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## **Executive Summary**

#### 1. Introduction

The Annual Action Plan is a result of the yearly assessment and review completed by St. Tammany Parish, and required as part of the grant application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) entitlement funds from the U.S. Department Housing and Urban Development. CDBG funds are used to provide decent, safe and sanitary housing, a suitable living environment, and to expand economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income citizens.

The Annual Action Plan serves as a planning document for FY 2014-2015 and provides details for program development, budgeting, goal setting, and performance assessment. The geographic areas of unincorporated St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana, and the municipal limits of Abita Springs, Covington, Madisonville, and Mandeville are part of the Action Plan.

Activities eligible for HUD funding through this planning process must meet at least one of the three national objectives defined by HUD:

- 1. Aid in the prevention of slums and blight;
- 2. Be of primary benefit to low- and moderate-income citizens; and/or
- 3. Meeting community development needs having a particular urgency.

Staff members from the St. Tammany Parish Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Economic Development and the Department of Inter-Governmental Relations were appointed to coordinate and develop the Plan.

## 2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

#### Housing:

The most common housing problem in St. Tammany Parish is cost burden, followed by overcrowding and then substandard housing. African Americans, Asians, Hispanics, and Native Americans are disproportionately affected by some of these problems. The Parish is investing significant funds this fiscal year in affordable and supportive housing programs including emergency housing, rehabilitation for owner occupied units and homebuyer counseling assistance.

#### Public Housing:

There are two public housing authorities located in St. Tammany Parish; the Covington Housing Authority in the City of Covington and the Slidell Housing Authority in the City of Slidell. Neither one falls under the jurisdiction of the Parish since they are both located within municipalities. The only PHA that is being reported on in this Plan is the Covington Housing Authority since the City of Covington participates in St. Tammany's urban county entitlement program. The City of Slidell receives its own CDBG entitlement allocation directly from HUD. The Covington Housing Authority is in good condition and the public housing units underwent upgrades in the previous year. Interior upgrades included the installation of laminate wood floors, wood blinds, new cabinets, light fixtures, and new roofs to their public housing units. In an effort to improve the living environment of its residents, the CHA is paying for a security guard to patrol CHA properties.

### Homeless:

This year the Parish's Action Plan will take a more strategic and targeted approach to preventing or ameliorating the social and community factors attributing to homelessness. As the needs of the population have changed, the Parish's programming is keeping pace with the community's need for services. For the 2014 CDBG program year, a range of projects and programs will address the community concerns of homelessness and homelessness prevention. The Northlake Homeless Coalition conducted an annual count of the number of persons experiencing homelessness in the Northshore region. The count was conducted during the week of January 27th, 2014, wherein 22 partnering organizations surveyed persons within our community to identify those who are without permanent, stable housing on the night of January 27th. In conjunction with the 2014 statewide Homeless Census in Louisiana, Region Nine (9) counted two hundred sixty-two (262) men, women, and children who were literally homeless in the Region 9 area. The total number of persons who were identified as literally homeless on the night of the 2014 Homeless Census was a slight decrease of 5% from the 2013 count and a 7%

reduction from the 2011 count. Twenty fewer persons were residing in transitional housing on the night

of the 2014 Census than in the previous year, but it was relatively consistent with the number of persons

in 2011. The number of persons in ESG beds had a very slight decrease (2%) from the previous year, but

it has remained relatively static over the past three counts. The greatest increase was seen in the

number of persons who were residing in unsheltered conditions, with 16% of the count in 2014 and 13%

in 2013. This was also the first reported uptick in the number of persons residing in places not intended

for human habitation since 2011. A copy of the report is located in Appendix C.

Non-Homeless Special Needs Populations:

The HUD definition of "special needs" includes the frail and non-frail elderly, persons with physical,

mental, or behavioral disabilities, persons with HIV/AIDS, and persons with alcohol or drug addictions.

According to the 2012 American Community Survey, 37,531 individuals in St. Tammany Parish are

classified as having a disability. Members of this population are primarily low-income and are in need of

services that include but are not limited to case management, supportive services, transportation, and

affordable housing assistance.

