Our employees work hard every day to focus their efforts on roads, drainage, water quality, and a multitude of other services. In these efforts, our departments do not work in isolation — they work together to accomplish multi-faceted goals. Public Works and Engineering work closely on road and drainage projects, and often Environmental Services will join the effort when water quality is involved. The Department of Grants is instrumental in partnering with these departments to apply for grant funding to complete initiatives. Parish Government operates as one interconnected agency, and as such, most projects only move forward through cooperative efforts from several departments.

We spent 2017 constructing and/or improving ways to manage the Parish's drainage — from cleaning out the 1200 ditches we maintain, to building regional retention ponds with water quality in mind. We created the Major Streets Plan that forecasts and plans the Parish's road needs for the next 40 years. This plan includes improvements of existing roadways, and the design and creation of future roads to ultimately increase travel efficiency in St. Tammany. And we started the process of revising our Development Code. As we look ahead to 2018, we will continue to make roads, drainage, water quality, efficiency and customer service top priorities. 2017 started out as a great year. We worked with the administration to initiate major projects to improve road infrastructure and projects to improve drainage all over the Parish. We held the opening of the Northshore Technical Community College to bring education closer to our constituents. It has increased enrollment every semester. We noted that our sales tax had leveled off and began to decline at the end of the year. We attempted to renew the 1/5 cent sales tax for both the jail and the courthouse which was rejected by the voters. A hiring freeze was immediately implemented for Parish employees. We then prepared and passed a budget for 2018 which considered the potential loss of this revenue to the Parish.

I appreciate my colleagues on the council for selecting me as their chairman for this year. I truly enjoyed working with President Pat Brister and her administration in continuing to develop programs to enhance the quality of life we all seek and keep St. Tammany as the place where people want to live.





9.25% SALES TAX IN ST. TAMMANY PARISH (UNINCORPORATED)





This function includes expenditures, not only of the Parish Government, but also expenditures of other agencies, as supported by our available funding sources— such as salaries/benefits, professional/contractual services, computers/software, property/equipment, grounds/building maintenance, and other costs.
