Nicky Loomis is the Opinion and Engagement Editor at *The Desert Sun*. She has worked as a reporter and columnist for the *Pasadena Star News* and AP and has been published in the *Los Angeles Review of Books*, *New York Daily News*, and the *Los Angeles Times*.

They were also artists-in-residence at the International Music Project's International Conducting Symposium of Umbria, Italy.

Come join soprano Melissa Batallés and pianist **Constance Gordy** for an afternoon full of the best musical theater songs, everyone’s favorite opera arias, and the great American standards.

Film

Steven C. Smith • Sin on the Silver Screen: The Story of Hollywood Censorship

Prostitution and drug use. Glorified gangsters. Savage monsters and unpunished villains. During the mid-twentieth century, many Hollywood moviemakers defiantly ignored the strict “Production Code” guidelines created in 1930, which were supposed to keep movies morally “clean.” In this three-week series, hosted by documentarian **Steven C. Smith**, we’ll hear the fascinating story of how Hollywood censorship began, in the wake of Jazz Age scandals, and find out what brought the era to an end.

Each week, Smith will show a classic movie that marks an important moment in censorship. Before each of the movies, Smith will give a talk that contextualizes what we’re about to see. Over the three weeks, we’ll go from Hollywood in the 1930s—a time of gangster dramas, monster movies and Mae West; to the 1940s, when World War II led to more adult storytelling; to the 1960s, when shifting social values brought an end to the “Production Code.” The old form of censorship was replaced by the movie ratings system still used today.

Steven C. Smith is an award-winning biographer, four-time Emmy-nominated producer, and 16-time Telly Award winner. His over-200 documentaries include collaborations with Steven Spielberg, George Lucas, Martin Scorsese, Julie Andrews, Stephen Sondheim, Harrison Ford and Sidney Poitier.

Thou Shalt Not: Rule Makers and Rule Breakers

***Three on a Match* (1932) • Monday, March 4, 2–4 pm**

After viewing highlights from classic movies that ignored the Production Code, we'll see a complete feature that is now considered one of the most Code-flouting (and fun) films of the time: 1932's *Three on a Match*, co-starring Bette Davis—a movie that packs adultery, drug addiction, kidnapping, and other cinematic sins into just 63 minutes!

In Love and War: Bogie, Bacall, and the 1940s

***The Big Sleep* (1946) • Monday, March 11, 2–4 pm**

Despite the Production Code, smart filmmakers could still smuggle forbidden content into their movies. A perfect example is the risqué film noir *The Big Sleep*—starring Humphrey Bogart and Lauren Bacall, who married during its production. We'll find out how one of Hollywood's greatest directors, Howard Hawks, turned an “unfilmable” detective novel by Raymond Chandler—filled with pornographers, naked nymphomaniacs, drug addicts, and more—into one of 1946's biggest hits.

***The Apartment* (1960) • Monday, March 18, 2–4 pm**

During the 1950s, Hollywood box office cratered. Its audience was being stolen by a rival that was free: television. Foreign films shown in large U.S. cities, with sexy stars like Brigitte Bardot, began baring flesh. By the 1960s, the Production Code existed in name only. In 1968, it was replaced by the MPAA ratings system, in a major victory for filmmakers. We'll watch 1960's Best Picture winner: director Billy Wilder's masterful comedy-drama *The Apartment*, starring Jack Lemmon and Shirley MacLaine. *The Apartment's* depiction of sex, love, and corruption in the world of corporate America is funny, moving, and unmistakably adult.



Worldwide Cinema: Inspirational Stories of Youth


Queen of Katwe (2016) • Monday, May 13, 2–4 pm

Great American Eclipse!

Monday, April 8, 10 am–12:30 pm

We will view a partial solar eclipse from Rancho Mirage as the Moon passes between Earth and the Sun. Join us just down the road at the **Rancho Mirage Community Park** to view this exciting event safely through our telescopes, learn more about eclipses, and create your own pinhole projection viewer!

10:06 am—partial eclipse begins

11:14 am—maximum eclipse: 53% of the Sun's disk will be blocked by the Moon!

12:25 pm—partial eclipse ends

It is important to *always* use the proper eye protection when viewing the Sun. This requires special-purpose eclipse glasses or hand-held solar viewers that meet the ISO 12312-2 international standard for such products. Homemade filters or ordinary sunglasses, even very dark ones, are not safe for looking at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed Sun. The Rancho Mirage Library and Observatory will have certified eclipse glasses on hand the day of the program and available for giveaway at Observatory programs leading up to the event.

OPENights

Observatory Public Exploration Nights are your portal to the Universe! Join us at the Rancho Mirage Observatory to glimpse beyond our world through our PlaneWave Instruments CDK 700 telescope. Ask questions and learn fun facts from astronomers and volunteer docents as you take in 100–350x magnified views of planets, nebulae, star clusters, and more (weather permitting). No registration is necessary for this drop-in, open-house-style event. Due to the capacity limits of the Observatory, you may experience a short wait, but everyone will have a chance to get in.
