COUNTY OF OSWEGO LOCAL LAW No.: 1 OF 2022

A LOCAL LAW PROVIDING FOR THE PARTIAL TAX EXEMPTION OF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY OWNED BY PERSONS 65 YEARS OF AGE OR OVER

BE IT ENACTED by the County Legislature of the County of Oswego as follows:

Section I. Title and Legislative Findings.

- (a) The Oswego County Legislature has, heretofore, by Resolution number 146 of 1990 enacted a partial property tax exemption for persons 65 years of age or older, based upon certain income qualifications, pursuant to Real Property Tax Law 467 with a maximum income level of \$12,525.
- (b) In 1999 the Oswego County Legislature, by Resolution after public hearing changed the income eligibility schedule regarding a partial tax exemption on property owned by persons 65 years or older.
- (c) By this local law, the County of Oswego wishes to establish higher income eligibility levels via a sliding scale for those 65 or older eligible to receive a partial exemption in accordance with Real Property Tax Law (RPTL)§ 467 and formalize the partial exemption under a local law.

Section 2. Partial Tax Exemption Granted Under RPTL §467

Real property owned by one or more persons, each of whom is sixty-five (65) years of age or over, or real property owned by husband and wife or by siblings, one of whom is sixty-five years of age or over, shall be exempt from taxation for county purposes up to a maximum of fifty per cent (50%) of the assessed value provided the owner(s) meet the qualifications set forth below. For the purposes of this local law, sibling shall mean a brother or a sister, whether related through half blood, whole blood or adoption. Any person otherwise qualifying under this section shall not be denied the exemption under this section if they become sixty-five years of age after the appropriate taxable status date and on or before December thirty-first (31st) of the same year.

Section 3. Income Qualifications.

- (a) The partial exemption to be granted hereunder shall be determined by the income of the owner or the combined income of the owners of the property for the income tax year immediately preceding the date of making application (hereinafter referred to individually or collectively as "income").
- (b) Income tax year shall mean the twelve-month period for which the owner or owners filed a federal personal income tax return for the year before the income tax year immediately preceding the date of application.
- (c) Where title is vested in either a husband or a wife, their combined income may not exceed such sum, except where the husband or wife, or ex-husband or ex-wife is absent from the property as provided in subparagraph (c)(2) of Section 4 of this local law, then only the income of the spouse or ex-spouse residing on the property shall be considered and may not exceed such sum.
- (d) Such income shall include Social Security and retirement benefits, interest, dividends, total gains from the sale or exchange of a capital asset which may be offset by a loss from the sale or exchange of a capital asset in the same income tax year, net rental income, salary or earnings, and net income from self-employment, but shall not include a return of capital, gifts, inheritances, and such other forms of income which are excluded under Real Property Tax Law § 467(3)(a), presently and as may be amended. Any such income shall be offset by all medical and prescription drug expenses actually paid by owner which were not reimbursed or paid for by insurance. The provisions of this paragraph notwithstanding, such income shall not include Veteran's disability compensation, as defined in Title 38 of the United States Code. In computing net rental income and net income from self-employment no depreciation deduction shall be allowed for the exhaustion, wear and tear of real or personal property held for the production of income.

Section 4. Additional Qualifications.

No exemption shall be granted hereunder unless:

(a) the owner shall have held an exemption under this section for his previous residence or unless the title of the property shall have been vested in the owner or one of the owners of the property for at least twelve consecutive months prior to the date of making application for exemption, provided, however, that in the event of the death of either a husband or wife in whose name title of the property shall have been vested at the time of death and then becomes vested solely in the survivor by virtue of devise by or descent from the deceased husband or wife, the time of ownership of the property by the deceased husband or wife shall be deemed also a time of ownership by the survivor and such ownership shall be deemed continuous for the purposes of computing such period of twelve consecutive months, In the event of a transfer by either a husband or wife to the other spouse of all or part of the title to the property, the time of ownership of the

property by the transferor spouse shall be deemed also a time of ownership by the transferee spouse and such ownership shall be deemed continuous for the purposes of computing such period of twelve consecutive months. Where property of the owner or owners has been acquired to replace property formerly owned by such owner or owners and taken by eminent domain or other involuntary proceeding, except a tax sale, the period of ownership of the former property shall be combined with the period of ownership of the property for which application is made for exemption and such periods of ownership shall be deemed to be consecutive for purposes of this section, Where a residence is sold and replaced with another within one year and both residences are within the state, the period of ownership of both properties shall be deemed consecutive for purposes of the exemption from taxation by a municipality within the state granting such exemption. Where the owner or owners transfer title to property which as of the date of transfer was exempt from taxation under the provisions of this section, the reacquisition of title by such owner or owners within nine months of the date of transfer shall be deemed to satisfy the requirement of this paragraph that the title of the property shall have been vested in the owner or one of the owners for such period of twelve consecutive months. Where, upon or subsequent to the death of an owner or owners, title to property which as of the date of such death was exempt from taxation under such provisions, becomes vested, by virtue of devise or descent from the deceased owner or owners, or by transfer by any other means within nine months after such death, solely in a person or persons who, at the time of such death, maintained such property as a primary residence, the requirement of this paragraph that the title of the property shall have been vested in the owner or one of the owners for such period of twelve consecutive months shall be deemed satisfied;

- (b) the property is used exclusively for residential purposes, provided, however, that in the event any portion of such property is not so used exclusively for residential purposes but is used for other purposes, such portion shall be subject to taxation and the remaining portion only shall be entitled to the exemption provided by this section;
- (c) the real property is the legal residence of and is occupied in whole or in part by the owner or by all of the owners of the property: except where,
 - (1) an owner is absent from the residence while receiving health-related care as an inpatient of a residential health care facility, as defined in section twenty-eight hundred one of the public health law, provided that any income accruing to that person shall only be income only to the extent that it exceeds the amount paid by such owner, spouse, or co-owner for care in the facility, and provided further, that during such confinement such property is not occupied by other than the spouse or co-owner of such owner; or,
 - (2) the real property is owned by a husband and/or wife, or an ex-husband and/or an ex-wife, and either is absent from the residence due to divorce, legal separation or abandonment and all other provisions of this section are met provided that where an exemption was previously granted when both resided on the property,

then the person remaining on the real property shall be sixty-two years of age or over.

(d) the real property otherwise meets the qualifications contained in Real Property Tax Law§ 467, as the same may be amended from time to time.

Section 5. Administration.

Application for such exemption must be made by the owner, or all of the owners of the property upon such forms as may be prescribed from time to time by the NYS Office of Real Property Services. Such applications must be filed with the assessor of the town or city in which the real property is located on or before the taxable status date. Nothing herein shall impair a partial exemption presently enjoyed by an eligible property owner.

Section 6. Effective Date.

