99-239 Public Hearing was held relevant to a public hearing for Aluminum Blanking Company, Inc. to establish an Industrial Development District or Plant Rehabilitation District. Comments and questions were heard from the public and the City Council. President declared Public Hearing closed.

WHEREAS, by Resolution and adopted by the Pontiac City Council on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March, 1999, the City Council set forth a proposal to establish an Industrial Development District pursuant to the provisions of Act 198 of the Public Acts of 1974, as amended, in connection with property hereinafter more fully described, and did set a hearing time, place and date, in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, the City of Pontiac does levy ad valorem taxes at a rate which, when taken together with the rates of ad valorem tax levied by any other taxing

authority which levies taxes within the City of Pontiac, equals or exceeds \$30.00 for each \$1,000 of state equalized valuation, and the City does levy an income tax; and

WHEREAS, written notice by certified mail has been given to the owners of all real property within the proposed Industrial Development District or Plant Rehabilitation District; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing on the establishment of the Industrial Development District has been held before the Pontiac City Council at a regular City Council Meeting held on Thursday, April 22, 1999 at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers at Pontiac City Hall, Pontiac, Michigan, and the owners of all real property within the proposed Industrial Development District and any other residents or taxpayers of the City of the City of Pontiac were afforded the opportunity and the right to appear and be heard; and

WHEREAS, a notice of said public hearing was posted in the City Clerk's Office.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that pursuant to Act 198 of the Public acts of 1974, as amended, the Pontiac City Council does hereby approve the establishment of an Industrial Development District consisting of :

WHEREAS, the Lions of Pontiac give freely of their time and effort to support sight conversation projects. Through sale of the miniature white canes, funds are raised for these worthwhile projects.
