global CO2 emissions without the need for complex international agreements:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City of Petoskey, Michigan, urges the United States Congress to enact without delay the **Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2021 (H.R.2307)**; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Manager or City Clerk, no later than 30 days after passage of this Resolution, shall transmit copies of this resolution to the President and Vice President of the United States, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, to the Majority Leader of the Senate, to each U.S. Senator and Representative from the State of Michigan in the Congress of the United States, and to nearby city and county governments urging that they pass similar resolutions.

BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council does and hereby confirms that the draft minutes of the May 17, 2021 regular session City Council meeting be and are hereby approved; and

BE IT RESOLVED that receipt by the City Council of a report concerning all checks that had been issued since May 17, 2021 for contract and vendor claims at \$594,813.23, intergovernmental claims at \$402.37, and the May 27 payroll at \$212,335.85, for a total of \$807,551.45 be and is hereby acknowledged.

Hear Public Comment

Mayor Murphy asked for public comments and there were no comments.

Hear City Manager Updates

The City Manager reported that at a previous meeting there was an inquiry as to the current enrollment for the Voluntary Green Pricing Program and reviewed to-date the number of participants per classification including nonprofit (4), commercial (21), industrial (1), residential (195) for a total of 221 participants; reviewed infrastructure resurfacing project updates; that the Little Traverse Bay Band of Odawa Indians recently approved \$6,000 for the schematic drawings on the West Connector Trail along US-31 which will reduce the overall costs of design and engineering for Resort Township, Emmet County and the City and thanked the tribe for their continued support; that the City is collaborating with the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Cities Initiative and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation on National Coastal Resiliency Funding for coastal communities along Lake Michigan developing measures to mitigate coastal erosion issues; that the City received approval from MDOT to install 29 collapsible bollards on US-31 along the curve of Eppler Road to better delineate motorist and bicyclist lanes improving safety; reviewed that the Emmet County Local Emergency Order ends June 30, 2021 which allowed for public meetings to be held virtually and that City Council concurred to begin in-person meetings in July with the first meeting being July 19 and staff was looking for direction on whether or not City Council would like to continue to offer virtual meetings for board and commission meetings and that staff is researching audio and video solutions to setup the Council Chambers with up-to-date technology and have received three quotes ranging from \$22,000 - \$58,000; that a lifeboat from the steamer J.B. John was recently restored by Lon Callaway and Tom Olson and is now on display at Bayfront Park; and that an 80' clear span pedestrian bridge was delivered to the River Road Sports Complex this morning and will be assembled and set this week with staff anticipating the bridge open to the public no later than July 4.

City Councilmembers commented on the speed limit change and process along US-31; that the City would need to contact MDOT requesting to perform and have Michigan State Police do a speed survey and will bring information back to City Council for review; inquired if there were additional measures that could be implemented to increase safety; and inquired where the \$6,000 tribal monies came from.

The City Manager responded that there are not many options, but the immediate concern was addressing the Eppler Road intersection and bollards and repainting of fog line addresses these issues and that City staff reached out to the tribe for any potential monies.

<u>Approve Board and Commission Appointment – Resolution No. 19547</u>

Mayor Murphy reviewed that City Council consider the following appointment.

City Councilmember Marshall moved that, seconded by City Councilmember Walker adoption of the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council does and hereby approves the appointment of Diana Harrold, 428 Beech Street, to the TIFA Board to fill a vacated term ending August 2023.

<u>Discuss Housing North Deed Restriction Program</u>

The City Manager reviewed that City Council heard a presentation at its May 3 meeting by Steve Schnell and Yarrow Brown on a deed restriction program in the City of Charlevoix administered by Housing North; that City Council discussed creating a voluntary deed restriction program since there is not currently a funding mechanism to acquire deed restrictions in Petoskey; that the City Attorney understands the housing shortage, but had concerns with why the City needed to be involved with the program; that the City would be a "third-party beneficiary" regarding enforcement and currently the City has no ordinance regulating such instruments; that the City Attorney is concerned about the request for the City to indemnify Housing North; and that the City Attorney suggested another approach for City Council to consider a resolution of support for the voluntary deed restriction program and if a fully-funded deed restriction program develops, it would likely be administered through public or public-private entity and agreements could be discussed at that time.

The City Attorney reviewed that the City should be careful to assume duty to enforce and that the program could cause requests to lower taxable values through the Michigan Tax Tribunal.

