Modernized Billing and Payment System Ready for Customers

The new modernized and streamlined billing and payment service for Upper Allen residents is inching closer to implementation. (Read more about it in the Summer 2023 newsletter.) The combination of BS&A accounting software (exclusive to local governments) and InvoiceCloud increases flexibility and payment options available to residents and streamlines business practices for the Finance Department.

This software switch offers increased flexibility and payment options:

- All payments to the Township can be paid online through InvoiceCloud—everything from utility payments to fees for inspections and permits. (Those wishing to pay via check will still have that option.)
- Residents can now pay online or via phone with a credit card,

- Venmo, PayPal, Google Pay, and Apple Pay.
- An automated phone system for bill payment will be available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
- Residents can receive reminders and make payments via text.

Residents will receive a post card in early April with instructions on how to utilize the new system.

Mechanicsburg School District Provides Satellite Office for Police Department

The Upper Allen Township Police Department has been a presence in the multiple school buildings of Mechanicsburg Area School District for more than 40 years. Officers teach SMARTS—Students Making Appropriate Responses to Tough Situations—classes on relevant topics like bullying and drug and alcohol abuse. Additionally, officers participate in a one-onone mentoring program with selected students and seek to serve as a friendly, reassuring presence as they patrol the

buildings and school properties.

Recently, the school district invited Upper Allen Police utilize office space in Mechanicsburg Middle School as a satellite office. The department accepted and

outfitted the space so that an officer could work from that location and interact with

Annual Brush Pickup Begins

Annual brush pickup begins on Monday, April 8th and will continue through Friday, May 17th. The guidelines are as follows:

Please have all branches at the curb by 7:00 a.m. on Monday morning in your zone. The Township cannot guarantee a specific day that branches will be picked up in any given zone.

The longer the branch, the better it is for workers to handle and place into the chipper.

Do not make your branch pile higher than three (3) feet or place branches in a pile wider than ten (10) feet. The limit is one (1) pile per house.

The Township will not drive onto private roads, driveways, or yards due to liability issues.

The Township will NOT pick up the following items:

Branches that are obstructed by parked vehicles or other items.

Branches that are on trailers or truck beds.

Small piles of branches, hedge trimmings, vines, long grasses, yard debris, poison ivy or oak, plants, etc. These items should be put in your garbage container and/or garbage bag and placed out for your weekly trash pickup (branches should be cut to no longer than 6-foot lengths and tied into 40-pound bundles). Each bundle counts towards weekly 6 trash can limit, but can be placed out every week.

Yard or tree debris that appears it was raked. If items were raked up, there is a good possibility that stones are included in the pile. This will damage the chipping equipment and produce potentially dangerous projectiles for the crew members. Please bag all of this type of debris and set it out with your trash.

Vines (they become tangled in the chipper).

Fence posts or building materials.

Rotten or dirty wood.

Thorns of any type.

Wood cut into firewood lengths (it jams the chipper).

Branches with any metal such as wire, nails, etc. attached.

Branches that do not have all cut ends facing the road and that are not stacked neatly (do not put out a pile of tangled branches facing all different ways).

Contractors' branch piles. This service is for residents only!

Whole trees or tree trimmings, unless they are 4" in diameter or less. Homeowners are responsible for disposing of anything larger; i.e., by contracting with a tree removal service or some other means.

Roots and stumps over 50 pounds. Roots and stumps 50 pounds or under will be taken but must be cut off and placed in a separate pile.

Garbage bags and trashcans full of debris or branches.

Community piles – if it appears that the branches did not come from the residence they are piled in front of, they will not be picked up. For example, your neighbors, friends or relatives cannot bring their tree limbs to your house for pickup. Please do not start a community pile for all the neighbors to add to – the Township will not pick these up! No exceptions!

Please note there is only one brush pickup per year.

Brush Recycling Days

The Township will be holding brush recycling days on Saturday June 8th, Saturday July 13th, Saturday August 10th, and Saturday September 14th from 7:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. The drop off site will be at the Township located at 100 Gettysburg Pike in the rear of the building. Please enter the

campus off English Drive and follow the signs. The site will close at 11:00 a.m. sharp. Please check the website at uatwp.org for updates. Brush is defined as tree limbs, shrubbery, and the like (no grass/leaves off of trees), no limbs larger than 4 inches in diameter and 6 feet in length. Upper Allen Township

brush accepts Upper from Allen Township residents only as part of our recycling efforts. Brush recycling is intended to clean up small amounts debris from residential properties. The program is not

intended to accept large tree removal projects. Large projects such as removing entire trees should employ the services of a commercial contractor. If you have large amounts of material to dispose of, please contact a commercial removal service. The Township asks that you participate in this program responsibly by not dropping off prohibited items at the site. Examples of prohibited items are: garbage, metals, concrete, lumber, stumps, logs over 4", stones, anything with thorns, grass clippings, etc. Upper Allen Township has the right to reject anything deemed unacceptable. Identification will be required. Public Works will then process the brush into wood chips which will be made available to Township residents.


