WHEREAS, on or around July 16, 2019, the Pontiac City Council passed Resolution 19-369 and which instructed the Pontiac City Attorney to draft an amendment to City of Pontiac ordinance 2287 to place the Cable division and appointment of the Cable Director under the legislative branch of City government; thereby, under the direct supervision of the City Council; and,

WHEREAS, the City Attorney advised the Mayor of the City of Pontiac that Resolution 19-369 was "improper" and on or around July 22, 2019 the Mayor issued a veto; and,

WHEREAS, on or around July 29, 2019, the City Council overrode the Mayor's veto of Resolution 19-369 by a vote of five to one; and,

WHEREAS, since July 29, 2019 the City Attorney has refused to draft an amended ordinance and has not presented a draft amended ordinance to the City Council for consideration; and,

WHEREAS, on September 19, 2019 the Mayor and the City Attorney have stated to a member of the City Council that resolutions presented and passed by the City Council are merely advisory and do not need to be followed by the Mayor or the City Attorney; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council has the authority under the City Charter and state law to revise or modify any order implemented by an Emergency Manager, including EM S-280. Resolution 19-369 was a proper exercise of that authority. The City Attorney's opinion that it is improper under the City Charter and State law to make the changes to the applicable City ordinances is without merit; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council believes it is in the best interest of the City of Pontiac and the citizens, to amend the City of Pontiac ordinance to modify the organizational structure of the cable division; and, WHEREAS, City of Pontiac Ordinance No. 2357(B) enacted the "City of Pontiac Medical Marihuana Facilities Ordinance," and there is currently a moratorium on the application process based largely on the Mayor's interpretation of the City Clerk's powers and responsibilities under Ordinance No. 2357(B); and, WHEREAS, during the last several City Council meetings there has been debate and discussion regarding the powers and responsibilities of City Council, the Mayor, the City Attorney, and the City Clerk under the City Charter regarding the above-referenced issues; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council is regrettably left with no option but litigation in order to enforce Resolution 19-369, to confirm and declare the powers and responsibilities under the City Charter as described above, and to seek a declaration that the Mayor's and the City Attorney's recent conduct is unlawful under Michigan law, including a violation of MCL 750.478; and,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Pontiac City Council that pursuant to Section 4.204 of the City Charter, the City Council's attorneys, Clark Hill PLC, are authorized and directed to initiate legal action on behalf of the City Council against Mayor Waterman and all other individuals necessary to enforce the City Council's express rights under the City Charter, including the right to adopt resolutions which have the effect of modifying or changing City Ordinances, and to declare the powers and responsibilities of the City Council, the Mayor and the Clerk under City Charter.

The City of Pontiac Ordains:

Ordinance No. ____
An Ordinance to amend the Municipal Code of the City of Pontiac by amending Chapter 92, General Employees' Retirement System, Section 92-2 to update interest rate and mortality table used to determine actuarial equivalence.

Section 1. Amendments.

The General Employee's Retirement System Ordinance Section 92-2 shall be amended so that the definition of "Actuarial Equivalent" shall read:

Actuarial equivalent means the equivalence in the present value of various forms of payment. Present value will be determined by the Retirement System's actuary based upon the mortality tables and interest rates established from time to time by the Board. For purposes of determining the actuarial equivalence of benefits, the actuary for the Retirement System shall use 7.00% interest rate and the RP-2014 Healthy Annuitant Mortality Table projected to 2021 using the 2-dimensional MP-2014 improvement scale Set Forward 0 Years for retirees and for beneficiaries. The unisex shall be 50% Male and 50% Female.

Section 2. Severability.

If any section, clause, or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared to be unconstitutional, void, illegal, or ineffective by any Court of competent jurisdiction, such section, clause, or provision declared to be unconstitutional, void, or illegal shall thereby cease to be a part of this Ordinance, but the remainder of this Ordinance shall stand and be in full force and effect.

Section 3. Repealer.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 4. Publication.

The Clerk shall publish this Ordinance in a newspaper of general circulation.

Section 5. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be effective ten days after date of adoption.

<u>Article 4 General Provisions, Chapter 1 Accessory Structures and Fences.</u> Section 4.103 Fences or Walls of the City of Pontiac Zoning Ordinance shall be stated as follows.