This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

COUNTY OF OSWEGO LOCAL LAW NUMBER 2 of 2022 GRANTING A PARTIAL TAX EXEMPTION FOR QUALIFYING PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES UNDER REAL PROPERTY TAX LAW §459-C

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF OSWEGO AS FOLLOWS:

1. Purpose and Intent.

The County Legislature has, heretofore, adopted Local Law Number 3 of 2001 to provide a partial tax exemption for qualifying persons with disabilities in accordance with Real Property Tax Law §459-C. The intent of this local law is to SUPERCEDE Local Law Number 3 of 2001 and to raise the maximum income levels to reflect changes in income, cost of living increases and expenses since 2001 and to have the partial exemption granted hereunder mirror the partial tax exemption allowed by the County of Oswego under Real Property Tax Law §467 for qualifying persons 65 and older. This local law increases the income sliding scale for the partial exemption to be granted hereunder consistent with Real Property Tax Law §459-C.

2. Application and Partial Exemption Granted; Local Law 3 of 2001 Superceded

The provisions of Local Law Number 3 of 2001 be and are hereby SUPERCEDED in its entirety by this local law. The provisions of Real Property Tax Law Section 459-C relative to partial tax exemption to persons with disabilities who have limited incomes, shall apply to County Real Property Taxes levied by the County of Oswego.

3. Qualifying Income for the Partial Exemption under RPTL 459-C.

This local law hereby grants a partial exemption under RPTL §459-C, per the following sliding scale:

COVID -19 impact on schools and students, as well as provider workforce/recruitment issues have shifted the course of the project and the original 5-year plan.

The Division of Mental Hygiene is seeking approval for flexibility to:

- 1. Contract with a provider above the \$90,000 per year, without exceeding the annual maximum of \$180,000 for the project.
- 2. Allow the use of start-up funds to support SBMH clinic expansions in school buildings with high need as demonstrated by waitlists large enough to support an additional caseload.
- 3. Waive the County Purchasing Policy limit of 4 renewal years to allow an extension for 2 additional renewal years due to COVID -19 project disruptions/delays.

100% of funding is provided by a NYS OMH State Aid allocation to Oswego County specifically to support services to youth. The revenue and expense for this project is currently budgeted. Contracts are dependent upon continued funding from NYS OMH. There will be no increase to the local share.

RESOLUTION DETERMINING THAT THE PROPOSED CAMP HOLLIS REDI PROJECT IS A TYPE 1 ACTION AND WILL NOT HAVE A SIGNIFICANT ADVERSE IMPACT ON THE ENVIRONMENT FOR CO.25 - CAMP HOLLIS REDI PROJECT

WHEREAS, Oswego County is proposing the Camp Hollis REDI Project (Project), located in the Town of Oswego, Oswego County, New York; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, as amended, the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and the implementing regulations at 6 NYCRR Part 617 (the "Regulations"), Oswego County desires to comply with SEQRA and the Regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Project has been classified as a "Type I Action" as defined by the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) in 6 NYCRR Part 617.2(aj).

WHEREAS, a letter and Part 1 of a Full Environmental Assessment Form (FEAF) were sent to other potentially "Interested Agencies" and "Involved Agencies" (as these terms are defined in the SEQRA Regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617.2), indicating Oswego County's desire to serve as the "Lead Agency" (as this quoted term is defined in the SEQRA Regulations) and to complete a coordinated review of the Project (in accordance with 6 NYCRR Part 617.6); and

WHEREAS, responses from Interested and Involved Agencies were requested, and each of the potentially Interested and Involved Agencies has agreed to, or raised no objections to, Oswego County serving as Lead Agency for the Project; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Regulations, Oswego County has considered the significance of the potential environmental impacts of the Project by (a) using the criteria specified in Section 617.7 of the SEQRA Regulations, and (b) examining the FEAF for the Project, including the facts and conclusions in Parts 1, 2 and 3 of the FEAF, together with other available supporting information, to identify the relevant areas of environmental concern;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that, Oswego County hereby establishes itself as Lead Agency for the Project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that based upon an examination of the FEAF and other available supporting information, and considering both the magnitude and importance of each relevant area of environmental concern, and based further upon the County's

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Appendix A – Coordinated Review Responses

A. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Camp Hollis is located in the Town of Oswego, Oswego County, New York, immediately adjacent to Lake Ontario. The Camp Hollis shoreline has eroded significantly during the Camp's lifespan, leading to the relocation of the original camp building and resetting of the fence line along the playing fields. The recent high lake levels have exacerbated the erosion leading to further loss of bluff, including the loss of the access trail from the Camp to the shoreline. The proposed project will include stabilization of approximately 600 linear feet of bluff, and will aim to reestablish the toe of slope 12-15 feet in front of the current bluff. The Camp users previously accessed Lake Ontario from a ramp on the southern end of the bluff. This access trail is no longer functioning, and an improved access trail will be reestablished as part of the proposed project. The proposed project area is shown in Figure 1, attached.

B. COORDINATED REVIEW

Oswego County declared their intent to act as the lead agency for the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) process on February 10, 2022. Subsequently, Part 1 of the Full Environmental Assessment Form (FEAF) and a project location map were sent electronically to the interested and involved agencies listed in Table 1 on February 28, 2022, to initiate a coordinated review of the proposed action.

The coordinated review comment period ended on March 30, 2022. No agencies objected to Oswego County serving as Lead Agency for the project's SEQR review. Responses were received from the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York (DASNY), NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), Town of Oswego, NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation (OPRHP), and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE). DASNY indicated that they are a funding agency for the project and thanked Oswego County for including the NYS OPRHP as an interested agency for SEQR. No other project comments were received; all responding involved agencies, noted above, provided consent for Oswego County to be the lead agency for the Camp Hollis REDI Project's SEQR process.

The coordinated review responses and consent forms received from the agencies mentioned above are provided in Appendix A. Further coordination with the appropriate agencies will be completed as the project progresses, starting with a pre-application meeting with permitting agencies in the near future.

C. DETAILED INFORMATION IN RESPONSE TO PART 2 OF SEQRA FULL EAF

The following information provides a detailed discussion of the potential impacts identified in Part 2 of the FEAF that were listed as small or moderate to large, in support of Part 3 of the FEAF. The answers in the "No or Small Impact" column on Part 2 of the FEAF are further clarified with an "NI" for no impact and "SI" for small impact. This document is organized according to the question numbers in Part 2, and the additional information provided herein summarizes the proposed actions that will be taken to minimize and/or mitigate each identified impact.

1. Impacts on Land

1.a. The proposed action may involve construction on land where depth to water table is less than 3 feet.