**Non-Housing Community Development:** 

The non-housing community development needs of the Parish include but are not limited to

infrastructure improvements, social and supportive services, homeless services, and public facilities

improvements.

The Parish has appointed its Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to coordinate the Annual Action Plan preparation process as the lead agency. The three components of DHHS, possessing extensive experience in social service delivery, project planning, grant administration, and community outreach and advocacy, are charged with creating and implementing programs which directly and indirectly improve the lives of Parish residents. DHHS has managed CDBG entitlement funds for the Parish since the Parish was designated an entitlement community in 2008.

#### 1. Introduction

St. Tammany Parish staff members have extended the public input process to many local organizations that would typically have an interest in the Annual Action Plan's statutory goals of providing decent housing, neighborhood improvement, and economic opportunities. This process took place through a series of public hearings, emails, conversations, requests for information and comments received during the time of plan development.

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I))

In the past year, two new coalitions have been organized to address the needs of two segments of the population which are struggling to fulfill their daily requirements: "St. Tammany Behavioral Health Task Force" and the "St. Tammany Housing and Homeless Alliance". These two groups were spearheaded by a Department of Health and Human Services consultant and have become excellent planning tools for service coordination for mental health, homelessness, and housing needs in St. Tammany. Populations challenged with mental and behavioral health issues and the lack of affordable, decent housing are two of the most important and visible needs of our community. Both groups have played a significant role in ensuring that service gaps are identified and that efforts made to address those gaps are non-duplicative and coordinated.

Historically, St. Tammany Parish has provided CDBG funds to support to behavioral and mental health organizations since receiving entitlement funds. Beginning this program year, financial support for these organizations will be provided by the Parish's Public Health Millage. This millage allows the Parish to invest approximately \$3 million each year in public health initiatives through a dedicated ad valorem tax or 1.84 mills. This public health millage was renewed by Parish voters in 2012 for a period of ten years. Public comments were collected through surveys, fax, E-mail, written and orally at public hearings.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

Parish staff members both attended Northlake Homeless Coalition (NHC) monthly meetings and held a separate meeting with the NHC co-chairs. Through discussion with other attendees at the NHC meetings, CDBG staff were able to take into consideration the needs, thoughts, and input of local homeless service providers. At the separate meeting that took place with the NHC co-chairs, the specific needs of the homeless community that have been studied by the NHC and the data obtained through the HMIS were both discussed. The NHC collects and maintains data that provides the Parish with the best available evaluation of the needs of the homeless in our region, the demographics of that population, and how the available services are able or unable to meet those needs.

Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the jurisdiction's area in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards for and evaluate outcomes of projects and activities assisted by ESG funds, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the operation and administration of HMIS

Aside from administering the CDBG program and the Parish Public Health millage, the Department of Health and Human Services manages and supports the Community Action Agency (CAA). CAA is responsible for administering ESG funds received from the State of Louisiana's Office of Community Development. Local organizations eligible to receive ESG funds submit applications to CAA which forwards it to the State for determining eligibility and awarding funds. CAA staffers participate in the Northlake Homeless Coalition. The NHC and its board are responsible for developing performance standards and outcomes, policies and procedures, and identifying funding for the administration of HMIS. Participants in the NHC general meetings have the opportunity to submit recommendations to the NHC regarding their activities. CAA staffers maintain an open working relationship with the NHC and are available to share information and coordinate services and program development when necessary.

## Narrative

The Parish publicized the dates and times of the public hearings so that any representatives from local governments who were interested in attending were able to do so. Notices regarding the hearings were run in the local newspaper, on the Parish's Website, and through E-mails distributed by partner agencies and contacts. The City of Covington is the only municipality that attended the public hearing and made comments regarding the needs of their citizens' comments to Parish staff.

## Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

The Parish of St. Tammany adopted a Citizen Participation Plan in 2008. This plan is still in use. In these meetings, the summary of the Annual Action planning process was presented, and opportunities for citizen input was allotted. Written, phone-in, and E-mailed comments were also encouraged. This year, two public hearings were held at different locations in the Parish in order to solicit community input:

- July 1st, 2014 at the Greater Covington Center
- July 2nd, 2014 at the Parish Council Chambers in Slidell

In accordance with the planning process, two public hearings were held during the Plan development stage. Meeting notices for the public hearings were publicized in the St. Tammany Farmer (the official St. Tammany Parish journal) and on the Parish's Website. E-mails were also distributed to local government agencies and nonprofit organizations to alert them of the hearings as well. The hearings were in the afternoon and evening hours on different days of the week in an effort to accommodate both those who attended during working hours on behalf of their employers and those who attended after working hours as Parish citizens. An additional 30 day public review process was provided for the public to have a chance to review and comment upon the Annual Action Plan document before it was sent to HUD.

Input from the community contributed to the establishment of housing and community development goals. Parish staff reviewed public input and comments as they were submitted. Staff weighed the priorities of Parish administration in conjunction with citizen input, and then presented a proposed project plan to Parish administration for consideration and approval. A draft of the Annual Action Plan and projects proposed for the Annual Action Plan were posted on the Parish's Website on July 7th, 2014 and summaries were presented at a public hearing held that evening. A 30-day comment period will run through August 7th. Citizens, public agencies, or other interested parties wishing to comment on the plans can do so by E-mail or by mail to the Department of Health and Human Services.

## Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

There are currently no entitlement fund matching requirements that need to be addressed. However, CDBG funds that are used to administer the goSTAT voucher program will contribute to goSTAT's FTA match requirements. ## Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

Therefore, for the CDBG program year 2014 – 2015, a variety of projects and programs will address the issues of homelessness, and homelessness prevention; affordable housing; home rehabilitation for low to moderate income families, homelessness and transitional assistance; life skills training; and

homeownership centers to provide counseling and guidance for families seeking a strategy out of poverty, and program planning and administration oversight.

## Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

The Veterans Village program will be located in Lacombe at the site of the former K-Bar-B youth ranch (currently owned by the Kiwanis). This program is being initiated by a Veterans group called the Riders of the Brotherhood, a non- profit organization, dedicated to the mission of providing a location for respite and rehabilitation for LMI and homeless veterans. The program envisions the development of a Veterans Village to provide transitional case management and support to enable our veterans to return to self- sufficiency and productivity. The facility will provide case management and support services, such as vocational and education training, behavioral therapy and medical services. CDBG funds will be as a match for technical assistance, organizational capacity building and site acquisition.

#### Technical Assistance and Organizational Capacity Building for Affordable Housing

The State Office of Community Development- Disaster Recovery Unit is providing CDBG –DR funds to St. Tammany Parish to underwrite the local land trust, the Northshore Housing Initiative. This organization makes available affordable housing opportunities to income-eligible clients. The Parish will also continue to collaborate and provide support both the East and West side affiliates of Habitat for Humanity organizations, as they provide affordable housing opportunities to residents as well. DHHS is submitting an application to the Louisiana Housing Corporation for additional rehabilitation funds.

#### <u>Technical Assistance and Capacity Building for One Stop Homeless Center</u>

In collaboration with other social service organizations, St. Tammany Parish will undertake Technical Assistance and Capacity Building for One Stop Homeless Center in the eastern part of the Parish. The primary focus will be to establish a One Stop Homeless Center is assist homeless individuals and families with obtaining services to allow them to return to self-sufficiency. The Center provides case management as well as a place for homeless individuals to do their laundry, shower, receive mail and use the telephone.

#### Fund St. Tammany Parish Transit

A Transit work group is currently studying the state of the St. Tammany Parish Transit Program. Pending the outcome of the study, CDBG funds will be allocated to fund the transit program, which provides income-eligible individuals with vouchers so that they can ride the Parish's transit system at no cost. This Annual Action Plan

will assist the homeless population in accessing available services.

**Attend NHC and STHHA Meetings**

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely

low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly

funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities,

foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving

assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services,

employment, education, or youth needs.

Establishment of a Veterans Village

CDBG funds will be used toward the goal of site acquisition for the establishment of the Veteran's

Village within a designated revitalization area. This project will create a rehabilitation and respite center

to support homeless and transitioning Veterans to enable them to return to self- sufficiency and

productivity. The facility will provide a rehabilitation and respite center for all veterans to receive

support services, such as vocational and education training, behavioral therapy and medical services.