<u>E. Temporary Construction Fencing</u>. Temporary fencing shall be installed on all residential and non-residential construction sites to ensure security, public safety and mitigate noise and/or dust in accordance with the following:

1. General Provisions

- a. Temporary Construction Fencing shall be installed at the start of any site grading, excavation or building construction, renovation or demolition and be maintained and shall be removed before a certificate of occupancy from the Building & Safety Department.
- b. All construction fencing shall be constructed in a sound and sturdy manner and shall be maintained in a good state of repair, including the replacement of defective parts, and other acts required for maintenance.
- c. Temporary Construction Fencing shall not be permanently attached to the ground or attached to any other structure or material that is itself permanently attached to the ground.
- d. All Temporary Construction Fencing to be secured with metal posts spaced eight foot on-center.
- e. Temporary Construction fencing to be erected in an the public right-of-way or drive way clear vision area shall be subject to the approval of DPW Director, City Engineer or designee.
- f. Temporary Construction fencing shall not enclose a fire hydrant.

2. Non-Residential Construction Sites

- a. Permitted Materials:
 - i. Six foot chain link fence with fabric and/or vinyl screen is permitted.

- ii. Temporary Construction fencing shall be installed on all property lines of the construction site property/parcel with the approval of the Building Official or designee.
- iii. Access opening(s) in the Temporary Construction fencing shall be protected by gates with Chain Link fence.
- iv. Screening made of fabric and/or vinyl must be attached to chain link on the outside of the Temporary Construction fence.
- v. Prohibited Materials
 - 1. Plywood, metal sheets, or similar materials are not permitted.

3. Residential Construction Sites

- a. Permitted Materials:
 - i. Four foot snow fencing is permitted.
 - ii. Temporary Construction Fencing at a residential construction site shall be limited to the area of construction, renovation and/or demolition area on the site. If the area exceeds 60 percent of the total parcel/property area, Temporary Construction Fencing shall be located on all property lines of the construction site parcel/property.
 - iii. Prohibited Materials
 - 1. Plywood, metal sheets, or similar materials are not permitted.
- 4. Temporary Construction Fencing Signs
 - a. A temporary construction sign shall be installed in conformance to the Zoning Ordinance and Section 5.106 Temporary Signs. The provisions of this section shall precede over conflict subsequent sections.
 - b. Emergency access signs, access and safety signs, and visitor check-in signs may be attached to the fencing only on both sides of an entrance for a distance of ten feet, or at locations required by the Building Official or designee.
 - c. Location of traffic control signs attached to Temporary Construction fencing shall be subject to the approval of DPW Director, City Engineer or designee.

<u>Article 6 Administration, Chapter 2 Site Plan Review.</u> Section 6.208 Required Information Table 17 of the City of Pontiac Zoning Ordinance shall be stated as follows.

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THE CITY OF PONTIAC ORDAINS:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 42, "COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT", TO ADD ARTICLE VII, ENTITLED "COMMUNITY PROVISIONING CENTER COMMUNITY BENEFIT AGREEMENTS".

Section 1. Short Title; Purpose.

- (a) This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Pontiac <u>Provisioning Center</u> Community Benefit Ordinance".
- (b) This Ordinance shall require developers of certain types of developments, herein referred to as "Qualified Developments", to enter into agreements, herein referred to as "Community Benefit Agreements", that identify potential negative aspects of developments, and identify proportional community benefits to the City of Pontiac to rectify those negative aspects as a condition for development subsidies and other considerations by the City of Pontiac, and to assist the City Clerk with the scoring and ranking of provisioning center applications pursuant to City Ordinance 2357 (B)

Section 2. Definitions

As used in the Chapter 42, Article VII, the following words and phrases shall mean the following:

- (a) Community Benefit Agreement: An Agreement between the City of Pontiac and Developer providing mutual consideration intended to rectify mutually acknowledged potential negative aspects associated with the proposed Qualified Development.
- (b) Developer: The person, firm, partnership, company, corporation, cooperative, or any other entity that is the recipient of a Development Subsidya party to a Community Benefits Agreement.
- Development Subsidies:

 Any economic incentives of value granted on a discretionary basis by the City of Pontiac to attract or retain a Qualified Development or jobs associated therewith; may include federal, state, or local economic incentives; and include but are not limited to economic incentives associated with, as amended: the Brownfield Redevelopment Financing Act, Commercial Development Act, Commercial Rehabilitation Act, Corridor Improvement Authority Act, Historical neighborhood Tax Increment Financing Act, Local Development Financing Act, Plant Rehabilitation and Industrial Development Districts Act, Principal Shopping Districts and Business Improvement Districts Act. Additionally, the lease or transfer of a city-owned building or property shall constitute a Development Subsidy.