Based on data available from the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service's (USDA-NRCS) Web Soil Survey, the average depth to the water table in the project area is approximately 4.9 feet below the ground surface. However, portions of the project area contain mapped soil units with a depth to water table of less than 3 feet. Limited work is proposed to occur in these areas and will involve keying in the base of the bluff stabilization design. Natural rock cover will be restored in this location. No adverse impacts to the water table are anticipated. Additionally, an erosion and sediment control plan will be prepared detailing suitable erosion control measures for the project, and will be followed during construction.

1.b. The proposed action may involve construction on slopes of 15% or greater.

According to data obtained from the USDA NRCS Web Soil Survey, the project area does not contain mapped soil units with a slope of 15% or greater. However, stabilization of the bluff will involve construction on steep slopes. The existing bluff ranges between 6.8 and 42.2 feet in height and has an average slope of 0.8(H):1(V) (125%). The project aims to regrade the existing lake shore to a maximum slope of 1.5 (H):1(V) (66%). The proposed maximum slope is based on a successfully completed stabilization project in the Town of Huron, Wayne County, NY. The final slope would be vegetated at a bench location partway up the slope and at the top of the bluff, to strengthen the stabilization proposed. The toe of slope will have to be built out a minimum of 10 feet to achieve the desired slope. The lake shoreline is generally covered in gravel and cobbles with dimensions generally smaller than 12 inches in diameter. The project objective is to flatten the steepness of the current bluff to reduce the erosion currently experienced at the bluff location.

1.f. The proposed action may result in increased erosion, whether from physical disturbance or vegetation removal (including from treatment by herbicides).

The project will involve the placement of fill along the shoreline of Lake Ontario. Limited excavation is proposed below the Ordinary High Water Elevation (OHWE) – presumed to be 247.3 feet IGLD85. Temporary increases in potential for erosion may occur during construction due to ground disturbance associated with the placement of fill and regrading of the slope, but erosion and sediment control plans will be prepared detailing suitable erosion control measures for the project. These plans will be followed during construction and will address

the construction and maintenance of temporary stormwater controls required for the project. The overall objective of this shoreline stabilization project is to ultimately reduce erosion along the shore of Lake Ontario.

1.g. The proposed action is, or may be, located within a Coastal Erosion hazard area.

The project area is entirely located within a Coastal Erosion Hazard Area (CEHA) regulated by the NYSDEC under Article 34 of the Environmental Conservation Law (ECL). The Natural Protective Feature Area (NPFA) extends approximately 1000 feet southwest and 2000 feet northeast, from the project location, along the Lake Ontario shoreline. Construction, modification, restoration, or placement of a structure are classified as regulated activities on beaches within CEHA areas under Article 34. Therefore, the project will require a CEHA permit. The Town of Oswego is not a Certified CEHA Community authorized by the NYSDEC to administer the CEHA permitting program locally; therefore, an Article 34 permit will need to be administered by the NYSDEC. Design will be progressed in concert with the NYSDEC so that the proposed stabilization measures are acceptable under Article 34 and appropriately minimize/avoid adverse impacts to the CEHA. Conditions of this permit will be followed during construction to minimize impacts to the NPFA.

2. Impacts on Geological Features

No impacts to geological features were identified. The proposed action will not result in the modification or destruction of, or inhibit access to, any unique or unusual landforms on the site (e.g., cliffs, dunes, minerals, fossils, caves).

3. Impacts on Surface Water

3.d. The proposed action may involve construction within or adjoining a freshwater or tidal wetland, or in the bed or banks of any other water body.

The project area is located along the shoreline of Lake Ontario. Lake Ontario is designated as a Class A water with A standards. Impacts to the Lake Ontario shoreline will be avoided to the maximum extent possible. No United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) National Wetland Inventory (NWI) or NYSDEC mapped wetlands are identified within the project area. Field delineations will be conducted to confirm the absence of wetlands and streams within the project area. Necessary permits will be obtained from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), NYSDEC, and NYS Department of State (NYSDOS) for work below the OHWE of Lake Ontario and work within the NYS Landward Coastal Boundary. The general and special conditions associated with such permits and

plans would be followed during construction to ensure that potential impacts are minimized.

3.e. The proposed action may create turbidity in a waterbody, either from upland erosion, runoff, or by disturbing bottom sediments.

The proposed project involves capturing overland stormwater runoff from the adjacent Camp Hollis recreational/grassed area on top of the bluff to prevent any concentrated flows going over the face of the slope which could lead to instability. Runoff from the grassed areas would be captured by a shallow vegetated swale, installed parallel to the top of bluff, and diverted south along the top of bank. This stormwater already discharges to Lake Ontario, so an increase in stormwater volumes will not result from this collection and rerouting design element. Turbidity into the Lake is actually likely to decrease from the swale installation and vegetative buffers (top of bank and bench). Erosion and sediment control details will be incorporated into the project's design plans, as appropriate, to minimize the release of sediment from the immediate work area.

3.h. The proposed action may cause soil erosion, or otherwise create a source of stormwater discharge that may lead to siltation or other degradation of receiving water bodies.

See response to 3.e, above.

4. Impacts on Groundwater

No impacts to groundwater were identified for the proposed project. The project will not involve the use of groundwater resources nor introduce contamination to groundwater or an aquifer.

5. Impacts on Flooding

5.b. The proposed action may result in development within a 100-year floodplain.

The project area is located within the 100-year floodplain of Lake Ontario, as mapped by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Digital floodplain data from FEMA is available for the Town of Oswego, which indicates that the base flood elevation for Lake Ontario is 249 feet IGLD85.

The project will result in fill along the shoreline of Lake Ontario to improve and re-establish the slope and placement of the bluff feature. The total volume of fill is minor compared to the flood flow storage capacity of Lake Ontario (approximately 393 cubic miles). Changes to the flood flow storage capacity of the Lake will be *de minimis*. A Local floodplain development permit will be

obtained from the Town of Oswego; conditions that they impose upon the project to avoid and minimize impacts to floodplains will be followed. The project is not anticipated to increase the amount of development within 100-year floodplain areas, as the property is County-owned and operated, and development in mapped floodplain areas is managed by the Towns.

5.d. The proposed action may result in, or require, modification of existing drainage patterns.

The proposed project involves capturing runoff from the adjacent grassed open area at the top of the bluff to prevent any concentrated flows going over the face of the slope which could lead to instability. Runoff from the grassed areas would be captured by a shallow vegetated swale and diverted south along the top of bank. Lake Ontario will still be the primary receiving water for drainage from the project area. An erosion and sediment control plan will be developed for the project and followed during construction to minimize stormwater runoff, and will address operation and maintenance of stormwater control measures for the project. Changes in drainage patterns at the site are expected to have positive results due to reduced erosion of the property/Lake Ontario shoreline.

6. Impacts on Air

No air permits will be needed for the construction or operation of the project. There will be an increase in fossil fuel consumption by heavy machinery during the construction period, however, this minor and temporary increase in vehicular and equipment emissions is not anticipated to have any measurable impact on local air quality.