City Councilmembers commented that the City does not have the second home issue that Vail, Colorado experienced with their program; that the program may not fit with what the City is trying to address and accomplish with the housing crisis; and a majority were in agreement to support a resolution in support of a voluntary deed restriction.

Approve Funding a Housing Ready Program Director – Resolution No. 19548

The City Manager reviewed that at the May 17 meeting, a majority of Councilmembers directed staff to work with Housing North representatives on a contract to partially fund a full-time regional housing coordinator for roughly 2 ½ years; reviewed proposed contract; that Housing North is seeking funding from other governmental agencies and reviewed agency commitments and not many seem in favor of supporting this position; that City of Harbor Springs has committed to funding for three years; that request from Emmet County was withdrawn and the County is holding their housing planning meeting in August and hopes to develop their strategy for addressing housing issues at that time; that funding a housing coordinator is consistent with Goal Six of the City's Action Plan to "promote affordable/workforce housing within the community"; and that staff's recommendation is that the City could support a regional approach, but not support majority funding.

City Councilmembers discussed process; heard concerns on having other entities involved; inquired on the duration of the agreement; and heard from those in favor of funding the position and the City leading the way on this initiative.

City Councilmember Walker moved that, seconded by City Councilmember Wagner to approve a contractual agreement between Housing North and the City of Petoskey to partially fund a full-time housing coordinator position, contingent upon solidifying full funding with area governmental entities and upon review and approval of an agreement by the City Manager and City Attorney.

Said motion was adopted by the following vote:

Approve FOPLC 2021-2023 Contract for Public Safety Officers – Resolution No. 19549

The City Manager reviewed that after months of discussions with the Fraternal Order of Police Labor Council (FOPLC) Public Safety Officer's Division, staff and union representatives negotiated a tentative agreement on the expired union contract and reviewed proposed changes to the new contract.

City Councilmember Marshall moved that, seconded by City Councilmember Wagner adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, certain Department of Public Safety Officers unionized staff members are represented by the Fraternal Order of Police Labor Council (FOPLC); and

WHEREAS, City and bargaining unit representatives negotiated provisions of a proposed agreement for the Public Safety Officers Division; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager now has reported that an agreement has been reached with the FOPLC Public Safety Officers Division for the period of January 1, 2021– December 31, 2023:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Manager and Public Safety Director are hereby directed to execute on behalf of the City an employment agreement with the Department of Public Safety Officers Division who are represented by the Fraternal Order of Police Labor Council.

Said resolution was adopted by the following vote:

<u>Approve MERS Defined Contribution Plan Adoption Agreement for Public Safety Officer's – Resolution No. 19550</u>

The City Manager reviewed that per the previously approved FOPLC 2021-2023 contract covering Public Safety Officers calls for a defined contribution retirement plan for new hires; that the plan provides for the City to contribute an amount equal to 5% of the employee's wage, employees may contribute up to 5% which the City will match for a total employer contribution of 10%; that the City's contribution to the plan will vest with the employee over a four-year period; and that MERS requires a revised Defined Contribution Plan Adoption Agreement to establish the plan and plan provisions which mirror those in the nonunion and Teamsters defined contribution plans approved in 2016.

City Councilmember Shiels moved that, seconded by City Councilmember Walker adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the City is a participating governmental unit in the Michigan Municipal Employees' Retirement System (MMERS) pension plan document of 1996; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with pension provisions of a renewed collective bargaining agreement with certain unionized employees within the City's Department of Public Safety Officers require changes to the City's current MMERS plan:

NOW, THERFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Petoskey City Council does and hereby elects to establish with the Michigan Municipal Employees' Retirement System (MMERS) a defined contribution plan for the Department of Public Safety, Public Safety Officers hired on or after May 1, 2021. As a result, the current Division 20, B-2 defined benefit plan will be closed to new hires; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the defined contribution plan will provide for the City to contribute 5% and up to an additional 5% match of the optional employee's contribution for a total maximum employer contribution of 10%. Employees will vest at a rate of 25% per year and will be 100% vested following four years, with additional terms as set forth in the plan adoption agreement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Petoskey City Council does and hereby authorizes the City Manager and Director of Finance to prepare and sign all necessary documents with MMERS establishing the defined contribution plan.

Accept Waterways Grant Agreement for Marina Fuel Storage Tanks – Resolution No. 19551

The City Manager reviewed that the City has been recommended to receive a matching grant in the amount of \$125,000 from the State of Michigan Waterways Commission for removal and replacement of the Marina fuel storage tanks; that the estimated total cost of the project is \$250,000; reviewed fuel needs and demands from gas to diesel; and that the project will commence once the Marina is closed for the season.