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- (d) Qualified Development: Shall be classified as either a Tier 1 or Tier 2. Tier 1
 Qualified Developments shall be those developments granted license to operate under City
 Ordinance 2357(B). Tier 2 Qualified Developments shall be those developments being
 granted Development Subsidies by the City of Pontiae with a total economic incentive, as
 determined in the sole discretion of the City of Pontiae, of greater than \$50,000.00.
- (c) Qualified Development: Persons or entities submitting an application for a provisioning center permit during the 21-day period for provisioning center applications pursuant to City Ordinance 2357(B).

Section 3. Community Benefits

A Community Benefit agreed upon by the Developer of the Qualified Development and the City of Pontiac is a benefit conferred upon the community of the City of Pontiac intended to ameliorate the potential negative aspects imposed upon the City of Pontiac by the Qualified Development. Although Community Benefits may differ based upon the Qualified Development, and this is not intended to be an exhaustive list, the City of Pontiac recognizes amenities, benefits, or commitments for the following purposes as Community Benefits; by Tier of Qualified Development:

(a) TierRoads: 1: Infrastructure, Police and Fire Services, Job Training, Health Initiative* Education, ParksRoad Repair, Potholes; Road Matching

Tier 2(b): Parks: Designated Projects, Infrastructure, Police and Fire Services, Parks Safety* (cameras): Law Enforcement

(c) High School; Hawthorne Park (Water Park); Neighborhood Revitalization Plan

(d) Job Training and Employment; Transitional Programs (previously incarcerated)

(e) Library and Literacy; Health Initiative Education

(f) Business Development Fund (to assist City of Pontiac residents with funding for businesses and with starting and growing businesses)

As part of its scoring and ranking of provisioning center applications pursuant to City Ordinance 2357(B), the City Clerk may consider those community benefits pledged to the City of Pontiac as part of such application. Any such pledges would be incorporated into a binding Community Benefits Agreement with the City of Pontiac.

It is preferred, and the City Clerk may require, that applicants show that there is a reasonable amount of support in the community for an applicant's pledged community benefits. It is the applicant's responsibility to show community support for its pledged community benefits.

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In using pledged community benefits as part of its scoring and ranking of provisioning center applications pursuant to City Ordinance 2357(B), the City Clerk will evaluate the commitment, quality, duration, community support and amount of the pledged community benefits. If an applicant does not pledge community benefits, such applicant will receive a zero (0) score in certain key segments of the provisioning center application scoring.

If an applicant has pledged community benefits as part of its provisioning center application, before receiving a provisioning center permit, such applicant must enter into a Community Benefits Agreement with the City incorporating such pledged community benefits. The negotiation and completion of such Community Benefits Agreements may occur after the 21-day submission period for provisioning center applications pursuant to City Ordinance 2357(B), but, as it relates to each Developer, such Community Benefits Agreement must be finalized within thirty (30) days after written notice ("Notice") is sent to such Developer by the City indicating that such Developer is entitled to a provisioning center permit with the City, subject only to such Developer finalizing its Community Benefits Agreement regarding such Developer's pledged community benefits with the City. The Mayor may negotiate such Community Benefits Agreements (incorporating the pledged community benefits therein) on behalf of the City of Pontiac, All final Community Benefits Agreements must be approved by the City Council to be effective.

Section 4. Community Benefits Agreement

The Community Benefits Agreement shall be entered into between the City of Pontiac and the Developer of the Qualified Development.

The Community Benefits Agreement shall set forth the Community Benefit proposed by the Developer of the Qualified Development and, if applicable, the interval of such Community Benefit.

Community Benefit Agreements shall be timely recorded on the deed, and shall run with the land, on Qualified Developments for the duration of the Community Benefit Agreement.

The term of a Community Benefit Agreement for a Tier 1 Qualified Development shall be not less than the term of its License to operate under City Ordinance 2357(B), including any extension or renewal thereof. The term of a Community Benefit Agreement for a Tier 2 Qualified Development shall be not less that the length of the Development Subsidy, including any extension or renewal thereof.

Community Benefits Agreements are not transferrable by the Developer without approval through a City Council Resolution.

Section 5. Community Benefits Agreement Required for Every Qualified Development
All Qualified Developments are subject to a Community Benefit Agreements must be approved
by the City Council to be effective.

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and City Council, and such approval may only be subject to the execution of a valid Community Benefits Agreement with the Developer of that Qualified Development.

Section 6. Exemptions Application

If a Qualified Development and/or Developer believes that they should be exempt from a Community Development Agreement, they may file an exemption application with the City Clerk. An Exemption requires approval of the Mayor and City Council and may be approved or denied by the City Council in its sole discretion.