7. Impacts on Plants and Animals

The project is not anticipated to substantially interfere with nesting/breeding, foraging, or over-wintering wildlife species. Temporary noise or ground disturbance impacts may occur, but the construction timing is planned for later summer/early fall, after the breeding season for shorebird species has ended. No records of protected state or federal species are documented within the project area. No post-construction impacts to habitat availability or access are anticipated to result from the project.

8. Impacts on Agricultural Resources

No impacts to agricultural resources were identified. The project area is not within a certified agricultural district, and does not contain any active agricultural land.

9. Impacts on Aesthetic Resources

9.a. Proposed action may be visible from any officially designated federal, state, or local scenic or aesthetic resource.

The Camp Hollis REDI Project will be completed on the shoreline of Lake Ontario. Construction will be visible to individuals recreating within the Lake, and individuals using Camp Hollis. The shoreline is bordered by trees to the north and south which will aid in screening construction activities and visual changes on site from neighboring properties, particularly during the growing (leaf-on) season. Work will take place beginning in September to avoid the busy camp season during summer. Facilities at the Camp will remain open, but the shoreline access area and viewing area will be closed off during construction. Construction will be temporary and last for approximately three months. Visual changes to the property are expected to be positive. A view of Lake Ontario will be retained, but the stabilization of the bluff and addition of vegetation will increase the aesthetics.

- 9.c. The proposed action may be visible from publicly accessible vantage points:
 - i. Seasonally (e.g., screened by summer foliage, but visible during other seasons)
 - ii. Year-Round

See response to 9.a., above.

- 9.d. The situation or activity in which viewers are engaged while viewing the proposed action is:
 - i. Routine travel by residents, including travel to and from work
 - ii. Recreational or tourism based activities

See response to 9.a., above. The project will primarily be visible to viewers engaging in recreational or tourism-based activities, however, the project will restore similar visual conditions that were present before the shoreline became significantly eroded. Nearby Lake Ontario shoreline primarily consists of residential properties.

9.e. The proposed action may cause a diminishment of the public enjoyment and appreciation of the designated aesthetic resource.

See response to 9.a, above.

10. Impacts on Historic and Archeological Resources

10.b. The proposed action may occur wholly or partially within, or substantially contiguous to, an area designated as sensitive for archaeological sites on the NY State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) archaeological site inventory.

The project was submitted to the SHPO for review through the Cultural Resource Information System (CRIS) in January 2022. The project area is located within an archaeologically sensitive area. SHPO issued a letter on January 14, 2022, indicating their opinion that the project would not affect any historic or archaeological resources. No further consultation with the SHPO is required.

11. Impacts on Open Space and Recreation

11.b. The proposed action may result in the loss of a current or future recreational resource.

The Camp Hollis REDI Project involves shoreline stabilization within a County-owned and run summer camp and recreational facility. Improvements to the bluff will not result in the loss of any open space, and in fact will increase and affirm opportunities to enjoy the property. Work will take place beginning in September to avoid the busy camp season during summer. Facilities at the Camp will remain open, but the shoreline access area and viewing area will be closed off during construction. Construction will be temporary and last for approximately three months. No long-term or permanent losses of recreational opportunities or adverse impacts to recreational resources will occur as a result of the project. Re-establishment of Lake access from the Camp Hollis property is proposed to occur as part of this project, which is a significant positive on recreational opportunities for Camp Hollis.

12. Impacts on Critical Environmental Areas

No impacts to Critical Environmental Areas were identified. There are no Critical Environmental Areas within or near the project area.

13. Impacts on Transportation

No impacts on transportation were identified. Work will be restricted to the Camp Hollis property.

14. Impacts on Energy

No impacts to energy were identified. The project does not involve new construction or improvements involving an increase in energy usage.

15. Impacts on Noise, Odor, and Light

15.a. The proposed action may produce sound above noise levels established by local regulation.

Ambient noise levels will be exceeded temporarily during construction. Excess noise will be limited to weekday, daylight hours as much as possible to minimize adverse impacts on the community and nearby receptors. Elevated noise conditions will be temporary and will end once construction is complete. No long-term impacts to noise levels are expected to result from the project. Project construction will occur after the busy summer season and is anticipated to last for three months.

16. Impacts on Human Health

No impacts to human health were identified. The project area is not located within the vicinity of any sensitive receptors (such as a school, group home, or daycare facility), and there are no reported contaminant spill records or remediation sites within or near the project area.

17. Consistency with Community Plans

No impacts were identified. The proposed action is consistent with existing Community Plans.

18. Consistency with Community Character

18.d. The proposed action may interfere with the use or enjoyment of officially recognized or designated public resources.

During construction, recreational activities within the project area may be temporarily restricted to maintain public safety as well as safe working conditions and access for the contractor. Construction will be ongoing for approximately three months. Access to the area will be fully restored upon completion of construction. The project will ultimately enhance enjoyment of the public resource.

WHEREAS, responses from Interested and Involved Agencies were requested, and each of the potentially Interested and Involved Agencies has agreed to, or raised no objections to, Oswego County serving as Lead Agency for the Project; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Regulations, Oswego County has considered the significance of the potential environmental impacts of the Project by (a) using the criteria specified in Section 617.7 of the SEQRA Regulations, and (b) examining the FEAF for the Project, including the facts and conclusions in Parts 1, 2 and 3 of the FEAF, together with other available supporting information, to identify the relevant areas of environmental concern;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that, Oswego County hereby establishes itself as Lead Agency for the Project; and

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Appendix A – Coordinated Review Responses

A. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Independence Park is located on the shoreline of Lake Ontario in Oswego County, NY. The primary purpose of this project is to provide a trail connection between two existing trail termini, where visitors were formerly able to traverse a cobble stone beach along the shoreline. The shoreline of the park has been impacted due to high water levels, causing the previously used path to currently be underwater at certain times. Additionally, it has been identified that portions of the existing trail's boardwalks over wetlands and streams are in need of repairs due to high water levels and inundation. A third element included in the project (if funding remains), is to address flooding of a stream located within the park, due to a blocked outfall caused by sediment and cobble buildup from Lake Ontario. Flooding here has caused damage to upstream bridges and roadways that it crosses. Oswego County has received funds through the Lake Ontario Resiliency and Economic Development Initiative (REDI) program to progress these three resiliency improvement projects along the Sithe Trail, located in Independence Park. The proposed project includes three parts: installation of a new trail parallel to the Lake Ontario shoreline to connect two existing trail termini; improvements and/or raising of existing boardwalk locations along the trail system; and dredging/removal of built-up sediment and cobbles at a tributary discharge point to allow for vehicle access for more efficient maintenance moving forward. Figure 1 shows the locations of the three proposed actions.