City Councilmember Walker moved that, seconded by City Councilmember Wagner adoption of the following resolution:

"RESOLVED, that the City of Petoskey, Michigan, accepts the terms of the Agreement as received from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, and that the City agrees, but not by way of limitation, as follows:

- 1. To appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty-five Thousand dollars (\$125,000.00) to match the One Hundred Twenty-five Thousand dollar (\$125,000.00) State grant authorized by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.
- 2. To maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records, and to make them available to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for auditing at reasonable times.
- 3. To construct the facilities and provide the funds, services, and materials as may be necessary to satisfy the terms of the Agreement.
- 4. To ensure that all premises, buildings, and equipment related procedures comply with all applicable State and Federal regulations.
- 5. To establish and appoint the Parks and Recreation Director to regulate the use of the facilities constructed under this Agreement to assure the use thereof by the public on equal and reasonable terms.
- 6. To enforce all State statutes and local ordinances pertaining to marine safety and to enforce statutes of the State of Michigan within the confines of the City pertaining to the licensing of watercraft. Watercraft not fully complying with the laws of the State of Michigan relative to licensing shall not be permitted to use the facility until full compliance with those laws has been made.
- 7. To comply with all terms of the Agreement, including all terms not specifically set forth in the foregoing portions of this Resolution."

Establish 2021 Tax Millage Rates - Resolution No. 19552

The Clerk-Treasurer reviewed the proposed 2021 millage rates and tax revenue; that City Council approved the 2021 Annual Budget at their December 7, 2020 meeting which included a provision for property-tax millage rates to remain the same as in 2020 with no increase due to any unknown effects of the pandemic; that City Council was now being asked to formally establish the millage rates necessary to provide the budgeted property-tax revenue approved in the 2021 Annual Budget for the General Fund, Library Fund and Right-of-Way Fund; reviewed total millage rates; taxable values and State's inflation rate and that the City is required to roll back millage rates due to the Headlee Amendment; and reviewed property tax revenues that will be collected from each levy including general operating, solid waste, library and right-of-way.

City Councilmember Wagner moved that, seconded by City Councilmember Marshall adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, as required by City Charter provisions, the City Manager on November 2, 2020 presented to the City Council the City's proposed annual budget for the 2021 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, as also required by City Charter provisions, the City Council on November 16, 2020, conducted a public hearing to receive comments concerning the proposed budget, including rates of property-tax millages that had been estimated for levies during 2021; and

WHEREAS, following its review of the proposed 2021 Annual Budget, and after conducting a public hearing to receive comments concerning the proposed budget and estimated tax levies, the City Council on December 7, 2020, approved the 2021 Annual Budget:

Discuss Emmet Street Right-of-Way Vacation Request

The City Manager reviewed that the City received a request on May 14 from Lyle Peck, attorney working for Petoskey Grand LLC, to vacate a portion of the Emmet Street right-of-way at the intersection of Mitchell Street and US-31; reviewed legal requirements and regulations that would allow the City to vacate or discontinue any street or portion thereof; that Mr. Peck requested that an approximate .20 acre area of Emmet Street right-of-way be vacated "to enhance the redevelopment potential of the 'pit' which remains a blighted scar of the city's gateway entrance over 15 years"; that without an approved development plan in place for 200 East Lake Street at this time, there is no valid reason for City Council to vacate the Emmet Street right-of-way; that vacation consideration should occur in conjunction with development plans for the site and needs to be studied comprehensively and not in a piecemeal approach; and that staff recommended that City Council not proceed forward with the street vacation request as it would not be necessary for the health, welfare, comfort and safety of the people of the municipality per Act 288 of 1967.

Mayor Murphy asked for City Council and public comments and there were none.

Council Comments

Mayor Murphy asked for City Council comments and City Councilmember Marshall asked if Harbor Hall purchased the Gruler property, which staff confirmed they did. City Councilmember Wagner thanked City staff for their cooperation with coordinating July 4 festivities. City Councilmember Walker asked if the City Assessor is a full-time employee or a contracted employee, which the City Manager confirmed contracted. Mayor Murphy thanked Councilmember Wagner and the Fireworks Committee for efforts as the Co-Chair on Petoskey's July 4 celebration, and thanked Councilmember Shiels for his passion on housing.