Section 7. Annual Reporting and Compliance

A Developer shall provide a comprehensive, audited report detailing compliance with obligations under its Community Benefit Agreement for the prior year (or partial year) by January 1 of each year. Further, prior to any extension or renewal of a permit to operate under City Ordinance 2357(B), a Developer shall provide a comprehensive, audited report detailing compliance with obligations under its Community Benefits Agreement. Each report shall include backup documentation for all donations made or funds expended related to the Community Development Agreement. The report shall include backup documentation for all donations made or funds expended related to the Community Development Agreement.

Section 8. Breach of Community Benefits Agreement; Termination; Appeal

If the City <u>Clerk Department of Economic Development</u> finds a <u>Qualified Development and/or its</u> Developer to be in breach of its (their) Community Development Agreement <u>(including if discovered as part of the City Clerk's review of the Developer's permit renewal)</u>, it the <u>Clerk shall</u> send a written Notice of Breach of Community Benefits Agreement to the <u>Qualified Development and its</u> Developer by certified mail. If the Breach of Community Benefits Agreement is not cured within fourteen (14) days after the date the Notice of Breach of Community Benefits Agreement was sent, the <u>City Clerk</u>, after a hearing (as necessary), may suspend or terminate the Community Development Agreement. <u>Mayor may terminate the Agreement</u>.

If the Qualified Development and/or Developer believe that the termination was made in error, itthe Developer (they) may Appeal such decision in accordance with their appeals rights under City Ordinance 2357(B). Termination of the Community Benefits Agreement through this process shall result in the suspension of the underlying City Ordinance 2357(B) provisioning center permit, subject to any permitted administrative, legislative or judicial appeal of that termination. Upon the exhaustion of any appeals through the City of Pontiac creating a final determination that the termination of the Community Benefits Agreement was proper, the City Ordinance 2357(B) provisioning center permit shall be permanently revoked, subject to any further statutory appeal process for such permit outside of the City of Pontiac.

<u>in writing Writing</u> to the City Council within thirty (30) days after the date the Notice of Breach of Community Benefits Agreement was sent. The City Council, by Resolution, shall only overturn a decision of the Mayor if it finds the decision was arbitrary or capricious. The determination of the City Council may only be reviewed by the Court of competent jurisdiction within the state of Michigan.

Termination of the Community Benefits Agreement through this process shall result in the suspension of the underlying 2357(B) facility license for Tier 1 Qualified Developments; and the suspension of any economic incentives granted to a Tier 2 Qualified Development; pending the

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any such administrative, legislative, or judicial appeal of that termination. Upon the exhaustion of further appeals creating a final determination that the termination was proper, the 2357(B) facility license or economic incentive granted to a Tier 2 Qualified Development shall be permanently revoked, subject to any further statutory appeal process for those licenses or economic incentives.

Section 9. Severability.

This ordinance and the various parts, sections, and clauses are hereby declared severable. If any clause, sentence, or paragraph or part of this ordinance shall, for any reason, be adjudged or decreed to be invalid by any Court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment or decree shall not effect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this ordinance, but such judgment or decree shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, or part thereof, directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or decrees shall have been entered.

Section 10. Repealer.

That all ordinances or parts of ordinances, of the City of Pontiac in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

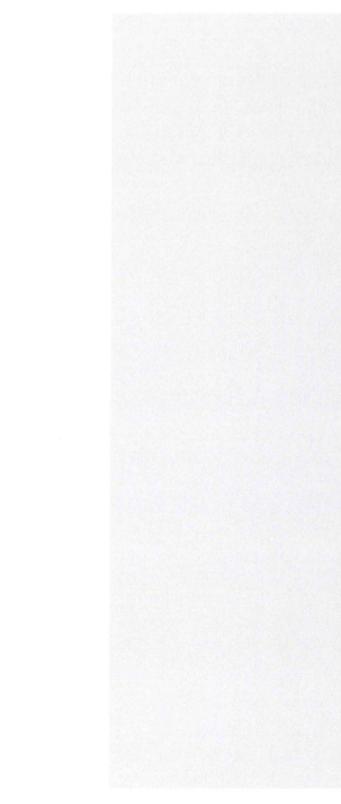

Discussion

1. Dangerous Animal Ordinance

The City Attorney is reviewing other ordinances to determine what will work for Pontiac. The Farmington Hills ordinance does not work. The Farmington Hills ordinance requires an animal review board consisting of the city manager, police chief and fire chief. Currently, the City does not have animal control, so that is an issue. People downtown have complained that pet owners are not cleaning-up behind their animals. Pontiac is a part of Oakland County, so money should be there for the service as the County administers our program. The Executive will reach out to Oakland County to discuss what services they can provide. The City of Pontiac passed a Dangerous Pit Bull ordinance in 2004 when the city had an animal control officer.