B. COORDINATED REVIEW

Oswego County declared their intent to act as the lead agency for the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) process on February 10, 2022. Subsequently, Part 1 of the Full Environmental Assessment Form (FEAF) and a project location map were sent electronically to the interested and involved agencies listed in Table 1 on February 28, 2022, to initiate a coordinated review of the proposed action.

The coordinated review comment period ended on March 30, 2022. No agencies objected to Oswego County serving as Lead Agency for the project's SEQR review. Responses were received from the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York (DASNY), NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), New York State Office of General Services (NYSOGS), and NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation (OPRHP). DASNY indicated that they are a funding agency for the project and thanked Oswego County for including the NYS OPRHP as an interested agency for SEQR. NYSDEC provided comment that the third proposed project element, improvements at the stream outfall location to the Lake, be elevated due to frequent flooding impacts on upstream infrastructure. No other project comments were received; all responding involved agencies, noted above, provided consent for Oswego County to be the lead agency for the Independence Trail REDI Project's SEQR process.

The coordinated review responses and consent forms received from the agencies mentioned above are provided in Appendix A. Further coordination with the appropriate agencies will be completed as the project progresses, starting with a pre-application meeting with permitting agencies in the near future.

C. DETAILED INFORMATION IN RESPONSE TO PART 2 OF SEQRA FULL EAF

The following information provides a detailed discussion of the potential impacts identified in Part 2 of the FEAF that were listed as small or moderate to large, in support of Part 3 of the FEAF. The answers in the "No or Small Impact" column on Part 2 of the FEAF are further clarified with an "NI" for no impact and "SI" for small impact. This document is organized according to the question numbers in Part 2, and the additional information provided herein summarizes the proposed actions that will be taken to minimize and/or mitigate each identified impact.

1. Impacts on Land

1.a. The proposed action may involve construction on land where depth to water table is less than 3 feet.

Based on data available from the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service's (USDA-NRCS) Web Soil Survey, the average depth to the water table in the project area is approximately 1.5 feet below the ground surface. Mapped soil units with depth to water table of less than three feet are in the eastern portion of the project area. Work in these locations includes repair of existing boardwalk structures. Ground disturbance associated with boardwalk repair will be very minimal (<.01 acres). Installation of new boardwalk to connect the trail termini will also involve installation of piles within areas with a shallow water table. Pile installation use will minimize impacts from construction. An erosion and sediment control plan will be prepared detailing suitable erosion control measures for the project, and will be followed during construction. Dewatering of excavated areas, if necessary, will be completed in accordance with this plan.

1.b. The proposed action may involve construction on slopes of 15% or greater.

According to data obtained from the USDA NRCS Web Soil Survey, approximately 69.5% of the project area is mapped by soil units that have a slope of 15% or greater. This slope range is associated with one mapped soil unit (Ira and Sodus very stony soils). Construction in the location of this mapped soil unit includes repair of existing boardwalk structures. Based on previous site visits, all existing boardwalk structures are located in areas without locally steep slopes. This work will involve replacement and upgrades of existing infrastructure, so no adverse impacts are anticipated.

1.c. The proposed action may involve construction on land where bedrock is exposed, or generally within 5 feet of existing ground surface.

Based on data obtained from the USDA NRCS' Web Soil Survey, the average depth to bedrock throughout the project site is approximately 1.5 feet below the soil surface. Soil borings will be completed for the project's new boardwalk trail segment. This will be completed during the preliminary design phase to obtain subsurface information to inform the design and construction approach for areas with shallow soils. Design will be altered, as necessary, to address concerns with any shallow bedrock, should it be encountered and confirmed from the geotechnical analysis.

1.f. The proposed action may result in increased erosion, whether from physical disturbance or vegetation removal (including from treatment by herbicides).

Construction of new, and repair of existing, infrastructure will involve approximately 0.35 acres of ground disturbance. An erosion and sediment control plan will be prepared detailing suitable erosion control measures for the project, and will be followed during construction. Minor, temporary increases in erosion may occur during construction due to ground disturbance. The project will not result in an increase in impervious area. The treatment of vegetation using herbicides is not proposed.

2. Impacts on Geological Features

No impacts to geological features were identified. The proposed action will not result in the modification or destruction of, or inhibit access to, any unique or unusual landforms on the site (e.g., cliffs, dunes, minerals, fossils, caves).

3. Impacts on Surface Water

3.d. The proposed action may involve construction within or adjoining a freshwater or tidal wetland, or in the bed or banks of any other water body.

Portions of the project area are located along the shoreline of Lake Ontario including the location of the new boardwalk and stream to be dredged. Lake Ontario is designated as a Class A water with A standards. Additionally, NYSDECmapped wetland (OE-4) is located along Ferguson Beach, Alcan, and Rikers Beach Roads, and NYSDEC-mapped wetland (OE-6) is located along Alcan Road and Independence Way. Work may occur within state mapped wetlands, and is likely to occur within the 100 foot protected buffer, at a minimum. Wetland field delineations will be conducted in spring 2022 to accurately identify wetland boundaries and streams present within the project area. Impacts to the Lake Ontario shoreline, stream resources, and on-site wetlands will be avoided to the maximum extent possible. Temporarily disturbed areas within wetlands, and 100-foot protected buffers will be restored to their pre-construction grades and covertypes once construction is completed. No loss of wetlands is expected as a result of the project, but this will be confirmed during preliminary design. Permanent wetland impacts will be minimized, and mitigation of impacts will be completed if/as necessary. Environmental permits will be obtained from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), NYS Office of General Services (NYSOGS) and NYS Department of State (NYSDOS), as applicable. The general and special conditions associated with such permits and plans would be followed during construction to ensure that potential impacts are minimized.

3.e. The proposed action may create turbidity in a waterbody, either from upland erosion, runoff, or by disturbing bottom sediments.

The proposed project may result in limited and temporary increases in turbidity due to disturbance of bottom sediments within wetlands. These temporary increases would occur from pile installation for the new or replacement boardwalks, or the dredging at the outlet of the mapped stream. Dewatering measures will be employed during construction, to the extent necessary, to perform work in the dry. No significant increase in turbidity, temporary or permanent, is anticipated as a result of the proposed action. An erosion and sediment control plan will be developed and followed during construction to prevent erosion-related turbidity increases to Lake Ontario that may result from temporary ground disturbance. Exact needs and locations for sediment and erosion control structures will be determined during design.

3.h. The proposed action may cause soil erosion, or otherwise create a source of stormwater discharge that may lead to siltation or other degradation of receiving water bodies.

See response to 3.d and 3.e, above.

4. Impacts on Groundwater

No impacts to groundwater were identified for the proposed project. The project will not involve the use of groundwater resources nor introduce contamination to groundwater or an aquifer.

5. Impacts on Flooding

5.b. The proposed action may result in development within a 100-year floodplain.