There being no further business to come before the City Council, this June 7, 2021, meeting of the City Council adjourned at 10:30 P.M.

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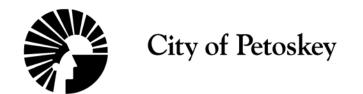

RECOMMENDATION: That the City Council discuss with possible approval

Background Partial funding of a full-time housing coordinator position through Housing North has been discussed at both the May 17 and June 7 City Council meetings. At the June 7 meeting, Councilmembers made the following motion;

"Motion by Walker supported by Wagner to approve a contractual agreement between Housing North and the City of Petoskey to partially fund a full-time housing coordinator position, contingent upon solidifying full funding with area governmental entities and upon review and approval of an agreement by the City Manager and City Attorney."

According to Yarrow Brown from Housing North, the following financial contributions have been solidified for funding the position for one year:

Petoskey/Harbor Springs Area Community Foundation/Frey Foundation	\$50,000
City of Harbor Springs	\$10,000
Resort Township	\$ 5,000
Women Who Care	\$10,000
City of Petoskey (to be determined)	<u>\$10,000</u>
Total	\$85,000

A \$10,000 contribution from the City of Petoskey to Housing North, if approved by City Council, would amount to roughly 11.76% of funding for the one-year position.

Contract highlights include the following:

- The housing coordinator would be employed directly by Housing North and work for Resort Township and the two cities as an independent contractor. Cities and the township would not be responsible for any state or federal income tax withholdings.
- The contract would expire one year from the start date of independent contractor with Housing North.
- The contract could be terminated by either the City or Housing North with at least 30days notice.

- The contract stipulation whereby the City Manager could approve additional services subject to budgetary controls of the City has been deleted according to direction from City Council.
- The City would contribute \$5,000 in 2021 and another \$5,000 in 2022 for a maximum total funding of \$10,000.

The contract has been fully reviewed by the City Attorney. Housing North will continue to seek funding from other governmental agencies.

Funding for the housing coordinator position would be consistent with Goal Six of the City's adopted Action Plan to "promote affordable/workforce housing within the community."

<u>Action</u> The lack of affordable/workforce housing is a regional issue that needs a regional, unified approach-the housing issue should not be addressed through individual efforts of townships, cities and the County. Increasing housing inventory in the area will require a housing coordinator working with multiple levels of government to coordinate housing initiatives across many jurisdictional boundaries.

A this point, three local governments (Harbor Springs, Resort Township and the City of Petoskey), and three non-profits (PHSACF, Frey Foundation, Women Who Care) have all committed to funding a full-time housing coordinator position for one year. Staff believes this satisfies the approved motion by City Council at the June 7, 2021 meeting.

If Council is supportive of participating in funding a regional housing coordinator position through Housing North for one year, Council may consider the following motion:

"Approve the Contractual Agreement between Housing North and the City of Petoskey to partially fund a full-time housing coordinator position."

This Contract, is made and entered into by and between the City of Petoskey, 101 E. Lake St., Petoskey, MI, hereinafter referred to as THE CITY and Housing North, P.O. Box 1434, Traverse City, MI 49685, hereinafter referred to as HN.

In consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, and representations herein contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The purpose of this agreement is to establish formal terms related to technical assistance provided by HN to THE CITY for the purposes of providing Housing Ready Program services.

II. SCOPE OF WORK

HN agrees to perform the functions set forth in Attachment A, hereinafter referred to as "The Project" and comply fully with subsequent revisions and modifications.

III. PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE

The CONTRACTOR shall commence performance of this Contract on or about ______, 2021, and shall complete said performance on or about ______, 2022. Dates to be determine upon when CONTRACTOR commences his/her work.

IV. STIPULATIONS

1. HN is performing Housing Ready Program services contemplated by this Agreement as an independent contractor and is not acting as an employee or agent of THE CITY. As a result of the organization's status as an independent contractor, THE CITY shall not withhold FICA (Social Security and Medicare taxes) from HN's payments or make FICA payments on HN's behalf or make state or federal unemployment compensation contributions on HN's behalf, or withhold state or federal income tax from HN's payments. HN shall pay all taxes incurred while performing services under this Agreement, including

all applicable income taxes and, if HN is not a company, self-employment (Social Security) taxes. On demand, HN shall provide THE CITY with proof that such payments have been made.