**Homeless and Housing Assistance Program** 

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The Homeless and Housing Assistance Program (HHAP) is a rapid re-housing program designed to assist homeless families and individuals of St Tammany Parish to become stably housed. Clients must be within CDBG income limits and meet HUD definition of literally homeless. The ultimate goal of the program is housing stability. Families confronted with homelessness will be able to participate in the program and receive assistance such as deposits, rent, utilities; and life skills education and money management. The HHAP program will leverage the existing CAA programs by augmenting the total funding available to provide services, thereby enabling more residents to receive assistance and increase the leveraging of Parish and community resources.

The current Supportive Housing Programs and the Emergency Solutions Grants strive to deliver the homeless prevention solutions. Client will continue to achieve and create collaborative self- sufficiency goals. These goals will include life skills classes, job search, gainful employment for every working-age member of the family provided they are not disabled. Identifying additional resources will be tapped with the goal of increasing household income by determining eligibility for SSI, SSA, Medicaid, and/ or unemployment. The case manager will be responsible for communicating and interfacing with school system to make sure each school age child is enrolled and attending regularly. Finally, clients will be assessed for eligibility in Section 8 and other income-based housing programs.

Case management data will be gathered and used as the basis of a development strategy to be incorporated into needs assessment study. Capacity Building and Technical Assistance will enhance CAA's ability to respond to the needs of the homeless with St. Tammany Parish and its revitalization areas and targeted census tracts.

#### <u>Creation of St. Tammany Parish Sheltering System for Families</u>

The St. Tammany Housing and Homeless Alliance is developing a local affiliate of the national "Family Promise" organization. As a sheltering system for families, this program would provide shelter, case management, life skills education, and transportation assistance for homeless families. The program is designed to ensure that children can attend school that families can stay together, and that assistance is provided so that these families can again become self-sufficient. The initial start-up activities are funded through the Parish.

Annual Action Plan 2014 <u>Provide Home Repair Assistance</u>

The Parish will continue to fund minor home repair programs targeting LMI households, which can

receive necessary repairs and that, make their homes physically and financially more sustainable The

Parish is again funding local non- profit organizations to perform health and safety related repairs. In

previous years the Parish has successfully partnered with Volunteers of America, Northshore Disaster

Recovery Initiatives, World Changers and Habitat for Humanity St Tammany West. In an effort to

leverage resources and provide the maximum amount of support, the Parish has submitted an

application to the Louisiana Housing Corporation for additional rehabilitation funds to reach more

families in 2014-2015.

Attend NHC and STHHA Meetings

CDBG staff will continue to attend monthly meetings of the Northlake Homeless Coalition and the St.

Tammany Housing and Homeless Alliance. These meetings help the Parish stay current with the issues

that are affecting the homeless population and the organizations that serve them. This will also allow

Many of the Parish's elected officials see a need for affordable workforce housing in our community.

CDBG staff will work with local officials and the North shore Housing Initiative in presenting an

informational campaign to the public that teaches them community about the benefits and needs of

workforce housing.

High Cost of Land

The Parish is collaborating with the local land trust, the Northshore Housing Initiative, by providing them

with non-entitlement CDBG funds received from the State Office of Community Development. These

funds will assist NHI's Community Land Trust Program which will provide assistance to qualified

CDBG Funds for St. Tammany Parish

Dear Alex:

We met and talked at the end of your open forum at the Covington Center on the first of July.

As you may know, the Children's Advocacy Center - Hope House (CAC) provides a place for a child to be interviewed in a non-leading and safe environment when there is an indication that the child has been abused or has witnessed a violent crime. We interview children as young as three years old. The vast majority of the children who come to us have been victims of child sexual abuse.

In addition to the forensic interviewing, we also provide counseling to the child who was victimized as well as to the non-offending caregivers and child's siblings if needed as abuse of a child often disrupts the entire family. All our services are given without charge to anyone. Not only is the CAC one of very few counseling centers offering sexual abuse counseling to children, we are the only one who offers it at no cost; and we hope to be able to continue that. Many therapists in our parish refer their clients to us when a child indicates they have been sexually abused.