2. Blight Court

All of the regulations have been prepared and it has gone before Council. The standards for code enforcement are in place. Two individuals have been identified and are waiting for approval from the Mayor. It was suggested, that there should be two people to allow for a back-up. The hearings will be once a month. The contract for the attorney's was sent today and the contract also has to be approved by the Mayor.

3. Site One/Bedrock located on Featherstone

The smell is back. Code enforcement will investigate.

Across from Bedrock, a property owner wants to erect a fence as the owner owns all the property along the property line. The owner would need to consolidate/combine the lots and consult with Planning. A vinyl fence cannot be constructed, only a 4ft chain like fence.

4. Street Sign on First Street and Second Street

DPW is working to replace the signs, but has not gotten to those locations yet. The money was placed in the budget to replace street signs. Kettering/Galloway Park area is partially owned by the Railroad and the City. Referred to the contractor to cut the grass.

5. Discussion on putting a crosswalk across Perry Street to high school and middle school If sidewalks are placed near the high school, once you place them there, you do not have the people to maintain them. If a sidewalk is in front of a property, the resident is responsible for the maintenance. The area by Kettering and Perry (name of street to be provided), has no sidewalks. Not a new subdivision.

By Emerson and University, there are small sidewalks and then there are no sidewalks. Some CDBG funds can possibly be set aside. Initially, there was \$600,000 and now there is \$50,000 left. This coming year, the City can take a look again to determine if the are qualifies. The City is close to completing the demolition program and it should be complete by the end of the year. However, every quarter, the Board of Review determines what properties should be demolished, so there will always be properties that will have to be torn-down even after the program is complete. A consideration might be to reduce the funds for demolition an add funds for sidewalks or capital improvements.

6. Phoenix Center Settlement Agreement

The Executive wanted to make sure everyone has a copy, is on the same page and is aware of the timeline and responsibilities.

7. Community Benefits Ordinance

The City Attorney has to approve as to form and possibly has not had the time to review the ordinance passed by Council.

Pontiac Mayor Deirdre Waterman Announces Development of Former Silverdome Site: Plans set in motion for Distribution Center upon approval of Amazon Deal

PONTIAC—The storied history of the Pontiac Silverdome is soon expected to boast a new chapter. The 127-acre site that is former home of the Detroit Lions and Detroit Pistons may soon land another big name tenant—Amazon.

Plans are in the works to redevelop the site into a regional distribution center for the retail titan. If developed, the \$250 Million planned project is expected to create over 1,500 full time jobs for the area and be the first site nationally for Amazon to have both a fulfillment center and delivery station.

First steps in the process were completed Wednesday night as the Pontiac Planning Commission considered granting a special exemption permit for the site to be used as a warehouse, distribution and fulfillment campus.

The application was made by Atlanta-based Seefried Industrial Properties. Representatives from both Seefried and Amazon were present at the meeting to discuss details of the project. Seefried is under contract to purchase the Silverdome site for the purpose of building two facilities that would be leased by Amazon. Throughout the country, Seefried has built multiple distribution centers for Amazon.

Pontiac Mayor Deirdre Waterman called the potential development and pairing with Amazon a "great match."

While a final decision on closing on the purchase of the Silverdome site is still months away, details of the plan reveal immediate construction with the proposed delivery station operational by 3rd quarter 2020 and the fulfillment center operational by 3rd quarter 2021.

Wages for employees would start at \$15 an hour for both full and part-time associates. Amazon's comprehensive benefits start upon hire for all employees including healthcare, vision and dental, 401k, and paid leave.

"The former Silverdome site is an ideal location and Pontiac is poised with a ready workforce" said Mayor Waterman. "Landing Amazon will bolster Pontiac's continued economic success and further our pipeline of pairing industry with talent."

Situated along the junction of southeast Michigan's busiest highways – 175 and M59 – the site is one of Oakland County's most prime big sites for redevelopment including the Palace of Auburn Hills slated for demolition and the Summit Place Mall property that was just torn down – but none with the nostalgia of over 3 decades of memories left from the Silverdome site.

The Silverdome was opened in 1975 and closed permanently in 2013,

The 80,000 seat stadium played host to Super Bowl XVI, the 1979 NBA All-Star Game, Wrestlemania III, FIFA World Cup 1994, mega rock concerts and visits from the likes of U.S. presidents, musical royalty such as the Beatles, Michael Jackson and even His Holiness Pope John Paul II.