- 2. In its capacity as an independent contractor, HN agrees to and represents the following:
 - HN has the right and does fully intend to perform services for third parties during the term of this Agreement.
 - HN has the sole right to control and direct the means, manner, and method by which the services required by this Agreement will be performed.
 - HN is not receiving any training from THE CITY in the professional skills necessary to perform the services required by this Agreement. HN is relying on its own judgment.
 - HN is not required by THE CITY to devote full time to the performance of the services required by this Agreement.
 - HN does not receive the majority of its annual compensation from THE CITY.

The parties acknowledge and agree that THE CITY is entering into this Agreement with reliance on the representations made by HN relative to its independent contractor status.

- 3. A request for Contract modification can be made by either party and will be subject to negotiation, if necessary.
- 4. Governing Law. The parties agree that the validity, construction, enforcement and interpretation of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Michigan.
- 5. Entire Agreement: The Agreement contains the entire Agreement of the parties hereto and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings, oral or written, if any, among the parties.
- 6. Severability: The invalidity or unenforceability of any provision of this Agreement shall not affect the other provisions, and This Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid or unenforceable provision were omitted.

V. COMPENSATION

THE CITY agrees to pay HN as compensation for all costs, work performed and services provided under this Agreement for 12 months; with total payment under contract not to exceed \$5,000 in 2021 and \$5,000 in 2022. HN is not authorized to make any purchases or charge any expenditures to THE CITY. Services shall be billed quarterly and payment is due upon receipt of any invoice.

VI. TERMINATION

1. Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving written notice to the other party of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof, at least 30 days before the effective date of such termination.

2. If either party terminates this Contract, HN will be reimbursed for all hours worked and costs incurred up to receipt date of said effective termination date. THE CITY will receive the work product produced by HN under this Contract up to the effective date of termination, prior to HN being reimbursed. In no case will the compensation paid to HN for partial completion of services exceed the amount HN would have received had the services been completed in full.

VII. INDEMNIFICATION

HN, at its sole cost and expense, shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless THE CITY, its employees, agents, and representatives, for any act or omission of HN, resulting in actual harm, injury, or damage to any person or property, arising out of the work performed, materials furnished or serviced provided under this Agreement by HR or its agents. In addition, HN agrees to name THE CITY as an additional insured on its general liability insurance policy.

SCOPE OF WORK

Housing North will utilize the funding provided under this contract to hire or contract with an individual to conduct the activities described below. This is a full-time position, and is also funded in part by the City of Harbor Springs, Resort Township, the Petoskey-Harbor Springs Area Community Foundation, the Frey Foundation, and possibly other organizations, individuals, and/or public entities. It is expected that this position will be filled on or about August 1, 2021.

Housing North staff will provide professional services to the City of Petoskey and other communities in Emmet County to conduct the following activities:

Finance and Project Support

- Develop an active network of developers, builders, nonprofits, government agencies (e.g., Emmet County Land Bank and Brownfield Redevelopment Authorities), and others to identify potential projects and break down the barriers in order to bring those projects to fruition.
- Develop and keep up-to-date a database of potential development sites.
- Provide assistance to developers and development partners, including public officials, lenders, investors, and nonprofits, in planning, funding, and advocating for housing development that meets local goals with activities including:
 - Identify funding needed to complement developer and other financing in order to achieve affordability goals for target households;
 - Identify potential sources (including Federal, State, regional and local) to meet these needs and work with project partners and other Partnership members to develop funding proposals;
 - Conduct third-party site plan reviews and/or financial reviews of major development proposals to assist with financial need or local development support in the form of tax abatement, infrastructure investments, or related opportunities for public-private partnerships;
 - Work with partners to create and support new local and/or regional affordable housing financing vehicles; and
 - Ultimately helping to close deals and bring attainable housing projects of various scales to fruition.

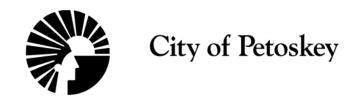
Leadership and Representation

- Develop and maintain strong working relationships with local government officials, developers, lenders, investors, businesses, and nonprofit organizations in the County.
- Liaise with Housing North and other local and regional affordable housing groups to identify opportunities to collaborate, bring to Emmet County relevant experiences and ideas being considered elsewhere in the region, and tap regional resources that could support housing activities in Emmet County.

- Collaborate with local, regional, and statewide nonprofits seeking to build, finance, and market affordable housing within Emmet County.
- Facilitate the development of innovative local policy-based programs, such as deed restrictions that limit occupancy to year-round residents, to help address drivers of the current shortage of affordable housing.
- Assist local units of government on policy development, possible zoning changes, and other initiatives that support the development of attainable housing.