The project area is located within a 100-year floodplain of Lake Ontario, as mapped by the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA). According to the FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps for the project area, the base flood elevation for Lake Ontario is 249 feet. To ensure resiliency, a design flood elevation (DFE) of 252 feet was established for the proposed boardwalk trail. A local floodplain development permit will be obtained from the Town of Scriba; conditions that they impose upon the project to avoid and minimize impacts to floodplains will be followed. The Project is not anticipated to increase the amount of development within mapped 100-year floodplain areas. An extensive recreational trail network already exists on the County-owned property.

5.d. The proposed action may result in, or require, modification of existing drainage patterns.

Temporary changes to existing drainage patterns may occur during construction as part of the dewatering measures required to support project construction, but no permanent changes to current drainage is anticipated. Work within the mapped stream and adjacent wetlands would occur, but the drainage patterns would remain intact. An erosion and sediment control plan will be prepared detailing suitable erosion control measures for the project, and will be followed during construction.

6. Impacts on Air

No air permits will be needed for the construction or operation of the project. There will be an increase in fossil fuel consumption by heavy machinery during the construction period, however, this minor and temporary increase in vehicular and equipment emissions is not anticipated to have any measurable impact on local air quality.

7. Impacts on Plants and Animals

7.b. The proposed action may result in a reduction or degradation of any habitat used by any rare, threatened or endangered species, as listed by New York State or the federal government.

The proposed action is likely to have a small impact on the local flora and fauna during construction due to noise and disturbance. Efforts will be made to reduce impacts by limiting the construction zone to the smallest footprint required.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) New York Field Office's Information, Planning, and Consultation (IPaC) System was queried to determine whether any federally listed endangered, threatened, or candidate species are known to inhabit areas within the project area. The USFWS' IPaC System indicated the candidate species monarch butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*) has been documented within the project area. Additionally, a query of the NYSDEC's Nature Explorer website was completed to assess the potential presence of any rare species or natural communities reported for the project area. The Nature Explorer did not report any species listed by NYS as endangered or threatened within the project area. The monarch butterfly is not afforded protection under the federal Endangered Species Act at this time. The project area appears to be heavily wooded, but potential for suitable monarch habitat within the project's disturbance limits will be reviewed.

The new boardwalk portion of the project will involve minor disturbances and likely some vegetative clearing in this location. Vegetative clearing required for

trail installation will be minimized to the extent possible and tree removal will occur outside of typical nesting season for avians to reduce impacts. Boardwalk repair, and stream dredging would not result in a loss of habitat. A habitat assessment will be completed during the project's preliminary design phase to identify habitat types and locations within the project area, and to confirm that absence of other ecological resources on site.

7.g. The proposed action may substantially interfere with nesting/breeding, foraging, or over-wintering habitat for the predominant species that occupy or use the project site.

See response to 7.b, above. The predominant wildlife species that occupy the project area include gray squirrel, raccoon, mallard duck, Canada goose, great blue heron, and white footed mouse. Habitat impacts are primarily related to vegetation clearing; such activities will be planned for fall/winter season to avoid impacts to nesting populations of fauna.

8. Impacts on Agricultural Resources

No impacts to agricultural resources were identified. The project area is not within a certified agricultural district, and does not contain any active agricultural land.

9. Impacts on Aesthetic Resources

9.a. Proposed action may be visible from any officially designated federal, state, or local scenic or aesthetic resource.

Temporary visual impacts associated with construction activities and permanent visual impacts associated with new infrastructure will occur as a result of the project. Construction work will take place within Independence Park, and construction equipment will likely be visible from Rikers Beach Road, Ferguson Beach Road, Independence Way, and Lake Ontario. Construction will be temporary, and Lake Ontario will remain accessible for recreational uses during, and following the completion of construction activities for the proposed project. Although temporary and permanent visual changes will occur as a result of the proposed projects, these infrastructure improvements are not expected to result in significant adverse changes to the local viewshed. Recreational trail use is already established on the property.

- 9.c. The proposed action may be visible from publicly accessible vantage points:
 - i. Seasonally (e.g., screened by summer foliage, but visible during other seasons)
 - ii. Year-Round

Construction activities associated with the new boardwalk and stream dredging will likely be visible from Lake Ontario and people traveling along Ferguson Beach Road. The location of the new boardwalk and the location of the stream dredging are bordered by trees to the north and west. Additionally, the boardwalks to be repaired are fully surrounded by trees. Trees will aid in screening visual changes on site from neighboring properties, particularly during the growing (leaf on) season. Construction activities will be temporary in nature. Infrastructure improvements for the new boardwalk, and boardwalk repair portions of the project would remain visible both seasonally and year-round. See response to 9.a. for further discussion of visual changes associated with the project.

- 9.d. The situation or activity in which viewers are engaged while viewing the proposed action is:
 - ii. Recreational or tourism based activities

See responses to 9.a. and 9.c., above.

9.e. The proposed action may cause a diminishment of the public enjoyment and appreciation of the designated aesthetic resource.

See response to 9.a., above.

9.f. There are similar projects visible within the following distance of the proposed project: 0-1/2 mile, ½-3 miles, 3-5 miles, or 5+ miles.

The Independence Trail REDI project involves construction of new trail infrastructure and repair of existing trail infrastructure, in addition to the possible dredging on the stream outlet on the property. No similar shoreline boardwalks are visible within the vicinity of the proposed project, however, the addition of the proposed shoreline boardwalk is not anticipated to negatively impact the surrounding visual landscape, and will not result in decreased opportunities to view Lake Ontario. Similar trail infrastructure is located in nearby local and county parks, and already exists on the property.

- 10. Impacts on Historic and Archeological Resources
 - 10.b. The proposed action may occur wholly or partially within, or substantially contiguous to, an area designated as sensitive for archaeological sites on the NY State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) archaeological site inventory.

The project was submitted to the SHPO for review through the Cultural Resource Information System (CRIS) in January 2022. The project area is located within an archaeologically sensitive area. SHPO issued a letter on February 10,

2022, indicating their opinion that the project would not affect any historic or archaeological resources. No further consultation with the SHPO is required.

11. Impacts on Open Space and Recreation

11.b. The proposed action may result in the loss of a current or future recreational resource.

The Independence Trail REDI Project will involve repair of existing and construction of new infrastructure within dedicated municipal parkland. Improvements to the park will not result in the loss of any parkland, and in fact will increase opportunities to enjoy the park. Portions of the park will remain closed during construction, but this will be temporary and limited to the shortest duration possible.

Access to portions of Independence Park as well as portions of the shoreline of the Oneida Lake may be temporarily restricted during construction. All impacts to recreational areas resulting from the proposed action are anticipated to be minor and ultimately positive in nature. Dredging of the stream is not anticipated to result in impacts to recreational resources, and would actually improve recreational access by reducing upstream flooding within the park.

12. Impacts on Critical Environmental Areas

No impacts to Critical Environmental Areas were identified. There are no Critical Environmental Areas within or near the project area.