Accountant Position Filled

Stormwater Management – Illicit Discharges



As warm weather approaches and spring rainfall increases, it is important to keep stormwater management in mind. When water runs into the stormwater management system, it collects pollutants along its path and does not receive any treatment before being discharged to local waterways. Because of this, anything that enters a storm drain or enters directly into a body of water that is not uncontaminated stormwater is considered an illicit discharge and is against the law! These types of discharges can contain high levels of pollutants including but not limited to heavy metals, toxic chemicals, oil and grease, solvents, nutrients, and bacteria.

Common Types of Illicit Discharges:

- Paint and other household chemicals or trash
- Waste oil and antifreeze
- Car wash, laundry, and industrial wastewaters
- Pool water discharge (chlorinated and dechlorinated)
- Spills on roadways and other accidents
- Failing septic systems and illegal dumping practices
- Improper disposal of sewage from recreational practice

What can YOU do to help prevent illicit stormwater discharges?

- 1. Recycle used oil, antifreeze, batteries, and old paint products. Clean up any spills immediately with kitty litter or sawdust for absorption. Sweep the spill up and dispose of it in the trash.
- 2. Take your car to a commercial car wash, where the wash water is sent to the wastewater treatment plant or is recycled. Upper Allen Township adopted an ordinance that states that people cannot wash cars with soap, detergents, or any type of chemical on pavement, which includes driveways and streets. If cleaning supplies are used, the car must be washed on the grass.
- 3. Dispose of empty bottles of household cleaners, pesticides, and weed killer as directed on the label.
- 4. Sweep up grass clippings after each mowing. Grass clippings left in the street are being washed into the stormwater system and end up in the local waterways where they cause damage.
- 5. Properly dispose of pet waste by picking it up, wrapping it, and placing it into the trash. You can also flush the raw pet waste (unwrapped.)

If you notice any of the above items entering our local stormwater system, please report it to the Township immediately.

Be on the look out for oil sheens on water, strong odors from stormwater inlets, any types of spills of the above listed items, illegal dumping, and anything being disposed of into a stormwater inlet that is NOT uncontaminated stormwater.

Fire Pit Safety: Tips and Regulations

With the arrival of warm weather and summer nights, comes backyard gatherings and fire pits. While the Township does regulate various forms of open burning, fire pits (especially for one- and two-family dwellings) fall outside the scope of the regulations that require a burn permit.

The Township enforces the 2018 edition of the International Fire Code (IFC) (https:// codes.iccsafe.org/content/ IBC2018P6), which allows a lot of flexibility for fire pits (a.k.a. outdoor fireplaces). There is even greater flexibility when it comes to outdoor fireplaces (portable or otherwise) used at one- and two-family dwellings. This is reflected in the Township's enforcement of fire pit limitations, typically focusing on the following:

- Is this a legitimate fire pit (either purchased or self-constructed)?
- When in use, is the fire pit supervised by an adult at all times?
- Are there conditions which pose a significant fire hazard?

It is important to note that simply making a rock or brick circle or campfire in the backyard does not qualify as a fire pit; a situation like this would still require a burn permit. Additionally, even if your fire pit meets Township standards, your community or Homeowners' Association may have additional guidelines that you'll need to be aware of.

It is also important to be a good neighbor and conscientious resident. The smoke from your fire pit and/or the noise from your gathering may not be a code violation, but both factors do impact other members of your community and should be a consideration.

While Township fire pit regulations are very flexible, you should still closely observe the following recommendations:

- Check the Township website for the Fire Danger Rating and any potential burn bans

 if a ban is in place, don't burn! (https://uatwp.org/ fire-danger-rating-system/)
- Purchase/design a fire pit with screening that will prevent embers from spreading, and always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Keep a clear space of at least 10 feet around your fire pit – this includes overhanging trees or
- other vegetation, nearby bushes, sheds, piles of wood or yard elements, and other flammable or combustible materials.
- Only use clean, dry wood (i.e., hickory, oak, ash, etc.) in your fire pit. Never burn trash, plastic, paper, cardboard, leaves, treated or painted wood, etc.

- Keep the fuel pile of your fire smaller than 3 feet in diameter and 2 feet in height.
- Never leave your fire unattended.
- Keep a fire extinguisher, garden hose, bucket of water or sand, or other means of putting out the fire nearby whenever your fire pit is in use.
- Ensure that your fire is completely extinguished before disposing of any coals or ashes. Keep stirring, spreading, and dousing your embers with water when putting the fire out to make sure there aren't any smoking or smoldering elements left that may reignite.