National statistics reveal that 40% of children are victimized by older children. Statistics also bear out that counseling is an effective means of stopping the cycle of abuse as well as helping a child heal from abuse. We encourage all the children coming to us to get some counseling and, fortunately, many do.

Unresolved issues with child sexual abuse create problems throughout adulthood. National statistics also reveal that the price tag for treatment can run into many tens of thousands of dollars and that the effects of child sexual abuse cost a parish our size thousands of dollars a year in lost work time and/or the inability to work at all due to mental health issues.

In order to have a healthy work force, we need mentally healthy workers. I hope that you will consider using some of the CDBG funding for mental health services to those who cannot either afford to pay for them or cannot access them because they are not available in their area.






#### Highlights of 2014 Homeless Census Point-in-Time Count for Louisiana – Region 9 **Northlake Homeless Coalition**

An annual count of the number of persons experiencing homelessness was conducted during the week of January 27th, 2014, wherein twenty-two partnering organizations of the Northlake Homeless Coalition surveyed persons within our community to identify those who are without permanent, stable housing on the night of Monday, January 27th. In conjunction with the 2014 statewide Homeless Census in Louisiana, Region Nine (9) counted two hundred sixty-two (262) men, women, and children who were literally homeless in the parishes of Livingston, St. Helena, St. Tammany, Tangipahoa, and Washington. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) defines a person as literally homeless only when he/she resides in:

- A place not meant for human habitation, such as cars, parks, sidewalks, abandoned buildings, etc.
- An emergency shelter,
- Or a transitional housing program for persons who were unsheltered or residing in an emergency shelter prior to entering the program.



Transitional Housing for formerly homeless persons provide extended shelter stays and supportive services for homeless individuals and/or families with the goal of helping them live independently and transition into permanent housing; stays are generally longer than two weeks but typically 60 days or more and, in many cases, up to two years or more; may be configured for specialized groups within the homeless population such as people with substance abuse problems, homeless mentally ill, homeless domestic violence victims, veterans or homeless people with AIDS/HIV.

Why the Homeless Census Matters: Data derived from the Homeless Census provides the community partners of the Northlake Homeless Coalition with a critical "snapshot" of homelessness and the services that are in place to respond. This information is imperative to better understand how homelessness is changing, to inform the public at large, and to measure our progress towards preventing and ending homelessness. Single points in time also allow for communities to concentrate efforts for consistent data collection and integration from all service providers within the catchment area.


I. Populations Data: The total number of persons who were identified as literally homeless on the night of the 2014 Homeless Census was a slight decrease of five percent (5%) from the 2013 count and a seven percent (7%) percent reduction from the 2011 count. Twenty fewer persons were residing in transitional housing on the night of the 2014 Census than in the previous year, but it was relatively consistent with the number of persons in 2011. The number of persons in emergency shelter beds had a very slight decrease (2%) from the previous year, but it has remained relatively static over the past three counts. The greatest increase was seen in the number of persons who were residing in unsheltered conditions, with sixteen percent (16%) of the count in 2014 and thirteen percent (13%) in 2013. This was also the first reported uptick in the number of person residing in places not intended for human habitation since 2011.



II. Subpopulations Data: In addition to identifying the total number of persons who were experiencing literal homelessness on the night of January 27<sup>th</sup>, survey participants were asked questions that allowed for identifying the number of persons that can be defined as members of special populations, or sub-populations, as stated by HUD. Areas of interest include certain long-term disabling health conditions, chronic homelessness, Veterans of the United States Military, and persons fleeing domestic violence.


III. Participating Organizations: Twenty-two human service agencies participated in the 2014 Census by directly surveying persons seeking/accessing their assistance, or welcoming volunteers to conduct interviews with their consumers, during the week of the Count. These service providers included emergency shelters, transitional housing programs, feeding programs, motel voucher programs, and Permanent Supportive Housing programs.