After two partial implosions, the Silverdome was demolished in 2017 and cleared for redevelopment.

PONTIAC, Mich. (FOX 2) - Amazon wants to build a distribution center at the former Silverdome site.

That's according to Pontiac Mayor Deirdre Waterman, who sent out a news release Wednesday evening announcing the decision.

The 127-acre site, formerly the home of the Detroit Lions and the Detroit Pistons is now the face of a regional distribution center for one of the largest retail companies in the world. The project is worth \$250 million and is expected to create over 1,500 full time jobs for the area.

The final decision on closing the purchase of the Silverdome is still months away. Wages for employees working at the facility would start at \$15 an hour for both full time and part-time associates.

It will also be the first site nationally for Amazon to have both a fulfillment center and delivery station.

"The former Silverdome site is an ideal location and Pontiac is poised with a ready workforce," Waterman said. "Landing Amazon will bolster Pontiac's continued economic success and further our pipeline of pairing industry with talent."

The first steps of the process were completed Wednesday night at the Pontiac Planning Commission meeting, which was considering granting a special exemption permit for the site to be used as a warehouse and fulfillment campus. Representatives from both Amazon and the company that builds these properties, also known as Seefried Industrial Properties were present at the meeting.

News of a company possibly taking residence at the former stadium site first made headlines on Aug. 29, when <u>Waterman told FOX 2</u> an Atlanta-based developer was looking at the land. Those suspicions were validated by the mayor's latest release.

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Amazon headed to the Detroit area after all

It's not a headquarters, but Amazon will have a presence in the Detroit-Windsor region after all.

Detroit television station WDIV reported Wednesday night that the online giant will build a giant distribution complex on the site of the former Pontiac Silverdome. Amazon would be a tenant of the site, which would be owned by Seefried Industrial Properties.

The 127-acre site would include a delivery depot and a large sorting centre on the site of the Silverdome, which was the home of the NFL's Detroit Lions from 1975 to 2001 and also during much of the 1980s, the NBA's Detroit Pistons. The 80,000-seat stadium was imploded in December 2017.

According to a release published on WDIV's website, the planning commission for the city of Pontiac was considering a special permit to allow the site to have a warehouse, distribution centre and a fulfillment campus. It would be the first Amazon site in North America to have both a fulfillment centre and a delivery depot on the same premises.

Pontiac Mayor Deirdre Waterman called the Amazon plan encouraging for the city and the region.

"The former Silverdome site is an ideal location and Pontiac is poised with a ready workforce," said Waterman in the media release. "Landing amazon will bolster Pontiac's continued economic success and further our pipeline of pairing industry with talent."

The deal has yet to close, but if all goes well, construction could begin by the end of this year. The delivery station could be ready by the summer of 2020 with the entire complex completed by the summer of 2021. The site could support 1,500 full-time jobs plus several hundred part-time positions, all with full benefits.

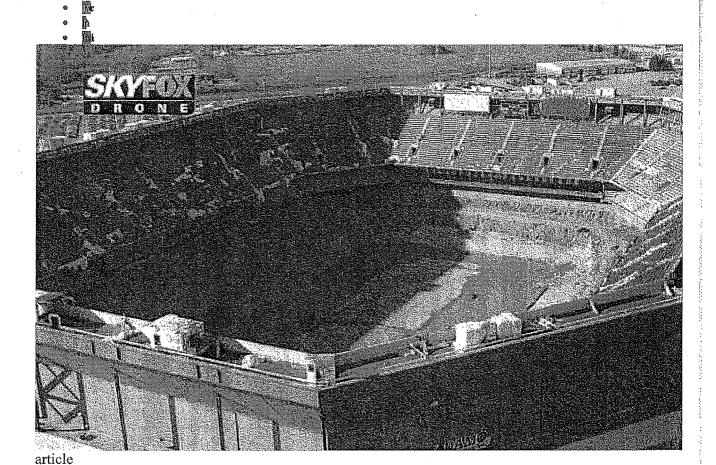
Detroit and Windsor had teamed up in late 2017 to try to woo Amazon to the region for its second headquarters, but the bid failed to advance to the second round of consideration.

The FY 2010-2020 budget as adopted by City Council on June 28, 2019, includes an approved General Fund allocation of \$100,000 for Neighborhood Projects within the Parks Grounds Maintenance department. As such, effective July 1, 2019, these funds were set available to perform specific projects to improve the city's parks.

The Director of the Department of Public Works (DPW) has determined that, due to lack of security in the city parks, the amount of money needed to provide certain amenities (e.g. barbecue pits, picnic tables, restrooms) is well above the \$100,000 allocation.