Project Management

Representatives of Housing North and the Little Traverse Bay Housing Partnership will approve a specific annual work plan for the individual performing these services and meet quarterly to review the progress toward these activities. If they so desire, the City of Petoskey and/or other local governments providing support for this project may designate representatives who will participate in these reviews.

WHEREAS, Housing North is advancing a campaign called Homes for our Future to raise awareness and support for housing solutions such as the consideration and adoption of common-sense local policies and practices that will increase the supply of housing in our community, and advancement at the state level of policies that expand and improve access to housing resources for all communities; and

WHEREAS, the City of Petoskey Livable Petoskey Master Plan identifies many of these methods as means to creating neighborhoods for all; and

WHEREAS, Housing North is exploring a voluntary deed restriction program as one method to protect year-round housing from being converted to seasonal housing; and

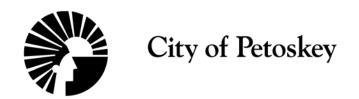
There are four main goals for the Homes for Our Future campaign in 2021:

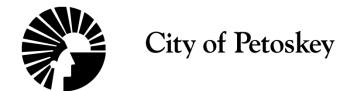
<u>Background</u> At its April 19 meeting, City Council directed staff to develop a draft Request for Proposals (RFP) for the disposal of three (3) identified surplus properties for the purpose of housing construction. The enclosed Draft RFP is based on what was previously distributed for 219 Washington Street, but has not had legal review.

<u>Discussion</u> The surplus properties have varying levels of development/construction issues due to topography, soil conditions, existing easements, or utility availability. The three properties are therefore listed in order of construction ease. It is staff's understanding that Council would consider offers from both for-profit and not-for-profit developers, but that there is an interest in restricting the sale for year-round housing.

There are several items highlighted that Council may or may not be interested in including. In addition, staff would need direction on Council selection priorities such as whether Council would consider a lower purchase price for a more experienced bidder? Is there a preference for proposals to acquire multiple parcels? Is there preferred timeline for construction?

Action Staff is looking for further direction on the Draft RFP.

209 Washington Street

The property at 209 Washington Street is an approximately 8,150 square foot lot (50'x163') that has been vacant for many years. The lot is within the RM-2 Multiple Family Zoning District on the block bounded by Washington, Emmet, Fulton and Petoskey Streets and could possibly support a two-unit structure. The property is immediately adjacent to the commercial properties along Emmet Street, within a block of Washington Park and a half mile of Sheridan School. Water and sewer laterals were stubbed to the property and a shared curb-cut with the property to the east installed in 2017.

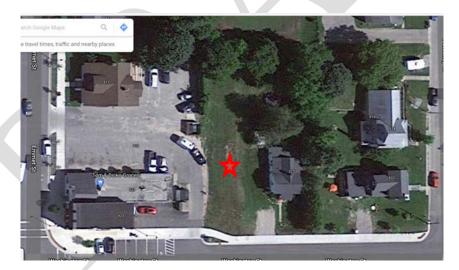

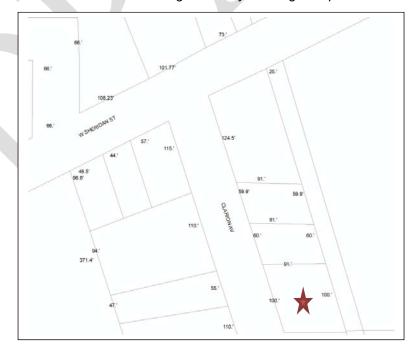

1219 Clarion Avenue looking west (toward Clarion Ave.)

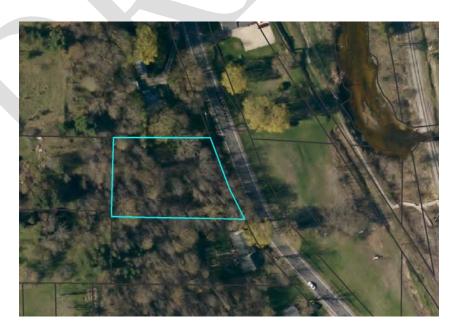

6. Land Purchase Price

A price should be included in the proposal, with the understanding that the price may be negotiable based on the proposed development.

Requirements

The successful proposal submittal for this property will enter into a purchase agreement and development agreement with the City of Petoskey committing to the following requirements, at a minimum. The City *may negotiate additional terms* with the successful bidder.