Parish Data Comparison: Charts 5a-5d provide a comparison of total population counts residing in the three housing types and total for 2011-2014. The greatest growth between the 2013 and 2014 Census years was seen in St. Tammany Parish, with thirty-six (36) more persons identified as experiencing *literal homelessness*. Thirty-nine (39) fewer persons were identified in Tangipahoa Parish, and ten (10) fewer in Livingston Parish.



Trends in Parish Counts: Chart 6 demonstrates temporal changes in the counts of persons identified as experiencing literal homelessness on the night of the Homeless Census over the course of four years, 2011-2014.



Counts by Parish: The following series of charts exhibits the number of persons identified as literally homeless, with the counts organized by the parishes where respondents resided during the night of the 2014 Homeless Census. The five parishes that comprise the NHC's Continuum of Care are Livingston, St. Helena, St. Tammany, Tangipahoa, and Washington. Please note that no persons were identified as literally homeless in St. Helena Parish during the Count.



VI. Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) Data Comparison: In addition to identifying persons who are experiencing literal homelessness, during the same data collection period, 328 persons were identified as living in permanent supportive housing for formerly homeless persons who have disabling conditions. This is an increase of 28, or nine percent (9%), above the number of persons residing in Permanent Supportive Housing during the 2013 Census, and increase of 103 beds (46%) since 2011. Permanent Supportive Housing programs provide affordable, community-based housing for individuals and families who have been diagnosed with a physical or developmental disability, a severe mental illness, substance abuse problems or HIV/AIDS. Many persons who are in Permanent Supportive Housing programs have experienced long-term or chronic homelessness. PSH housing models include apartments, group homes or single-room occupancy housing. In addition to housing, these programs also provide the necessary supportive services, including case management, that help keep persons stabilized. The units of PSH in Region 9 are funded through HUD, as well as the U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs.




Counts of persons residing in Permanent Supportive Housing by Parish: The following chart details the number of persons that were residing in Permanent Supportive Housing during the 2014 Homeless Census. Fifty-three percent (53%) of residents were in St. Tammany Parish, thirty-seven percent (37%) were in Tangipahoa, seven percent (7%) in Livingston, and three percent (3%) in Washington. There were no formerly homeless persons residing in PSH units in St. Helena Parish during the 2014 Count.



VULNERABILITY INDEX: The 2014 Homeless Census also incorporated questions that allowed for respondents to be assessed for medical fragility, using the Vulnerability Index. The Vulnerability, or VI, is a nationally recognized tool<sup>5</sup> for identifying who is most at risk of dying by remaining unsheltered, or in Emergency Shelters in an intermittent basis. For individuals who have been homeless for at least six months, one or more of the following markers place them at heightened risk of mortality: (1) More than three hospitalizations or emergency room visits in a year; (2) More than three emergency room visits in the previous three months; (3) Aged 60 or older; (4) Cirrhosis of the liver; (5) End-stage renal disease; (6) History of frostbite, immersion foot, hypothermia OR Heat stroke; (7) HIV/AIDS; (8) Tri-morbidity: co-occurring psychiatric, substance abuse, and chronic medical condition, lived on the streets for more than six months, as well as series of health conditions. Using these eight risk factors, a score on a scale of zero to eight is assigned to the respondent. Rank is ascending, with zero indicating the least vulnerable to mortality and eight having the greatest risk. Communities can use this data to prioritize who may benefit the most, health wise, by being placed in permanent housing. Within Louisiana, several of the Continua are using Vulnerability Index findings to help focus decision-making around limited permanent housing program funds.



Overall in the 2014 Homeless Census, twenty-two (22) persons were identified as having a VI score of one or greater, which is five more persons than were identified during the 2013 count. The majority of these persons had a score of one.

Count of Persons with Vulnerability Index Score by Parish: In 2014, Nineteen (19) persons in Emergency Shelters and three



(3) persons residing on the street comprise the 2014
Vulnerability Index report. Twenty-two (22) persons total, with a 68% count of those in St. Tammany Parish and 32% in Tangipahoa. Eighty-six percent (86%) of those most vulnerable were residing in emergency shelters and fourteen percent (14%) were unsheltered. It should be noted that thirty-nine percent (39%) of the total count of literally homeless persons, or 101 persons, were assessed for vulnerabilities.