Recently, the Mayor's Office was made aware that certain members of the City Council were concerned with the lack of equipment at city parks in general. Of course, it would not be prudent to purchase and install equipment that is not secure, given that there is risk of theft and vandalism.

Per direction of the Mayor, the Finance Department has identified certain City Council departmental appropriations that would help fund equipment installation and security. In an effort to match what has already been appropriated, it is being proposed with this budget amendment that the City Council provide an additional \$100,000 to the already appropriated \$100,000. The source of these funds would be the following appropriations:

Pursuant to the following facts, that:

• a total of 32 parks are located throughout the City of Pontiac;

there are no Staff dedicated full-time for park maintenance; and

 no budgetary funds were allocated in the FY 2019/20 Adopted Budget for park capital improvements.

As you all know, the City's park maintenance has been done through worked provided by numerous Volunteer groups, and through the Mayor's Neighborhood Empowerment Program (NEP). The following are a few examples of park improvements made through NEP:

- Friends of Pontic Park/ Argyle Park: Installation of a playscape, bench and table at a total cost of \$16,072.00;
- Friends of Pontiac Park/ Beaudette Park: Upgrade the park by adding three tire swing sets and a climbing structure at a total cost of \$32,111.00;
- Project Pontiac/Mattie McKinney Hatchett Park: Upgrade the Park by removal of the current play structures and installation of a new play structure at a total cost of \$28.055.00;
- We Care Neighborhood Association/Oakland Park: Restoration of the basketball court at a total cost of \$23,000; and
- We Care Neighborhood Association/Charlie Harrison Park: Restoration of the basketball court at a total cost of \$13,990.00.

The Mayor respectfully challenges the City Council to match her NEP efforts by approving the recommended \$100,000.00 budget amendment. If approved, these funds may be used for both park maintenance and the acquisition of needed park equipment. Thank you for your consideration. Let me know if any questions arise.

Streets:

The FY 2019-2020 budget as adopted by City Council on June 25, 2019, includes certain appropriations for 2019 Major Street and Local Street repair projects. The proposed appropriations for those projects assumed that a certain amount of work would be completed in FY 19. When the work assumed to be completed in FY 19 had not started or was still in progress by end of fiscal year, a certain amount of those funds were unused; those funds went to fund balance at the end of the fiscal year.

The Director of the Department of Public Works (DPW) has expressed the need to have those unused funds pulled out of fund balance so that these projects can be fully funded for FY 20.

While it is ideal to wait until the full accounting and auditing for the costs incurred during the fiscal year are both complete to fully ascertain what funds would be available out of fund balance, these projects are ongoing and need funding sooner than the November / December timeframe in which the audit would be completed. Due to this, the Finance Department has worked with the DPW to estimate what these amounts would be, based on invoices outstanding that are awaiting payment.

The below table illustrates amounts of money that need to be placed in the FY 20 appropriation for Major Streets from fund balance, based on this calculation:

Jane,

As we discussed last night at the City council meeting I am writing to request that the UESEPA Grant Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) amendment be placed on the formal City council agenda on Tuesday, October 1st. Currently Oakland County has awarded \$82,025 for projects within the City of Pontiac, which exceeds the original USEPA grant earmark of \$60,0000 for the City of Pontiac. However, due to the outdated language in the original MOU we are only able to pay the original \$60,000 of those grant awards. We are currently past due on paying the remaining \$22,025. It is important that we get a vote on the amended MOU language in a timely manner in order to pay these outstanding bills. Another important thing to point out is that once The City of Pontiac passes the amended MOU language we will also be able to spend more grant dollars within the City. Currently, I have 4 additional projects in the City waiting for grant awards, which we will be able to provide if the MOU language gets approved at the October 1st City Council meeting. Oakland County's 5 other partners (Farmington Hills, Ferndale, Hazel Park, Madison Heights and Southfield) have passed this language over the last couple of weeks freeing up the additional grant dollars.

I also wanted to give you some background on the history of the USEPA grants and some of the great success we have had in the City of Pontiac using these funds. This is currently out 3rd grant cycle as part of the Oakland County

Brownfield Consortium. Those 3 grant cycles have provided 31 projects in the City of Pontiac with \$241,540 in grant awards. Some of the great successes we've had are listed below:

Background:

In accordance with the EPA 2016 Brownfield Coalition Assessment Grant, the Oakland County Brownfield Consortium was awarded six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000.00) for developing inventories of brownfields, prioritizing sites, conducting community involvement activities, and conducting site assessments and clean-up planning related to brownfield sites.

