


Phil and Gabe's engagement with the City of Pontiac in 2021 in 2022 has been supported by local foundations. No city funds are covering the cost of this assignment.

The City of Pontiac currently utilizes the Sophos Firewall for internet and network access protection to the City's critical network infrastructure. A Michigan State Police review in 2021, showed that this product does not comply with the FIPS 200 Federal Security Standard now required for access for the 50th District Court, Information Technology did a review of available Firewall suppliers and found that WatchGuard provided exceptional firewall protection, was FIPS 200 compliant and could also provide advanced threat protection for both City Hall and the 50th District Court.

STATEMENT OF NEED

- 1. City is using five-year old Sophos firewall software and appliances.
- 2. The Sophos firewall is not FIPS 200 compliant, now required by the 50th District Court.
- 3. Increased security threats require the latest in threat detection software.

SOLUTION:

- 1. Purchase WatchGuard security appliances and software.
- 2. Purchase WatchGuard Endpoint Protection Detection & Response software.

COSTS:

- 1. One-time \$38,763.00 for WatchGuard Security Appliance and Software
- 2. Initial cost of \$11,323.20 for three years of WatchGuard Endpoint Protection, Detection & Response software, to be renewed every three years.