13. Impacts on Transportation

No impacts on transportation were identified. Work will be restricted to the Independence Park property.

14. Impacts on Energy

No impacts to energy were identified. The project does not involve new construction or improvements involving an increase in energy usage.

15. Impacts on Noise, Odor, and Light

15.a. The proposed action may produce sound above noise levels established by local regulation.

Ambient noise levels will be exceeded temporarily during construction. Excess noise will be limited to weekday, daylight hours as much as possible to minimize adverse impacts on the community and nearby receptors. Elevated noise

conditions will be temporary and will end once construction is complete. No long-term impacts to noise levels are expected to result from the project.

16. Impacts on Human Health

16.c. There is a completed emergency spill remediation, or a completed environmental site remediation on, or adjacent to, the site of the proposed action.

One environmental remediation site (738015 - Alcan Sheet and Plate Company) is located on Lake Road, adjacent to the active aluminum fabricating plant. The facility consists of three operable units. PCBs have been detected in all three units. Construction debris and small quantities of rags and absorbent materials containing minor amounts of PCBs from a transformer leak were reportedly disposed of in unit 2. Remedial construction (removal of soil/sediment) in unit 3 was completed in 2009 and in unit 1 in 2011. DEC signed the Environmental Easement for this site on October 16, 2013. A Site Management Plan and Final Engineering Report have been completed and approved. No work is proposed in the vicinity of this remediation site. No new contaminant exposure or other health hazards are anticipated to be associated with the project.

17. Consistency with Community Plans

No impacts were identified. The proposed action is consistent with existing Community Plans.


18. Consistency with Community Character

18.d. The proposed action may interfere with the use or enjoyment of officially recognized or designated public resources.

During construction, recreational activities within the project area may be temporarily restricted to maintain public safety as well as safe working conditions and access for the contractor. Construction will be ongoing for approximately seven months. Access to the area will be fully restored upon completion of construction.

2022 Digital and Social Media Advertising – RFP Vendor Recommendation: Paperkite March 21st, 2022

Selection Process Overview

Oswego County Tourism (OCT) received nine proposals on Monday March 14th. Four team members from OCT, including Director David Turner, met on Tuesday May 15th to discuss the proposals at a high level. Each member of the selection team recorded scores on a "rate sheet" that was supplied by Oswego County Purchasing.

On Wednesday May 16th, the scores were compiled and Paperkite was the top scorer, with 359 out of a total possible score of 400. They were followed by Helen & Gertrude who had a score of 342/400.

On Monday March 21st the selection committee interviewed the top two vendors via video conference calls. After discussing, the team unanimously made a recommendation to contract these services with Paperkite.

Key Reasons for Selection

Overall, Paperkite performed above expectations at each step of the proposal process. Their written proposal provided a clear overview of the strategy, deliverables, and spending plan. They demonstrated expansive experience in not only digital marketing, but also NYS destination marketing within the TPA structure and the use of the I Love NY brand. Marketing specifically to anglers was highlighted in their written proposal as well as their video presentation.

Furthermore, they received a high recommendation from our regional partner "1000 Islands" (i.e. Jefferson County), who contracts with them as of 2021. For this reason, we believe there will be a significant time savings potential (e.g. when it comes to sharing our creative assets), as well the potential to launch campaigns and support our local partners with less notice.

Spend wise, at first glance Paperkite appeared to be one of the more expensive vendors. However, during their interview they revealed that their pricing structure included the majority of the creative development costs for the campaigns (e.g. copy development and some basic video editing), which Helen & Gertrude did not include. This will create fewer restrictions, especially on tight deadlines, and allow OCT to prioritize the goals and strategy of our campaigns.

Year 9 of the program focused on expedited partner therapy for the treatment of Chlamydia trachomatis and Neisseria gonorrhoeae. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the program was interrupted as significant resources were dedicated to the pandemic response efforts. The attached position request is to add the position of Landfill Supervisor within the Department of Solid Waste. As contemplated in the annexed request, this would be a foreman-type position supervising the day-to-day activities of small teams of employees engaged in the landfill's working face operations, soil and cover transport, waste and recyclable transport, repair and maintenance evolutions, and, occasionally, transfer station operations as necessary.

The Department of Solid Waste's landfill operations have evolved over recent years toward managing substantially increased volumes of waste. Annual tonnages delivered to the landfill over the past several years have increased two-fold over average acceptance rates from a decade ago. The Department's workforce has not expanded to meet the demands of managing this additional material which places significant burden on the current employees to keep up.

Likewise, the landfill has ancillary systems which require regular maintenance. The proposed position would perform daily inspections and lead maintenance crews in construction and repair of these systems, including leachate collection infrastructure, landfill gas collection systems and stormwater management structures. The Department is subject to expanding State and federal regulations and as the landfill expands and ages these systems require additional skilled maintenance.

At the same time, the Department has experience significant attrition of experienced employees due to retirement or voluntary resignation for better vocational opportunities elsewhere. While the Department has been successful in bringing new employees onboard, they require additional training and oversight to ensure operation objectives are executed. The requested position is intended to address this end by having an experienced operator with supervisory authority involved in daily operations as a trainer and leader.

The attached request is to reclassify Equipment Mechanic I position in Solid Waste-Energy Recovery Facility (ERF) to an Equipment Mechanic II title.

The mechanic assigned to the ERF performs preventative maintenance and corrective repair upon all of ERF's off and on-road rolling stock. This is the only equipment mechanic position at the ERF directly responsible for all of the facility's rolling equipment. The mechanic is responsible for running the repair shop including direct coordination with vendors and maintaining parts inventory. The mechanic is also responsible for all scheduling and prioritizing of maintenance upon the same equipment.

This has traditionally been a hard position to recruit and maintain employees. The position is currently vacant due to the voluntary resignation of an employee to take outside employment. The other four (4) equipment mechanic positions in the Department are all classified as Equipment Mechanic II. Reclassification would provide parity of pay through all the Department's equipment mechanics. Reclassification could provide opportunity for intradepartmental transfers and would bring the salary closer to market rates to help retain employees.

Therefore, I am seeking permission to reclassify this position.

The Department of Solid Waste requests a budget modification to transfer Two-Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars from its unappropriated funds to its Highway and Street Equipment account (CL8160.5240). The purpose of the transfer will be to effectuate the purchase of an excavator to replace an existing excavator in the Department's fleet.

Solid Waste uses excavators on a daily basis to scrape out hauler dump boxes and roll-offs, to dig cover material for the landfill, to dig ditches and drains and to maintain stormwater structures. The Department maintains two excavators to permit downtime for repairs. A larger 300 series machine is used as backup for daily use and is used for larger construction and maintenance tasks around the landfill as necessary.