Under the terms of the 2016 Consortium Agreement, the City of Pontiac was allocated sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) to be used to assess brownfield sites in its geographic area. The Grant period and the ability to spend those allocated funds is currently set to expire on September 1, 2019. To-date, the City of Pontiac has exceeded their allocation by \$22,035.

Presently, various Municipalities have unspent allocated funds and do not intend to spend their remaining allocated Grant funds before the expiration period. Whereas, other members have spent their allocated Grant funds and need additional funds to pay for expenses allowed under the Grant. Please know that the County has agreed to reallocate unspent Grant funds to other members of the Consortium at the County's sole discretion, and have asked the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to extend the Grant for an additional 180 days.

Council Action Requested:

As such, the County is requesting that all Municipal Consortium members consider approving an amendment to the 2016 Oakland County Brownfield Consortium Agreement as attached. Due to the tight deadline, it is respectfully requested that the City Council consider this amendment at the September 3, 2019 Formal City Council meeting.

The following resolution is recommended for your consideration:

WHEREAS the Oakland County Board of Commissioners approved the USEPA Brownfield Assessment Grant (the "Grant") as well as the Interlocal Agreements of each member of the Oakland County Brownfield Consortium (the "Consortium"); and

AMENDMENT 1 TO THE 2016 OAKLAND COUNTY BROWNFIELD CONSORTIUM AGREEMENT BETWEEN OAKLAND COUNTY AND CITY OF PONTIAC

The County of Oakland (the "County") and the City of Pontiac, (collectively referred to as the "Parties" and individually a "Party"), agree and acknowledge that that the purpose of this Amendment 1 is to modify as provided herein and to otherwise continue the present contractual relationship between the Parties as described in their current 2016 Oakland County Brownfield Consortium Agreement (the "2016 Consortium Agreement").

Pursuant to the EPA 2016 Brownfield Coalition Assessment Grant (the "Grant"), the Oakland County Brownfield Consortium (the "Consortium") was awarded six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000.00) for developing inventories of brownfields, prioritizing sites, conducting community involvement activities, and conducting site assessments and clean-up planning related to brownfield sites. Under the terms of the 2016 Consortium Agreement, Municipality was allocated sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) to be used to assess brownfield sites in its geographic area. The Grant period and the ability to spend those allocated funds is currently set to expire on September 1, 2019.

Municipality has unspent allocated Grant funds and does not intend to spend its remaining allocated Grant funds within its geographic area before the expiration period. Other members of the Consortium have spent their allocated Grant funds and need additional funds to pay for expenditures allowed under the Grant. The County is the fiscal agent/fiduciary of the Consortium for receipt and disbursement of the Grant funds. Municipality wishes, and the County agrees, to allow the County to reallocate Municipality's unspent allocated Grant funds to other members of the Consortium at the County's sole discretion. The County intends to ask the Environmental Protection Agency to extend the current Grant period to allow the Consortium to spend the remaining Grant funds.

The County and Municipality hereby amend the 2016 Consortium Agreement as follows:

Amendment 1

- 1. Except as provided in this Amendment 1, any and all defined words or phrases in the 2016 Consortium Agreement will apply equally to and throughout this Amendment 1.
- 2. All other provisions in the 2016 Consortium Agreement not otherwise affected by this Amendment 1 remain in full force and effect.
- 3. The following provision (Section 5.3) is added to the 2016 Consortium Agreement:
 - "5.3 Notwithstanding Section 5.2 or anything else herein to the contrary, the County may reallocate, at its sole discretion, the unused grant funds allocated to Municipality to any other member(s) of the Consortium. Furthermore, Municipality may receive grant funds in excess of the amount allocated in Section 5.2, at the sole discretion of County, if grant funds are reallocated to Municipality from other members of the Consortium.

- 4. Section 6.2 of the 2016 Consortium Agreement is deleted and replaced with the following:
 - "6.2 Unless terminated pursuant to Section 8 of this Agreement, this Agreement shall end ninety (90) days after the date the Grant period ends (including any extensions to the original Grant period)."

FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual assurances, promises, and acknowledgments set forth in this Amendment 1 and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, the undersigned hereby execute this Amendment 1 on behalf of the Parties, and by doing so legally obligate and bind the Parties to the terms and conditions of this Amendment 1.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, Deirdre Waterman, Mayor of City of Pontiac, hereby acknowledges that she has been authorized by a resolution of the Municipality's governing body to execute this Amendment 1 on behalf of the Municipality and hereby accepts and binds the Municipality to the terms and conditions of this Amendment 1.