- A buy-back clause will be included in the purchase agreement allowing the City of Petoskey to repurchase the lot for the selling price should construction not proceed in the timeline established in the development agreement.

By submitting a proposal, you are allowing the City of Petoskey to research previous permits, violations, or judgments against you.

AGENDA SUBJECT: Public Safety Officers – Health Care Savings Program

RECOMMENDATION: That City Council adopt the proposed resolution

Background The recently approved collective bargaining agreement with the Public Safety Officers provides for a Health Care Savings Program administered by the Michigan Municipal Employees Retirement System. The Program requires all Public Safety Officers to participate and to make mandatory contribution in the amount of 3% of their wages, there are no employer contributions.

MERS will manage investments for the account and upon leaving employment with the City, Officers will be able to access the funds for eligible medical expenses. Contributions to the program are pretax contributions and withdrawals from the program are tax-free. Employees may also make additional voluntary contributions, which are post tax contributions, but are tax free upon withdrawal.

The Municipal Employees Retirement System (MERS) requires a HCSP Participation Agreement approved by City Council to establish the plan and plan provisions.

<u>Action</u> Enclosed is the MERS Health Care Savings Program Participation Agreement required by MERS, along with a resolution authorizing execution of the agreement for Council's approval that will establish the plan as provided for in the collective bargaining agreement.

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WHEREAS, the Municipal Employees Retirement Act authorized the Municipal Employees' Retirement Board ("Board") to establish additional programs including but not limited to defined benefit and defined contribution program (MERS Plan Document Section 72; MCL 38.1536(2)(a)).

WHEREAS, the Board has authorized MERS' establishment of the health care savings program ("HCSP" or "Program"), which a participating municipality or court, or another eligible public employer that constitutes a "municipality" under MERS Plan Document Section 2; MCL 38.1502b(2) ("Eligible Employer"), may adopt for its Eligible Employees.

WHEREAS, MERS has been determined by the Internal Revenue Service to be a tax qualified "governmental plan" and trust under section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, and all trust assets within MERS reserves are therefore exempt from taxation under Code section 501(a) (IRS Letter of Favorable Determination dated October 8, 2016).

WHEREAS, the Board has established a governmental trust (the "Trust Fund") to hold the assets of the HCSP, which Trust Fund shall be administered under the discretion of the Board as fiduciary, directly by (or through a combination of) MERS or MERS' duly-appointed Program Administrator.

WHEREAS, 1999 PA 149, the Public Employee Health Care Fund Investment Act, MCL 38.1211 et seq. ("PA 149") provides for the creation by a public corporation of a public employee health care fund, and its `administration, investment, and management, in order to accumulate funds to provide for the funding of health benefits for retirees and beneficiaries.

WHEREAS, a separate MERS health care trust fund created under PA 149 also constitutes a governmental trust established by an Eligible Employer, provided that all such employers shall be the State of Michigan, its political subdivisions, and any public entity the income of which is excluded from gross income under Section 115 of the Internal Revenue Code; provided further, that the PA 149 trust shall not accept assets from any defined benefit health account established under Section 401(h) of the Internal Revenue Code.

WHEREAS, the Board acts as investment fiduciary for the pooled assets of each MERS participating municipality as defined by the MERS 401(a) Plan Document, on whose behalf MERS performs all plan administration and investment functions, and such participating municipalities and courts have full membership, representation and voting rights at the Annual Meeting as provided under Plan Section 78; MCL 38.1545.

WHEREAS, the Board also acts as investment fiduciary for those participating employers who are non-MERS participating municipalities and courts that have adopted the MERS Health Care Savings Program, Retiree Health Funding Vehicle, or Investment Service Program, and such entities are not accorded membership, representation or voting rights provided to MERS participating municipalities and courts at the Annual meeting under Plan Document Section Document 78; MCL 38.1545.

WHEREAS, adoption of this Uniform Resolution and the HCSP Participation Agreement (the "Uniform Resolution") by each Eligible Employer is necessary and required in order that the benefits available under the MERS HCSP may be extended to the Eligible Employer's employees.

- It is expressly agreed and understood as an integral and nonseverable part of extension or continuation of coverage under this HCSP Resolution that Section 43 of the MERS Plan Document shall not apply to this Uniform Resolution Adopting MERS HCSP, the Participation Agreement, the HCSP Plan Document, the Trust Agreement, and their administration or interpretation.
- In the event any alteration of the language, terms or conditions stated in this Uniform Resolution Adopting MERS HCSP is made or occurs, it is expressly recognized that MERS and the Board, as fiduciary of the MERS Plan and its trust reserves, and whose authority is nondelegable, shall have no obligation or duty to administer (or to have administered) the Trust Fund, or to continue administration.