The existing 1996 Daewoo DH320 excavator has suffered a catastrophic engine failure. This machine is in poor condition despite significant expense of maintenance funds and employee time. Given its make and age, parts are very difficult to procure and are prohibitively expensive, leading to long downtimes after any part failure. It is currently deemed financially advantageous to procure newer equipment for this role versus investing in a full engine overhaul of the failed twenty-six-year-old excavator.

Accordingly, the Department is requesting a budget transfer to cover the purchase of a newer equipment. Failure to replace the same equipment will result in lost time accomplishing mandatory operations scheduled to begin this spring including cover mining and stormwater infrastructure maintenance.

COUNTY OF OSWEGO LOCAL LAW 4 OF 2022 AMENDING LOCAL LAW NUMBER 4 OF 2015, A LOCAL LAW PERMITTING AND REGULATING ALL - TERRAIN VEHICLE (ATV) OPERATION ON CERTAIN COUNTY ROADS

BE IT ENACTED by the County Legislature of the County of Oswego as follows: Local Law Number 4 of 2015 be and is hereby AMENDED IN ITS ENTIRETY to read as follows:

Section 1. This local law shall be known as the "County Road ATV Use Law."

Section 2. Purpose and Findings

The purpose of this Local Law is to open for travel by all-terrain vehicles certain portions of the County Road System pursuant to the authority granted in Section 2405 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York. This Legislature hereby finds and determines that the opening of certain County Roads to ATV use is necessary in order for ATVs to access trails adjacent thereto. This Legislature further finds that promoting opportunities for recreational use of all-terrain vehicles will stimulate the local economy and offer enjoyment to the citizens of the County and those tourists traveling in the area.

Section 3. Definitions

ATV: An all-terrain vehicle, as defined in Section 2228(1) of the New York State Vehicle and Traffic Law.

County: County of Oswego

County Bridge/Culvert: A County owned bridge or culvert on a town road designated for ATV operation.

County Road: A highway designated as a County Road on the Official County Highway Map as provided by Section 115 of the Highway Law of the State of New York.

Designated Road: A County Road, or portion thereof, designated for use by ATVs by this Local Law.

Owner: "Owner" as defined by Section 2401(3) of the Vehicle and Traffic Law.

Operator: "Operator" as defined by Section 2401(4) of the Vehicle and Traffic Law.

ATV Trail System: A system of trails suitable for use by ATVs operated by clubs and/or Oswego County that includes developed trails on certain municipal, state, and privately owned lands and designated connecting highways.

Vehicle and Traffic Law: The Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York.

Section 4. Designated Roads

The following County Roads, or the indicated portions thereof, are hereby designated as open to travel by ATVs:

SEE SCHEDULE A ATTACHED HERETO AND MADE A PART HEREOF

Section 5. Rules, Conditions, and Restrictions

The following rules, conditions and restrictions shall be applicable to all County Roads opened to ATV use pursuant to this Local Law.

- a) The utilization of County Roads by ATVs shall be only and solely for the purpose of o traveling directly from one ATV trail head to another.
- b) No Person shall operate an ATV on a Designated Road, between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.
- c) No person shall operate an ATV on a Designated Road, while within the corporate limits of a village, at a speed exceeding twenty miles per hour.
- d) An operator of an ATV shall operate the ATV as far to the right upon a designated roadway as conditions allow.
- e) No sleigh, sled, toboggan or trailer shall be towed on a designated roadway by an ATV.
- f) No person shall operate an ATV on any part or portion of a Designated Road, other than on the traveled 'roadway,' unless the person is bringing the ATV to a stop or has stopped the ATV.
- g) No person shall operate an ATV more than one abreast in a single lane on a Designated Road.
- h) No person shall operate an ATV in excess of twenty-five (25) miles per hour or the posted speed limit whichever is less.
- i) All ATV use shall be in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Vehicle and Traffic Law and all ATVs shall comply with NYS DMV registration, insurance, lighting and equipment requirements.

Section 6. Penalties

Any person who violates any provisions of this Local Law shall be guilty of an offense as defined by Section 10.00 of the Penal Law of the State of New York, and the violator or offender shall be liable for a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$150.00 for the first offense; for a fine not less than \$50.00 and not more than \$200.00 for a second offense committed within two years from a previous conviction under this Local Law; and a fine of not less than \$100.00 and no more than \$500.00 for a third or subsequent offense all committed within three years.

Section 7. Severability

If any part of this Local Law or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision in application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered; and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this Local Law or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances, and the County Legislature of the County of Oswego hereby declares that it would have passed this Local Law or the remainder of it had such invalid application or provision been apparent.

Section 8. Posting of Designations and Regulations

In accordance with the requirements of 2405 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law, the Superintendent shall install signs and markers identifying the Designated Roads. Said Superintendent shall also post signs on which shall appear the regulations, conditions and restrictions set forth in this Local Law, to the extent that such regulations, conditions and restrictions exceed those set forth in the Vehicle and Traffic Law.

Section 9. Prior Local Laws Superseded

All other Oswego County ATV local laws be and are hereby SUPERSEDED by this enactment (LL. 1 of 2005; LL. 1 of 2006; LL 3 of 2018

Section 10. Effective Date & Filing

This Local Law shall take effect upon filing with the Secretary of State. A certified copy of this local law shall also be filed with the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles pursuant to Vehicle and Traffic Law Section 2405.

RESOLUTION OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF OSWEGO, ELECTING A CENTS PER GALLON RATE OF SALES AND COMPENSATING USE TAXES ON MOTOR FUEL AND DIESEL MOTOR FUEL, IN LIEU OF THE PERCENTAGE RATE OF SUCH TAXES, PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 29 OF THE TAX LAW OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the County of OSWEGO, as follows:

SECTION 1. Resolution No. 46 of 1996, is amended by adding a new section 4-B to read as follows:

Section 4-B. Cents per gallon rate of sales and compensating use taxes on motor fuel and diesel motor fuel.

Notwithstanding any provision of this enactment to the contrary, in lieu of the percentage rate of sales and compensating use taxes imposed on receipts from the retail sale of and consideration given or contracted to be given for, or for the use of, motor fuel and diesel motor fuel, such taxes shall be imposed at a rate of cents per gallon of such motor fuel or diesel motor fuel, in the manner prescribed by subdivision (m) of section 1111 of the New York Tax Law, provided that, for purposes of calculating the cents per gallon rate of tax, such receipts or consideration shall be limited to four (4) dollars per gallon of either such fuel. Provided that, if the average price of such fuels changes as described in such subdivision (m) of section 1111 of the Tax Law, the Commissioner of Taxation and Finance shall adjust the cents per gallon tax rate on such fuels in the manner prescribed in such subdivision (m) of section 1111 of the Tax Law.

SECTION 2. This resolution shall take effect June 1, 2022 and the amendment of Resolution 46 of 1996 as set forth in Section 1 herein shall sunset effective December 1, 2022.