WHEREAS, concurrent with this HCSP Uniform Resolution, and as a continuing obligation, this governing body has completed, approved, and submitted to MERS documents necessary for participation in and implementation of the HCSP. This obligation applies to any documents deemed necessary to the operation of the Trust Fund by MERS.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the governing body adopts (or readopts) the MERS HCSP as provided below.

SECTION 1. HCSP PARTICIPATION

- (A) **CONTRIBUTIONS** shall be as allowed and specified in the MERS Health Care Savings Program Participation Agreement. Basic Employer Contributions, Mandatory Salary Reduction Contributions, Mandatory Leave Conversion Contributions, and Post-Tax Employee Contributions, shall be remitted pursuant to MERS by the Eligible Employer, and credited to the Eligible Employer's separate fund within the MERS Trust Fund.
- (B) **INVESTMENT** of funds accumulated and held in the Health Care Savings Program Trust Fund shall be held in a separate reserve and invested on a pooled basis by MERS subject to the Public Employee Retirement System Investment Act ("PERSIA"), 1965 PA 314, as provided by MERS Plan Document Section 76; MCL 38.1539, and PA 149.
- (C) **THE ELIGIBLE EMPLOYER** shall abide by the terms of the HCSP, including the HCSP Plan Document, HCSP Trust Agreement, all investment, administration, and service agreements, and all applicable provisions of the Code and other law. It is affirmed that no assets from any defined benefit health account established under Section 401(h) of the Internal Revenue Code shall be transferred to, or accepted by, MERS.

SECTION 2. IMPLEMENTATION DIRECTIONS FOR MERS

- (A) The governing body of this Eligible Employer desires that all assets placed in its MERS HCSP Trust Fund (as a sub-fund within all pooled HCSP trust funds with MERS) be administered by MERS, which shall act as investment fiduciary with all powers provided under PERSIA, pursuant to PA 149, all applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code and other relevant law.
- (B) The governing body desires, and MERS upon its approval of this Resolution agrees, that all funds accumulated and held in the MERS HCSP Trust Fund shall be invested and managed by MERS within the collective and commingled investment of all HCSP funds held in trust for all Eligible Employers.
- (C) All monies in the MERS HCSP Trust Fund (and any earnings thereon, positive or negative) shall be held and invested for the sole purpose of paying health care benefits for the exclusive benefit of "Eligible Employees" who shall constitute "qualified persons" who have retired or separated from employment with the Eligible Employer, and for any expenses of administration, and shall not be used for any other purpose, and shall not be distributed to the State.
- (D) The Eligible Employer will fund on a defined contribution, individual account, basis its MERS HCSP Trust sub-fund to provide funds for health care benefits for "Eligible Employees" who shall constitute "qualified persons" under the Internal Revenue Code. Participation in and any coverage under HCSP shall not constitute nor be construed to constitute an "accrued financial benefit" under Article 9 Section 24 of the Michigan Constitution of 1963.
- (E) The Eligible Employer designates and incorporates as "Eligible Employees" who shall constitute "qualified persons" under this HCSP Resolution those who are "Eligible Employees as defined in the HCSP Participation Agreement under this HCSP.
- (F) The Eligible Employer may designate employer contacts who shall receive necessary reports, notices, etc. and shall act on behalf of the Eligible Employer.

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVENESS OF THIS HCSP UNIFORM RESOLUTION

This Resolution shall have no legal effect until an executed copy of this adopting Resolution is filed with MERS, and MERS determines that all necessary requirements under MERS Plan Document Section 72, PA 149 and other relevant laws, and this Resolution have been met. Upon MERS' determination that all necessary documents have been submitted, MERS shall execute this Resolution, and return a copy to the Eligible Employer's designated primary contact.

In the event an amendatory resolution or other action by the Eligible Employer is required by MERS, such Resolution or action may be deemed effective as of the date of the initial Resolution or action where concurred in by this governing body and MERS (and the Program Administrator if necessary). Section 86 of the MERS Plan Document shall apply to this Resolution and all acts performed under MERS' authority. The terms and conditions of this Resolution supersede and stand in place of any prior resolution, and its terms are controlling.
